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### Consolidated to Expand Glastonbury Cigar Plant

When the new executive offices are completed, the company will move its general offices from 109 Commerce St., Hartford. Ten executive and 15 other general offices.  
The experimental laboratory started in Hartford in 1953, will be under the direction of Dr. Edmer Petersen, formerly of the Connecticut Experimental Station in Windsor. Four men will be working in the laboratory, which Keyser said will be better adapted for carrying on research than with present facilities.  
With the additional warehouse space, the company will be able to expand its production and storage of its broadest processing and storage. The company is the largest buyer of broadleaf tobacco in the Connecticut valley.  
Facilities for packing and reeling of broadleaf, part of a building now being erected on a building on Hubbard St. will be moved to the new plant. The building will then also be used for storage purposes.  
Keyser said that processing of shade-grown tobacco will continue to be handled at the facilities in Hartford, Portland and Hartford, Me. The company owns some 1,000 acres of shade tobacco, 140 of which are in Glastonbury. The original warehouse, along with a dormitory to house some 100 men, was erected in 1946 on a 16-acre site on Oak St. Additional land has been purchased for the expansion.  
The consolidated plant, the general manager for Connecticut Valley operations of which Curtis Hale is president, is located at the current grand lot in \$1,821,122 of which \$1,400,000 is for real estate and \$421,122 automotive equipment. The remainder represents assessed value of tobacco in storage on Oct. 1, 1964.  
After the company built the warehouse-dormitory, it sold it to the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Co. and then leased it back.  
The insurance company's investment in the current grand lot is \$425,760. It is the town's third largest taxpayer.  
Aggregate assessment of the two companies with the tobacco business amounts to \$2,276,882, representing about 7% of the town's tax base of \$30,278,916 grand total.

### Ribicoff Issues Call for Prayer On Good Friday

State Capitol, Hartford, March 24 (AP)—Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff issued a proclamation today designating Good Friday, April 2, a day of fasting and prayer.  
Ribicoff, the first Jew ever to serve as Connecticut's Governor, said he issued the proclamation "in the spirit of the religious freedom which is the cornerstone of our society."  
"It is my feeling," he said, "that through all religions runs a common strain of decency, love and belief in God, who is the Father of us all."  
The proclamation itself observed that Good Friday is "deared to the vast majority of Connecticut citizens, and has been observed by Christians for nearly 2,000 years."  
The text of the proclamation: "From Colonial days, the Governor of Connecticut has designated Good Friday as a legal holiday. This day is sacred to the vast majority of my fellow-citizens, and has been observed for nearly two thousand years by followers of Christ as a day of prayer, penance and fasting."  
"In keeping with the laws of our State and the continuous tradition of our people, I hereby designate Good Friday, the eighth day of April, as a day of fasting and prayer."  
"Living in a world too caught up with things material and secular, it is good and wholesome for all of us to give thought to eternal values. It behooves all of us, in conformity with our respective modes of religious observance, to repent often of our failure to be worthy of the gifts of our high dignity and destiny as children of God."  
"May the sacrificial love of which religion summons all of us to make manifest in our lives may be the discipline of fasting and the devotion of prayer enable us to become better fit in our relations with our fellow-citizens in submission to the purpose and all-giving wisdom of God who created us."
