Bolton Parish Approves Addition, \$20,000 Expenditure Likely

Bolton, May 5 (Special)—The United Methodist Church look toward construction of an addition to the south of its present building. The three plans up for approval at the meeting of the congregation, which was held at 8 p.m. at the church, were voted by the 30 paragoners who attended.

The Church School Building Committee will select Robert T. Agnew of Sunset Lane, who is performing architectural services for the church, to draw up final plans and specifications in accordance with the vote of the parish. A stipulation of the meeting, not included in the plan as presented, is that the Committee shall increase the size of the church building.

With final plans and specifications available, the Committee hopes to obtain bids immediately. The proposed addition, at this stage of planning, has been roughly estimated to cost about \$20,000. The parish, which itself can assume a \$10,000 debt immediately, is optimistic that actual bids will show a considerably lower cost figure for the addition.

The approved plan calls for an addition approximately 30 feet square with a basement. It will show four classrooms roughly 12 by 16 feet and one by 12 feet on the east side of the building. It is currently felt that at least 100 seats will be needed for the Church School.

The first floor will be entered from the east or south. St. side of the building. Two rest rooms will open off the entrance which will also include the stairway to the basement. The office for the pastor is sketched to the right of the stairway. The remainder of the first floor will be devoted to a kindergarten classroom measuring 21 feet square and a room measuring 36 feet long of the building. The parish also shows how this plan might easily be expanded at a later date if growth warrants it. An addition roughly 30 by 38 feet built on a slab was sketched to the west of the present proposal. It would provide five additional classrooms and a second worship area for the Church School.

Assessor's Report
Mr. and Mrs. H. Fritz Noren, local Assessor, reported that \$217 has been received to date in the house-to-house canvass. It is expected that all calls will be completed this weekend.

The vaccine is made of killed virus. Dead virus cannot cause polio. Vaccine is first tested for this safety.

It is possible that some lots of vaccine might contain living virus, and be missed in the tests. With the precautions used in making this, it is very unlikely.

But the possibility is the reason why vaccine made by the Cutter Laboratories was withdrawn. Most significantly, he found it most effective against the most severe cases of paralysis.

This rash—still small—of cases of polio after single inoculations could be something perfectly expected, or due to faulty lots of vaccine.

Qualified health experts who can get all the facts will soon know the answer, and give their verdict on the matter. Use their wisdom and calmness would seem to be the order of the day for parents.

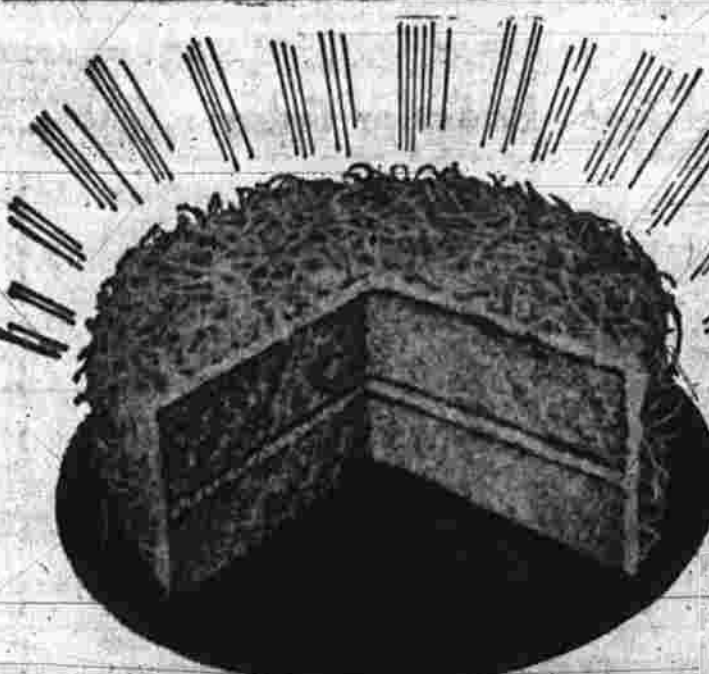

Ferrell was one of three men charged with the slaying. Albert Patterson, chief deputy sheriff at Phoenix City, was charged with the slaying of Mrs. March 11. Former Atty. Gen. St. Gerret is in a mental hospital in Galveston, Tex., and has not been tried.

The former prosecutor contended that he was talking with Gerret, who was in Birmingham on the phone at the instant Patterson was slain. Gerret told the same story to Birmingham reporters the night of the killing. He was not here for the Ferrell trial.

Ferrell sat frozen in his chair after the verdict was given. His attractive brunette wife was sought to postpone the trial at this time because a jury which acquitted Ferrell of the slaying of Patterson in March was criticized in two of the articles for that action.

The vote ran in which 600 votes were added here to the total for Patterson's opponent in a special election. Patterson had secured largely in the murder case.

Special Prosecutor Cecil Deason told the murder jury Ferrell had tried to buy the attorney general's vote with \$25,000 from Phoenix gamblers; then tried to steal it by changing votes; and then shot Patterson down to keep a 60-year-old crippled World War I veteran from carrying out his pledge to smash the multi-million-dollar vice empire.

John Patterson, son of the slain man, won the Democratic nomination for attorney general after his father's death and is now in office.
