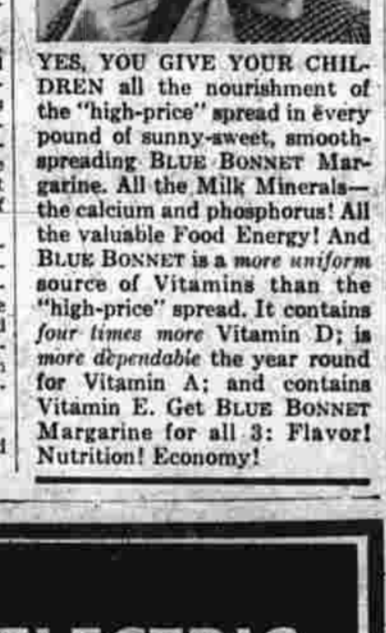

Party candidates picked up their usual 80-plus per cent majorities in the balloting held Sunday. But a total of 21,937 persons voted against them.

The highest percentage of negative votes—24,000 of 1 per cent—was recorded in the Russian Soviet Republic, comprising the greater part of European Russia. Georgia had the highest affirmative vote percentage, 99.7.

**Public Relations Good in State Says Silverstein**

Lee M. Silverstein addressed the local Rotarians at their weekly meeting Tuesday evening on the subject "Public Relations in Under-standings."

**House Members For Maintaining Two-Year Term**

Washington, March 7.—President Eisenhower's recommendation for four-year terms, instead of the present two, for members of the House is "not likely to get to first base," Rep. Celler (D-N.Y.) said today.

Celler is chairman of the House Judiciary Committee which has before it four bills calling for a constitutional amendment to put into effect a four-year term. Celler's comment indicated they don't emerge from the committee. The President's recommendation for changing the term of office in the House came at his news conference yesterday as he was to be sworn in as a member of Congress for a second year.

The House is closest to the people, and the President rightly felt that in this ever changing world the people should have a right to choose their representatives every two years, he said.

Celler declared "It is no hardship to run every two years." And he added that the two-year term is part of the general scheme of government in which Senators are elected for six years, the President for four and House members one year.

It was reported that at its next meeting, April 13, the committee expects to resume discussing the grounds for amending the Constitution.
