Assembly Unit Backs Ban on Death Penalty

Harford, April 21 (AP)—The Connecticut legislature's joint Judiciary Committee has put its stamp of approval on a bill that would abolish the death penalty in Connecticut.

The committee's favorable report was a major victory for opponents of abolition of capital punishment because it will be the first time in many years since a bill will go to the floor of either the House or Senate.

In previous years, the Judiciary Committee has rejected such bills. Should the bill pass, the State Board of Pardons is expected to recommend that the death penalty be abolished.

Harford, April 21 (AP)—A woman stepped before a committee of the Connecticut Legislature yesterday and said: "In the eye of this state, I am a criminal."

Mrs. Paul Deutch was testifying before the Legislature's Public Health and Safety Committee on a bill that would permit birth control in Connecticut—one of two states (the other Massachusetts) now prohibiting birth control.

The bill actually would allow physicians to prescribe contraceptives for married women whose health or life would be endangered by pregnancy.

Einstein Genius Burst Forth After Slow Start

(EDITOR'S NOTE: A smaller Einstein, intellectual adventurer, said he had a "kind of faith that helped me through my whole life—not to become hopeless in the great difficulties of investigation."

By FRANCIS LEWINE Princeton, N. J., April 21 (Special)—Albert Einstein, intellectual adventurer, said he had a "kind of faith that helped me through my whole life—not to become hopeless in the great difficulties of investigation."

He was the son of a middle class south German Jew. From his father Hermann, an electrical engineer, he first learned about science. His mother, Pauline Koch, gave him his love of music and art.

He intended to follow his father's profession and took entrance examinations at the Polytechnic Institute in Zurich, Switzerland. His knowledge and understanding of mathematics and physics amazed his professors.

The young scientist, however, was mainly occupied with physics. He said he really learned to love what led to the fundamentals and "to turn aside from everything else."

Einstein, who always was passionately proud of his Jewish cultural and spiritual traditions, was married in 1903 to the physicist's daughter, Mileva Marić, whom he met in a mathematics class. They had two sons: Hans Albert, born in 1904, and Eduard, born in 1909.

He became a professor of hydrodynamics at the University of California and a consultant on jet propulsion for the U.S. government. He remained in Zurich until his death in 1955.

Salk Shot Rules Sought For Area

Hartford, April 21 (AP)—A series of resolutions spelling out the method of handling the Salk polio vaccine in Hartford County, was proposed today by the Board of Directors of the 316 member Hartford County Medical Assn. Acting upon the recommendations of the medical association's Committee on Occupational and Public Health, the board, because of the expected short supply of the vaccine nationally and in Connecticut, urged its physician members to restrict the administration of the Salk vaccine to individuals over one year of age and under 15 years of age and to pregnant women.

Dr. Thomas M. Peasey, president of the association, said: "Our present information indicates that the least effective use of the vaccine would be for children under one year of age. Therefore, we are not recommending that the vaccine be given in that group."

Since a limited supply of the polio vaccine will be available in Hartford County for the next few months, we would like to see all the children in the one to 15 year age group vaccinated as early as possible.

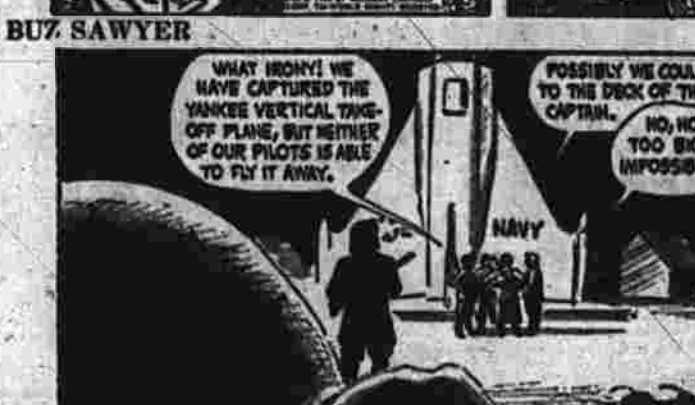

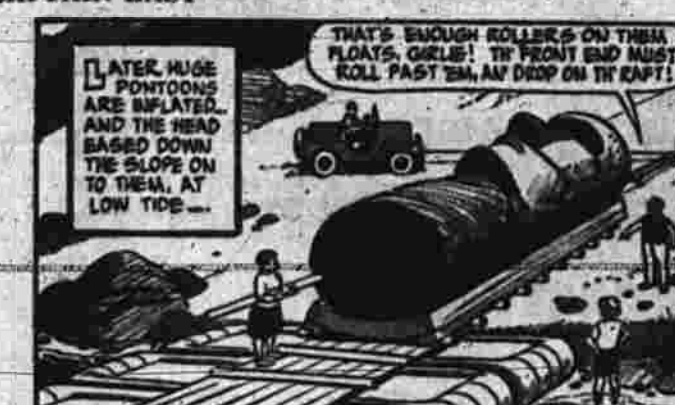
