But while the State Department was making its automatic, instinctive reaction, which amounted to something of a quick rejection of the Chou proposal, Dean Acheson, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, was taking a somewhat different view.

They think the United Nations, as it is, must be considered vastly better than nothing. They think it is a tender, hopeful plant, which must be allowed a chance to root itself and its ideas more deeply in the thinking of all people before we try to bring it to full bloom.

The truth, we think, is that this type of nervous consent will never come to the point where it does consider an attempt at Charter revision safe. Perhaps the truth also is that the attempt never will, at any moment, be safe. But it has been human experience that such change, when it comes in human affairs and human institutions, comes because somebody has been fighting it, not because everybody keeps agreeing to it. A particular moment is not the ideal time.
