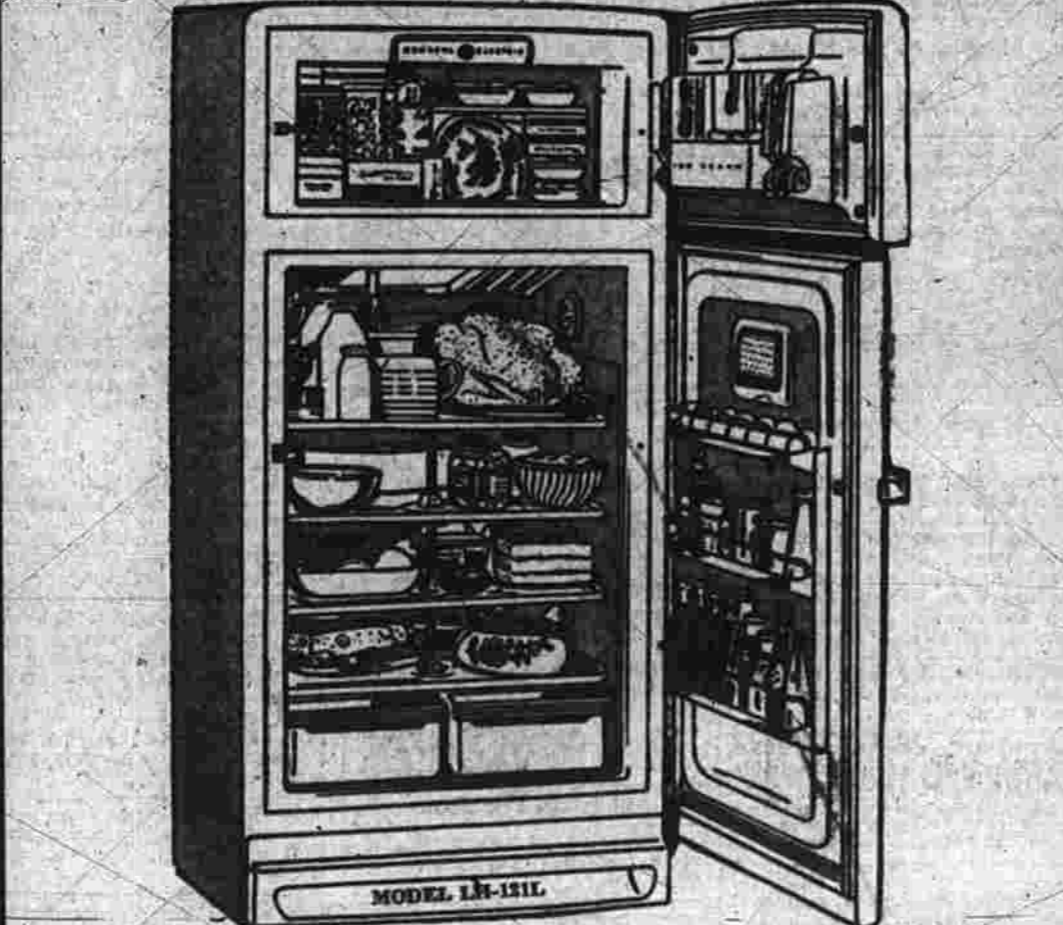

Foreign Trade Causes Industry Gains Losses

(Editor's Note: Permitting foreign goods to come in more cheaply would hurt some American industries, but it would be offset by increasing the buying power of other consumers. Which effect would be greater? This third of five articles discusses the danger of most study groups.)

Cleveland, Ohio, May 11 (AP)—In more and more American cities and states, industry and labor appear to have a bigger stake in foreign trade than in tariff protection. That's the broad conclusion drawn from half a dozen official studies and scores of unofficial surveys which were compiled by the Senate's Foreign Trade Study Commission. The bill, which empowers the President to reduce tariffs gradually over a five-year period to open world commerce, passed the Senate last week.

Though varied in scope and approach and scattered from Atlantic ports to Chattahoochee, Ore., the surveys showed that more workers draw paychecks by producing directly for export than are employed in firms hurt by low-wage foreign competition. A greater majority is employed by firms which export some of their output or depend on foreign raw materials. Possibly even a greater majority isn't affected either way, except in the general health of their communities is helped or hurt by foreign trade.

U.S. Exports \$13 Billion
Last year the United States exported goods worth \$13 billion. Imports totaled 10 billion dollars and on foreign raw materials which help produce factory jobs here.

