Dr. Robert P. Bowen, school physician, said today that though he has not received the vaccine as yet he has not canceled the scheduled inoculations set for Thursday morning at 9 o'clock at the Robertson School.

He said he talked with officials in the State Health Department yesterday and was told by them Connecticut would receive its vaccine after New Jersey received its allotment.

Dr. Bowen said the chances are slim that the work will be done Thursday, but was hoping that the inoculations could be administered.

The State Health Department would not give him any definite commitment when the vaccine could be expected.

Dr. Bowen will give the inoculations under sponsorship of the Public Health Nursing Assn. and the Young Mothers Club Clinic Program.

Assisting Dr. Bowen will be Mrs. Thomas O'Brien, town visiting nurse; Miss Margaret J. Dancy, school nurse; Mrs. Wilton Wenter, registered nurse.

Mrs. W. Bryce Honyewell, Mrs. Frederick C. Rose and Mrs. Joseph P. Eaton of the Young Mothers Club will assist in the clinic, and several PTA mothers will help out in the classrooms.

The second inoculation will be given between two and four weeks after the first.

Borrowing To Gamble

The Federal Reserve Board may not be able to restrain the stock market through increasing the amount of cash to be put down for stock purchases. In January, it upped the requirement from 50 to 60 per cent and now it has given it another boost, to 70 per cent. There are those who say this will have no effect on a rising market, and who say that, if the government's object is merely to keep the market from running away with itself, that object will not be attained this way.

That may be so. But if the higher requirement of cash, and the restriction on the part that credit can play in booming the market do nothing else, they at least protect the potential suckers from their own foolishness. They may still buy stocks they cannot afford to buy, but at least they will own them when they buy them. They may still suffer losses if the market goes down, but at least their losses will not be total. We are not sure, philosophically, how far law and government should go to protect people from their own folly. But certainly all this borrow in order to gamble would seem very strange for such protection.

Actually, however, the Federal Reserve's action is aimed at the market, and it does seem likely to have some effect, no matter what the experts say. The truth is that, at the end of March, the amount of credit involved in the market—the amount of borrowing being done in order to gamble—stood at a 24-year high.

This amount, which was \$2,652,000,000, was large enough to buy a lot of stocks, but more in the position of the market itself. And in so far as the market's high position depended upon this huge credit ingredient, that position was false and risky.

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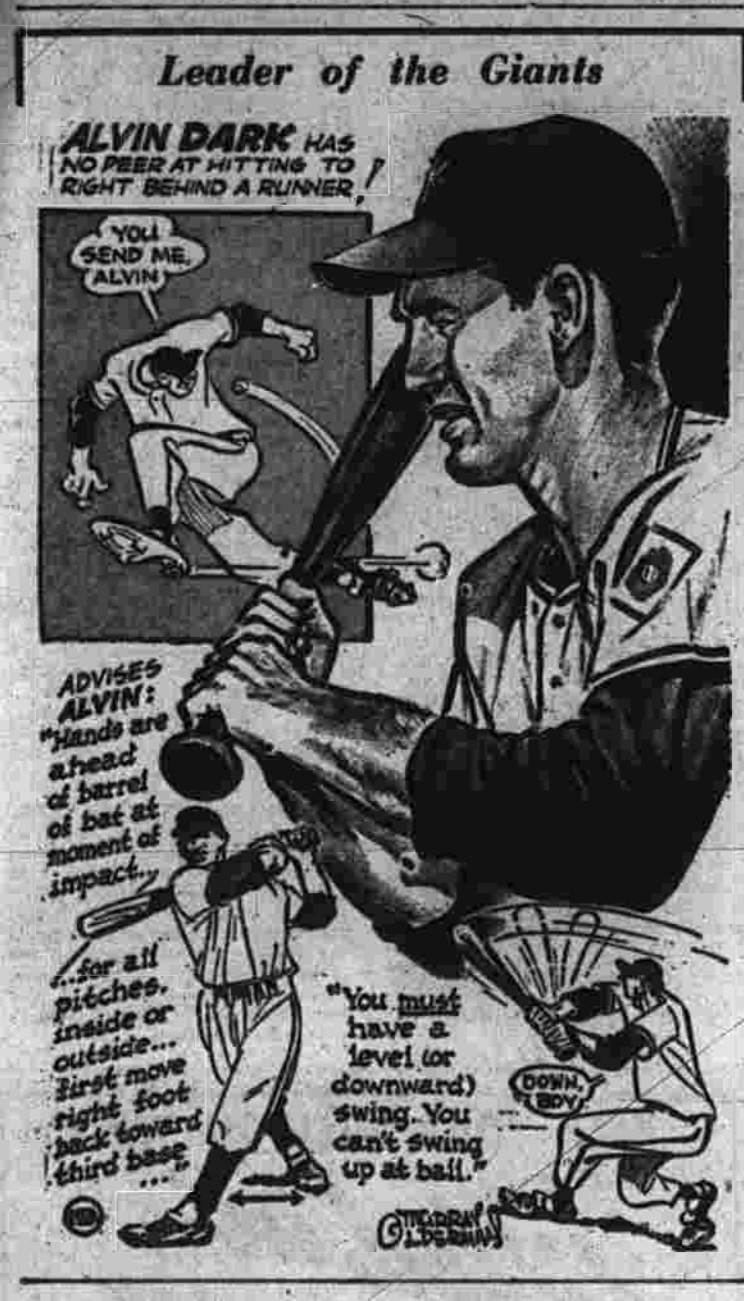

Washington, April 27 (AP)—Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio) said today his proposal to curtail the treaty power should be written into the Constitution to block the designs of "advocates of world government" (who) seek to repeal the American Declaration of Independence.

Bricker said such persons seek to achieve world government in various ways, including amendment of the United Nations Charter, and he declared: "The end result is the same—the United States would cease to be a sovereign, independent nation. When independence is destroyed, our liberties are lost. That is one of the most important reasons why we need a constitutional amendment safeguarding the power to make treaties and executive agreements."
