Chou Supports U.N. Human Rights Aims

(Continued from Page One)

...that while he supported the U.N. resolutions and had sympathy for the "tragedy of Palestine," he added "we must consider what the conference can actually do about this problem. The question of negotiations should not be ruled out by other speakers that Zionism is 'aggressive' but we must consider what is behind the situation in Palestine."

He recalled that the first conference of the Colombo powers in 1954 passed a resolution expressing sympathy for the Palestine refugees and suggesting that the conference adopt a similar one. He further suggested that delegations with tabular resolutions on Palestine form a working committee with Chou, P. Romulo of the Philippines and Prince Wan of Thailand to formulate a conference stand on Palestine.

The debate on human rights took place behind closed doors. Inag, Lebanon, Pakistan, the Philippines and Thailand all were reported pushing the move to refer the U.N. Charter, the Ceylon and Japan — non-members of the U.N. — to the conference.

Seven-Point Agenda
The conference economic and cultural committees also met this morning. There was no immediate word of their deliberations. Items of the seven-point agenda coming within their province were: rural cooperation and economic cooperation.

Other agenda items, in addition to "human rights and self-determination," include: problems of dependent people, use of nuclear energy, weapons of mass destruction, and promotion of world peace and cooperation. Presumably most of all of these will be considered by the main committee.

The committee will formulate a general statement on each subject. The conference then will agree to them unanimously.

Indonesian Premier Ali Sarwojaningrat told reporters that the length of the political arrangement had resulted in postponement of another get-together scheduled this morning for Chou. The five "Colombo" premiers sponsored the conference and other key delegation heads. The Indonesian did not say when the group would gather.

Previously it had been reported that the conference sponsors hoped at such a private session to work out an agreed program of announcements for and against communism which generated so much heat at the open plenary sessions yesterday and Monday.

Rehearsal for Formosa
One report circulated that the sponsoring Colombo powers — India, Pakistan, Ceylon, Burma and Indonesia — also hoped to use the meeting to foster a closer relationship with Chou of the Formosa Islands. However, the Chinese Premier said in his policy speech yesterday that his government still considers the Formosa "entirely a matter of our internal affairs and the exercise of our sovereignty."

Indian sources reported that Prime Minister Nehru's chief foreign policy adviser, V. K. Krishna Menon, had private conversations with Chou last night on the Formosa question but reported little if any basis for a peace agreement in the Chinese view.

One source said Nehru and Krishna Menon would be expected to seek a basis for a negotiated settlement on Formosa "but at the moment we are not hopeful."

Study Release of 11 Yanks
The Indians also reported that Chou, since arriving in Bandung, had told Nehru he was considering a previous secret suggestion from the Indian leader that Peiping release the 11 imprisoned Americans as a gesture toward relaxing East-West tensions.

Nehru reportedly had made his suggestion from New Delhi after the United States allowed the return to China of 40 Chinese students for whom it had previously denied exit permits. Indian sources indicated Krishna Menon did not raise this question with Chou in their talk last night but that he for Nehru to handle personally.

Chou touched off another squabble in the political committee today over the election of a "reporter" to guide the drafting of the communique summing up the group's work.

...that "the common people of the world need no war." Chemically hydrogen and deuterium are liquidated abnormal relations among the countries," the Soviet marshal said.

He also mentioned the Yalta agreement, stressing the good will and hopes for a lasting peace that prevailed at the close of World War II.

"Now only 10 years have passed since the end of the Second World War and the world again faces the grave threat of a new war," Zhukov said.

Sen. Margaret Chase Smith (R-Maine), public speaker at the dinner, said the United States should "take the initiative" and show the Asian-African Conference at Bandung, Indonesia, that we are the opponents of colonialism, that the Communists are the present-day advocates of colonialism.
