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Bus Drivers Lose Appeal To Alter Back Pay Award

Hartford, March 11 (AP)—The Connecticut Supreme Court ended another phase of the contract dispute between the Connecticut Coaches and Drivers Association and the state today when it refused to alter a \$1,000 award to bus drivers and mechanics by ruling yesterday that an arbitration panel had awarded a wage increase totaling nine cents an hour to the Superior Court.

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Woman's Place In World Told By Folk Songs

Rome, March 11 (AP)—Alan Lomax, a big, 40-year-old New Yorker, collects folk music. He believes a nation's civilization is particularly its attitude toward women—is reflected in its folk songs and in the way men sing them.

Lomax' father, the late John A. Lomax, was curator of folk music in the Library of Congress. Alan was his assistant curator. With his father he traveled for thousands of miles in America recording the music of mountaineers, Negroes and Indians. He has edited 14 albums of folk songs from Europe, Asia and America.

Crawled up Mountain With his tape recorder Lomax came to Italy last July. Since then he has crawled up mountains, hiked in olive groves, rocked in boats and dodged traffic in cities with an ear to the sounds made by lullabies.

Once, in Venice, he heard, canal cleaners singing a strange song in praise of the Virgin Mary and vilifying barbers. He identified it as one first sung by the pilgrims who built the town of San Marco in the dawn of the Christian era to escape invading barbarians.

"In most Italian songs you find one subject," he said. "They're about love. Even the work songs, the grain threshing songs, the chestnut harvesting song. They're about love to the very last note. The Lomax theory about music and civilization shows itself strongly in Italy."

Sex Traditions Loose Northern Italy has no very stark sex traditions about sex. Women are accepted as equals in most matters, and the attitude toward life is open and free. People like to sing together, and their voices are open throated, like laughter.

By contrast, southern Italy is bound by traditions. Many women wear veils, and they are regarded more as property than as equals. "You can hear the difference in the folk music," Lomax said. "It's solo singing, and the songs tell of suffering. There's a whole form of song in Calabria revolving around women who have disappointed men in love. The voices are clear and they don't bleed. They sound more like cries, in Arabic style."

North of Florence, he heard what sounded like primitive opera. "Lullabies, peasant singing in chorus, waving their hands in ecstatic postures. "This may have been where opera was born," he says.

Two Manchester bills have been reported on favorably by a joint House-Senate committee and are expected to be acted on by the House of Representatives Tuesday.

One of the proposed pieces of legislation would permit the town to issue general obligation bonds to pay for the proposed sewage-treatment plant here.

The other would eliminate technical obstacles to the consolidation of the town of the Eighth School District and the South Manchester Fire District.

Rep. Ray Warren, who with Manchester's other representative, Thomas Rogers, co-sponsored the bills, predicted both would be passed by the House with no difficulty. The bills would then have to go to the Senate.

The bill permitting the town to issue general obligation bonds for the construction of the \$1,000,000 sewage-treatment plant was submitted at the suggestion of the town's Board of Selectmen, Fred Colledge and Roger Warren.

The consolidation bill, which would merge the two districts, was introduced by Warren, who is president of the Eighth District, defended the proposal, pointing out that the merger would not be effective until the next year, and that the town would not be able to go ahead with improvements to its sewerage system, required by the state, until the bill is approved.

The consolidation bill is a necessary first step in the projected creation of a single town-run fire department.

It would end the corporate existence of both districts as a technical matter. It would transfer all their powers, duties, obligations and assets to the town.

Warren said the bill would be approved by the voters of each of the two districts, however.

When the City and Borough Committee held public hearings on the two bills, there was no opposition to the water bond bill, and only former Democratic Executive Helen Fitzpatrick objected to the other.

She said the Eighth School district, of which she is a resident, had been "bypassed" since no meeting had been held on the proposed legislation in the North before it was introduced into the legislature.