The Commerce Department estimates more than four million Americans, including farmers who have been selling about a quarter of their wheat, cotton and tobacco abroad, depend on international trade for their livelihood.

which feel import competition. Nearly 53 per cent work for companies which export. Another 23 per cent work for companies which sell some foreign commodities but also export and thus are not counted on either side of the question. The employers of about 10 per cent have no concern with either exports or imports.

In Buffalo, Rep. Fillion (R-N.Y.) said that in a survey of 500 firms those which export or feel its impact from foreign competition outnumbered those which do not, by 25 to 1. The firms which export directly from their plants to foreign markets are a total of a billion dollars into the country. The Commerce Department's survey shows that foreign trade represented almost twice as much income for the race for inbound and outbound cargo.

Most of the industries suffering from low-wage foreign competition are relatively small—glass, pottery, carpets, cutlery, lace and others. Coal and textiles, already suffering from domestic factors, also fear foreign competition. Their position seems to be that increased imports, while not primarily responsible for a bad situation could make it worse.

The major of companies behind the tariff reduction bill while a five-year period to open world commerce, passed the Senate last week. They found that only a minority of firms were convinced they would be hurt by reduced tariffs; the rest either expected to benefit or predicted no effect on them either way.

And far across the country in Astoria, Ore., where lumber, fish, dairy and flour are the big industries, the league's survey concluded:

"Chattahoochee firms think the United States should expand its trade with other nations and stressed that they preferred competition to government control."

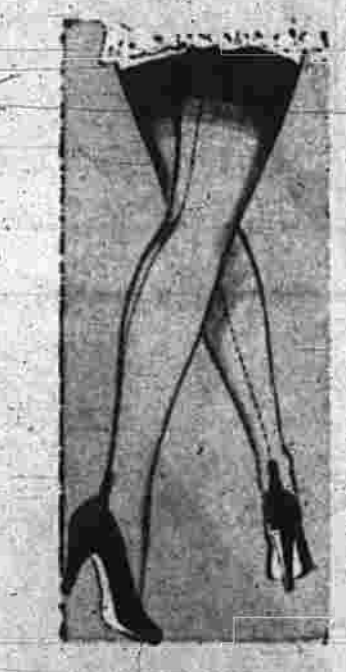

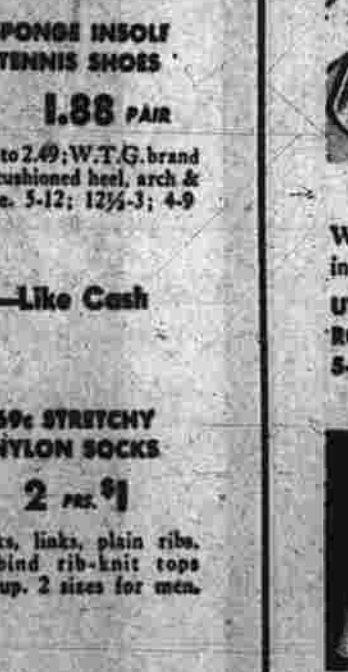

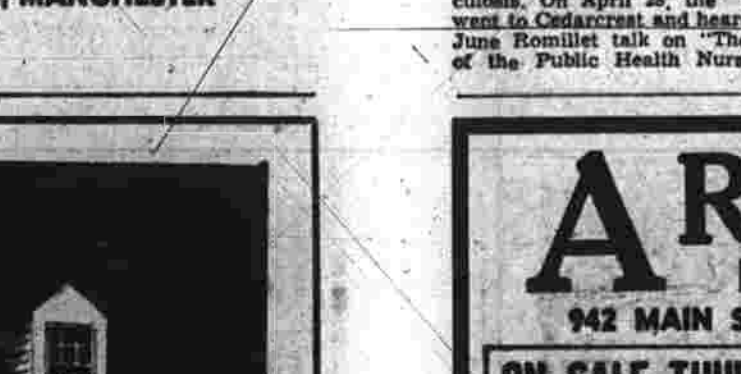

most for peace, so long as his own side has the upper hand.

In other words, Eisenhower said, it was a case of not making any undue sacrifices and yet not being stubborn in refusing to meet.

Further, he said, the Soviet Union would provide a personal opportunity to discuss the circle - the heads of government.

He cautioned that it will not be possible to turn the world around in a few days.

Other matters on which Eisenhower expressed confidence were the Berlin blockade, the Korean peninsula, the long Louisville & Nashville railroad strike, and called the agreement to arbitrate the strike.

As for the general principle of arbitration, the President said in reply to a question, that he did not think it would be profitable for him to launch upon a discussion of that matter.

