B&M Top Officials Quit Jobs at Stock Meeting

junction position yesterday in Suffolk Superior Court.

Bullavano, who was described in earlier proceedings as B&M in-law of President Sughrus of the B&M, sought to enjoin the stockholders' meeting until conclusion of an FCC inquiry.

The FCC is trying to determine whether forces friendly to the New Haven Railroad have been seeking to gain unlawful control of the B&M. The FCC investigation got underway Monday after a week of delays but the only witness has been Sughrus.

Unless Judge Cushman overrules the lower court, the bitter proxy battle for control of the B&M will move to a climax in the Hotel Manger, next-door to the road's North Station.

Because of the difficulty of counting thousands of proxies, a decision could be delayed several days.

McGinnis forces are the current management, headed by Chairman French, and an opposition stockholders committee which has announced its intention of electing Patrick B. McGinnis — president of the New Haven Railroad — as president of the B&M.

The McGinnis forces claim to control 42.5 per cent of the B&M's \$2,694 shares. There are about 4,000 stockholders.

In addition to the Superior Court, a legal move in the U.S. Court in Boston to delay the stockholders' meeting also was filed.

Federal Judge George C. Sweeney denied a suit by Bullavano and Mrs. Glen M. Bullavano, Mrs. Mass., holders of 142 shares. The U. S. Court of Appeals also in the day refused to upset the ruling.

Of the plaintiff's contentions that McGinnis could not be elected president of the B&M, Sweeney said the court cannot assume the plan will be executed illegally.

Judge Sweeney added that irreparable damage had not been demonstrated.

At the FCC inquiry, Sughrus underwent searching cross-examination by opposition counsel. The examination disclosed what would be described as defects in the minutes of B&M board meetings reported on early negotiations with the pro-McGinnis group but little else of moment developed.

"Very unusual" language

Atty Herbert Burstein, counsel for Pierre Dunham, president of the New Haven Railroad's wholly-owned New England Transportation Co., attacked minutes of a B&M executive committee meeting on Jan. 11, 1955 and a board of directors meeting Jan. 25, 1955.

He said language of the minutes, in reference to McGinnis and the stockholders supporting him was "very unusual," "prejudicial" and "self-seeking."

Seeking to persuade hearing Examiner Lytle to reverse an earlier ruling admitting the minutes as evidence, Burstein drew from Sughrus an agreement that some pages appeared to be in a different typecript from other pages and that some appeared to be carbon copies rather than originals.

"I challenge the accuracy of the reporter," Burstein said, "and the validity and accuracy of the minutes." The reporter was identified as William J. Burns, chief of the corporation. He was not called to testify.

Sughrus conceded under cross-examination that the minutes of the Jan. 11 meeting had two pages numbered eight and that reference to discussion of McGinnis' proposals for directorships began on the bottom of the second page. He demonstrated that the back of the first page was blank.

"The minutes would ordinarily be ended on the back of page 8," he said, "but instead, a new page 8 was typed with material added concerning Mr. McGinnis."

The Rev. Kenneth Granquist of Faith Lutheran Church, East Hartford, vice pastor of Emmanuel, presided at last night's meeting. Roy C. Johnson, vice chairman of the Church Council, gave a brief account of the history of the Rev. Mr. Anderson, stating that he was born 44 years ago in Worcester, Mass., educated in its schools, and

for a time was employed as an engineering draftsman. He was graduated from Ussala College in 1923 and held a pastorate in a Brooklyn, N. Y., Lutheran Church, before accepting the call to the East Greenwich Church, where he has served for five years. Mrs. Anderson was the former Miss Olga Johnson of Worcester and a graduate nurse. They have a 15-year-old son.

Pastor Anderson was a guest at the meeting of Emmanuel Lutheran Brotherhood Friday, April 1, and made a most favorable impression on its members. He will have a month in which to consider accept-

ance of Emmanuel's call, and another 60 days notice to his present parishioners if he decides to come to Manchester.

In the meantime, the Rev. Harold Faust, returned missionary from Africa, at present studying at the Kennedy School of Missions, Hartford, will occupy the pulpit for the next five Sundays, and Student Pastor Larry Bryssel will assist.

State Senate Supports Free Institutional Care

Hartford, April 13 (AP)—An ad-ministration bill to provide free care for all patients in state institutions has won a shaky victory in the Democratic-controlled Connecticut Senate.

