## William A. Barron Dies at 60; Retired Captain of Police

Former Police Capt. William A. Barron, 60, died suddenly at his home, 25 Mather St., yesterday. A member of the Manchester Police Department since 1919, Barron retired in November 1953, due to ill health. During his 34 years of service with the department, Barron climbed from beat policeman to second in command of the department, a position which he was filling at the time of his retirement.

Born in Wapping April 5, 1894, Capt. Barron lived there and in Manchester all his life. During World War I he enlisted in the Army in 1917 and was sent overseas to France where he served with the 42nd Central Postal Directory and was gassed in combat. He was hospitalized when the Armistice was signed. He suffered the effects of the gas at various times during the remainder of his life.

Upon his return to Manchester in 1919 he was appointed a supernumerary policeman. In May of that year, and rose rapidly in the ranks due to his conscientious hard work.

At the time there were less than 10 men on the force and no cruisers, no two-way radios, no telephones and other police aids in vogue today. By dint of hard work Barron soon became known as a criminal investigator, and this led to his promotion.

In 1924 he was made sergeant, and in 1928 lieutenant. On Oct. 21, 1947 he was promoted to captain and second in command of the department, retiring just a few years later.

During his career as a police officer Barron helped solve many well known cases, perhaps the best known of which was the notorious Chicago long murder in which an Oak St. laundryman was shot in 1927. He also helped solve the case of the "Red" who shot a woman in the street in 1934.

## Ke Says U.S. A-Weapons Will Be Used in Any Clash

Washington, March 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower said today he sees no reason why atomic weapons should not be used in any conflict where they can be directed against strictly military targets.

With this news conference statement, Eisenhower backed up Secretary of State Dulles who said yesterday he thought tactical atomic weapons would be employed in any major military action involving the United States. By law, only President Eisenhower can make a decision on use of atomic weapons.

The significance of Dulles' statement and of the President's comment appeared to be that any future war, big or little, in which the United States engages will be an atomic war to some extent.

Eisenhower, natty in a chocolate brown double-breasted suit, also dealt with these other topics: "Concerned on Stock Prices"—The President said he was concerned about a decline in stock prices as he is about a price decline affecting any segment of the economy.

He has no opinion whatsoever, he said, as to whether the Senate Banking Committee's current study of the market may be contributive to a price decline.

But Eisenhower added, we are trying for an expanding economy and an important factor in achieving it is confidence.

As Secretary of the Treasury Dwight D. Eisenhower said yesterday in testimony before the Senate committee, he has no opinion as to whether the market may be contributive to a price decline.

**Says \$170,000 Fair Price**

Hill himself said he considers \$170,000 a fair price and that he has complete confidence in the subordinate in his department who made that appraisal.

organizations, such as volunteer fire departments, and bazaar forms of gambling in the same sense, for example, as betting on horse races, will be considered.

**Daylight Extended In New York City**

New York, March 16 (AP)—A local law extending daylight saving time here for one month to the last Sunday in October has been passed by the City Council.

Mayor Robert F. Wagner is expected to sign the bill, passed unanimously yesterday, because he requested it in January.

Normally the daylight saving period, which will begin this year on Sunday, April 24, would end on the last Sunday in September, the 25th. Under the new measure, the period will end Sunday, Oct. 30.

Councilman Edward A. Cunningham, Bronx Democrat, said at yesterday's meeting that he had been assured that "neighboring communities would 'fall in line' to extend daylight time if New York City took the lead. He said one such assurance came from Mayor Stanley Church of New Rochelle, N. Y.

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**Press Demands Royal Romance Facts Be Aired**

London, March 16 (AP)—A new demand was heard in Britain today that Buckingham Palace break its silence on the reported romance between Princess Margaret and RAF Group Capt. Peter Townsend.

The Laborite Daily Herald insisted it is clearly a statement that there should be a statement from the Palace, and declared "this is not simply a private matter."

The tabloid Daily Mirror also insisted out at persons who have complained about reports of the romance appearing in most London newspapers. In a prominently displayed editorial, it said:

"Critics declare that the popular press . . . has no right to concern itself or its readers with such affairs of state.

"Affairs of state, such as those involving a royal princess, are of vital public interest. The public wants to know, and is entitled to know, what is happening."

London's morning newspapers displayed pictures of a smiling Princess, taken last night when Margaret attended the dedication of a new church being built for St. John's parish in Newbury.

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**Weather Cancels Atomic Test Shot**

Las Vegas, Nev., March 16 (AP)—The scheduled sixth shot of the 1955 atomic test series was called off shortly before the set time of 5:15 a.m. PST, today.

The Atomic Energy Commission announced the cancellation due to unfavorable weather conditions. It had been expected that this would have been an atomic detonation of major proportions.

Originally this blast was planned for yesterday morning but, like today, it was called off shortly before the scheduled pre-dawn hour, because of unfavorable weather.