He would welcome a settlement of the matter, but he would prefer to see it settled through negotiation, or by any other means.

Declines Comment

When Eisenhower was told that House Speaker Rayburn of Texas had spoken critically of his nomination of William Kern, an Indiana Democrat, to replace former New York Sen. James M. Moak, also a Democrat, on the Federal Trade Commission, Eisenhower declined to comment.

Russian farmers - The President said he still favors the idea of letting a group of Russian farmers visit this country, but added he was uncertain as to whether arrangements for them to do so had been worked out.

Objections by the Russians to being fingerprinted - required of alien visitors by U.S. law - upset plans for their visit, since there has been talk they may be given official status by the U.S. This would remove the necessary fingerprinting.

Eisenhower said that Secretary of Defense Wilson and former President Herbert Hoover have conferred regarding that situation.

The President said he could be a bit of misunderstanding about a letter he had written to Rayburn. If they were doing out all at the same time in an emergency, there actually would be no over supply, he added.

With a smile, the President said it might be somewhat risky to keep on hand an emergency supply of ammunition adequate for only one year's time.

The President was repeating a general argument by the military services against such a proposition as the Hoover Commission made. They contended it is unfair to say there is a 60-year supply of ammunition, based on present consumption; that supplies must be "used up" based on the basis of what would be needed in event of war.

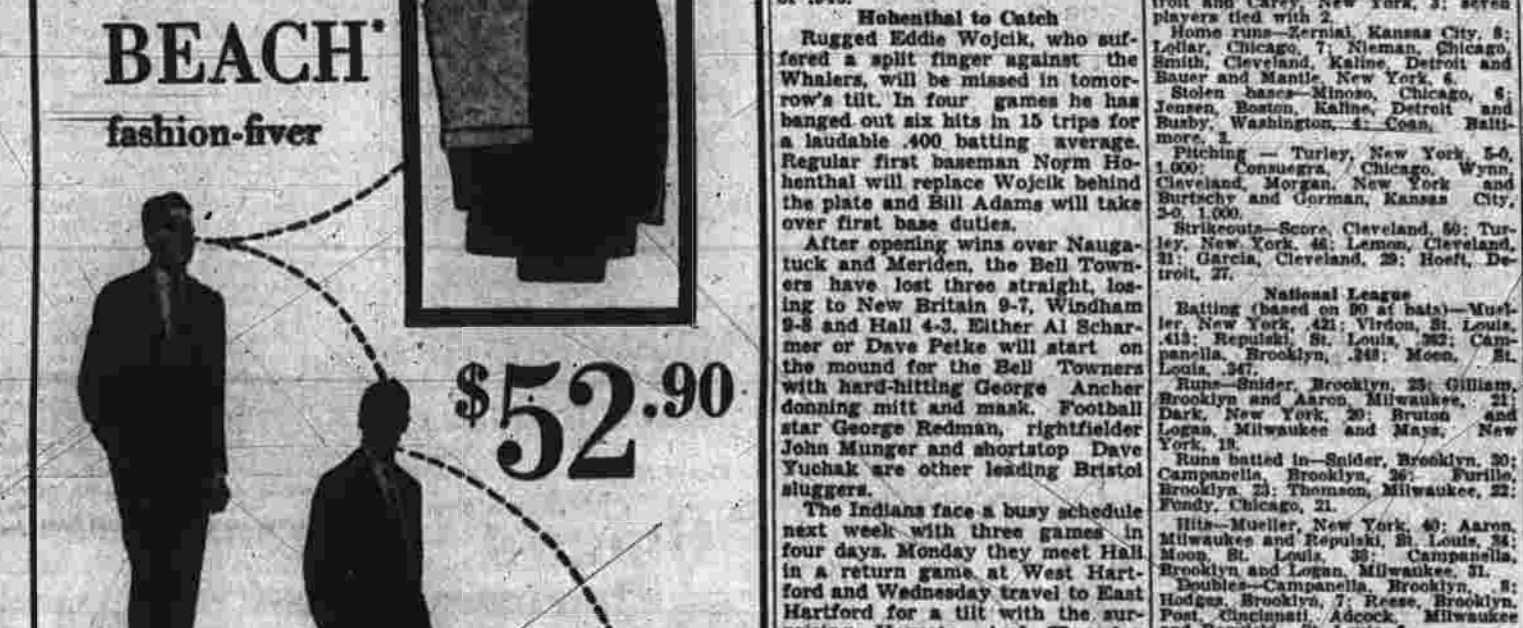