But the measure, which prompted a vigorous and often emotional debate yesterday on the Senate floor, is given virtually no chance of passage by the Republican-controlled House, its next stop.

Free Care vs. Fair Care

For two hours yesterday Senators debated the merits of "free care" advocated by Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff, vs. "fair care," the Republican proposal to lighten the burden of those who cannot afford to pay the costs of state institutions.

When the roll call vote was taken, "free care" barely squeaked through, 18-17, with Sen. J. Edward A. Meehan, (D-Plainfield) voting with the Republicans. It was the first time this session that a Democratic bill has won a roll call vote on administration bill and Meehan, obviously stirred up, was prevailed upon to debate the issue.

He said his family had the experience of caring for a child ill with rheumatic fever. He felt that persons able to pay for the care of their dependents should do so. Meehan opposed allowing such persons to "go free."

Thomas B. Ryan, Republican Senate leader, said Ribicoff's plan, estimated to cost between six and seven million dollars for the biennium, "ignores the principle of individual responsibility."

"Free care," said Sen. Florence D. Finney (R-Greenwich), "is a woman in the Senate, 'is a myth as we very well know."

"Nothing is free. It means merely the shifting of the cost from those in need of care to others."

Democrats rallied behind a "free care" proposal because of the State's "harmful" welfare laws put too hard a burden on patients and their families.

Joseph Longo, Senate majority leader, said the Legislature has been forced to consider the "free care" proposal because of the State's "harmful" welfare laws put too hard a burden on patients and their families.

He called the bill one step toward solving the issue.

But White House press secretary James C. Hagerty said there was a possibility Middlecoff might return to Augusta about Saturday to take on the Chief Executive.

Bothers by Burettis

Eisenhower got in 18 holes yesterday afternoon at the Augusta National Club, site of the Masters, even though he appeared "quite a bit" as Hagerty put it—by burrles in his right shoulder.

For the past six weeks or so the President has been going to Walter Reed Hospital in Washington for treatment of his burrles. The 15-minute stints at the hospital have helped, but Eisenhower got a setback Monday in tussling out the first baseball at the season opening between Washington and Baltimore.

The pitch, Hagerty said, wracked his arm partially. That was the reason the press secretary added, that the Chief Executive used only his left hand in waving greetings yesterday to crowds in Augusta and in Charleston, S.C.

On the plane trip enroute from Washington, the President stopped in Charleston for a visit to the Citadel, South Carolina military college which presented him with an honorary doctor of laws degree. The degree was awarded by an old friend, retired Gen. Mark W. Clark, president of the Citadel.

In less than an hour after arriving in Augusta, Eisenhower was out on the links finding out whether his burrles would permit any golf. The President found that swinging a club gave him a me me diagnosis, he was told anyway, Hagerty reported.

Atka Back Home From Antarctica

Boston, April 13 (AP)—The Navy icebreaker USS Atka was back home today after a 30,000-mile, six-month voyage to assist and base in Antarctica for this country's part in the world-wide geophysical year program of 1957.

The Navy's cherished auxiliary "well deck" was bestowed on the long-gone vessel as she docked yesterday at a pier crowded with an official reception committee and scores of friends and relatives of the crewmen.

Included in the reception delegation was Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, U.S.N., the famous polar explorer, who read a silent message from the secretary of the Navy, chief of naval operations and secretary of defense expressing "congratulations on the successful completion of a voyage to Antarctica."

Only one mishap added the ship's company of 237. That was the death in a helicopter crash of Lt. John P. Moore of Lenoir, N.C.

He crashed on his return trip to the ship after ferrying Father David Linsbach, S. J., the noted astronomer, ashore at Little America.

Greenspun to Face Trial On Anti-McCarthy Tactics

Las Vegas, Nev., April 13 (AP)—Morgan heads his four-man legal staff also including Bruce Thompson, Reno, and Thomas and Joseph Foley of Las Vegas. Prosecutor Greenspun will be assisted by Francis F. Hittelman.

An outspoken native of Brooklyn, the forty-year-old publisher holds a court decision over the late, formidable Sen. Pat McClellan (D-Nev.). In 1952 Greenspun received an out-of-court settlement of \$50,000 and recollection of his big casino advertising after he had charged the Senator and the major Las Vegas gaming resorts had conspired to drive him out of business.