It had been planned to explore the device from a 300-foot tower. The plan for today had called for soldiers and Marines to be stationed in trenches 1000 yards from the tower and to advance toward the blast area after the detonation. More than 100 planes were to take part in a simulated attack on the area.

In addition it had been planned to use mice and rats in biomedical tests.

There was no immediate word from the AEC as to when another test would be tried.

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### Aruba's Crew May Not Bring Oil to Red Port

15,000-ton cargo on to other China-bound ships.

A spokesman for the shipping company said no action could be taken yet to divert the ship because no strike warning had been received from the crew.

The Aruba picked up its load of oil from the Romanian port of Comanana, on the Black Sea. When it sailed for Red China early this month, U.S. Congressmen launched a series of protests and the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa said they would intercept the tanker.

The Finnish government said it was powerless to stop the Aruba because it was privately owned and chartered "to a foreign country" — reportedly to a Hong Kong shipping firm owned by the Chinese.

The Aruba's case is similar to that of another Finnish tanker, the Wilma, which tried to take 20,000 tons of oil to Shanghai two years ago. When the ship was forced to put into Singapore for fuel and water, British officials barred its departure. The United States finally got the ship owners to sell it the cargo.

British officials in Singapore announced yesterday that the Aruba also would not be refused there. The president of the Red Cross, Gunnar Danstrom, countered that the tanker would bypass the British colony and sail to Red China's Hainan Island, off the South China mainland, and from there to the Nationalist Navy's usual patrol routes.

The seamen's union said the Aruba's crew "has refused to continue the voyage, at least beyond Singapore."

"As the (union) organization cannot force its members to endanger their lives," the spokesman added, "it has granted the crew permission to stop the vessel at the first suitable port."

One union source suggested that the Aruba crew might be willing to sail the tanker to Red China if "extremely high risk pay" was offered but added he had no information whether the men would accept such an offer.

The shipping company refused to say whether it had authorized the tanker's captain to make such a proposal to his crew.

War-time risk pay to Scandinavian sailors can run as high as 500 per cent above regular wages. In peacetime risk rates usually are decided for each hazardous voyage.

The Chinese Nationalists after she passes Singapore, but indications are they will go after her if she tries to make any Red Chinese port.

One report from Helsinki hints the tanker may try to slip up the Pearl River to Whampoa near Canton.

The Nationalist position is this: They have declared all Red China ports closed to foreign shipping and regard the territorial waters of the subcontinent as being theirs, although they cannot exercise effective control over them.

They therefore would regard it as within their sovereign rights to take any action necessary against the Aruba or any other ship within Red China's territorial waters.

Basically, if the Nationalists thought it was necessary to sink the Aruba in territorial waters, they would.

The Whampoa area is within easy reach of their planes.

The Nationalists are waiting to see what the Aruba does after passing Singapore.

The Nationalists, who have smarted under frequent accusations of piracy as they stopped vessels of various nations hauling such materials to the Communist mainland, feel that this time much of the world would applaud any action taken against the Aruba or her strategic cargo. They cite the United Nations ban on hauling such goods to Red China and say it would be only their "normal duty" to stop the shipment.

### Communist Party Meddling Banned in Russian Courts

By TOM WHITNEY  
New York, March 16 (AP)—The Central Committee of the Communist Party has ordered local party leaders to stop meddling in Russian courts. A decree to this effect is revealed in a copy of the magazine Kommunist received here from Moscow.

The decree forbids local party organs from meddling in court decisions they are to hand down. So far as can be ascertained, the decree says nothing about interference by organs of the central Communist party, however.

The Communist article by Konstantin Gorshenin, Soviet justice minister, says:

The Central Committee of the Communist Party in a decree adopted last year pointed out that the interference of local party organs in the decision of judicial cases violates the principle of independence of judges established by the constitution and their subordination only to the law, undermines the authority of the judge, discredits the judges and encourages them to adopt illegal decisions, deprives judicial organs of their independence and plants in them irresponsibility.

Gorshenin also revealed a major Soviet legal reform will be promulgated shortly by the Soviet government. He said the entire U.S.S.R. legal system has been overhauled and that the results would be made public in the near future.

New measures, Gorshenin declared, would "intensify the struggle" against such crimes as treason, espionage, desertion and activity, bribery, murder, and theft.

On the other hand, he wrote, certain punishments would be softened under new laws—for offenses of custom (polygamy in Moslem areas, for example), and violations of an economic or state service character. In some cases criminal punishment for such offenses will be replaced with administrative penalties.

Gorshenin said the new laws will increase guarantees of "inviolability" of persons and would provide increased punishment for illegal bringing of legal proceedings against persons.

Gorshenin did not say whether the new legal codes will abolish many traditional practices of the Soviet government in both criminal and political cases such as holding prisoners for months and even years in prison without bringing them to trial—or, or even in some cases without informing them of the charges against them.
