U.S. Wary of Chou Formosa Talk Bid

Washington, April 22 (AP)—American officials reacted with extreme caution today to Red China Premier Chou En-lai's readiness to negotiate on Formosa. They said, however, it may be the most dramatic effort so far to break out of diplomatic and economic isolation.

At Gettysburg, Pa., a reporter early in the morning telephoned the text of Chou's statement to secret service agents at President Eisenhower's residence. The president is spending the weekend there.

Plan to Give Ike Text The agents said the president apparently had no objection as there was no sign of early activity. But they promised to try and give the text of the message to Eisenhower as soon as an opportunity occurred.

Finding receipt of the official version of what Chou said, U.S. authorities expressed considerable interest about whether he was willing to have Nationalist China representatives in attendance at any Formosa negotiations. They realized that Chou has expressed willingness to negotiate a Formosa settlement on several occasions. But he has yet to say he would accept a Nationalist China participant. Officials said he probably would get little support from his Far East nations if he agreed to bypass Chiang Kai-shek, Nationalist leader.

Diem Asks People Rule On Election

Saigon, South Viet Nam, April 22 (AP)—Embattled Premier Ngo Dinh Diem called on South Viet Nam's 11 million inhabitants today to write him whether they want general elections within the next few months.

Diem said in a broadcast to the nation the hour would be held within a week. He said he would abide by the people's verdict and that a permanent legislature is formed he would give it a possible one-hour AHEAD, not backward, held within a week.

Four Questions The voters will be asked to give yes or no answers to these questions: 1. Are you in favor of general elections? 2. Are you for unification of the country? 3. Do you want the reconquest of our total sovereignty and final consolidation of our independence? 4. Do you want a program of social reform including agrarian reform, public works enlargement, freedom of the press and development of the national economy?

Diem appealed to the Binh Xuyen gangster and Hoa Hao sect which are now opposing his government. He reiterated his desire to meet with leaders of these dissident groups to discuss their problems and their future role in the nation.
