O. J. Roberts 80, Dies; Was U.S. Justice

Phoenixville, Pa., May 17 (AP)—Owen J. Roberts, retired former associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, died today at his home. He was 80 last May 2, and had retired from the bench in 1945.

Roberts suffered a heart attack and died at 10:30 a.m. (EDT). His widow and only child, Elizabeth Roberts, were at his bedside.

The Justice, named to the nation's highest court in 1930 by former President Herbert Hoover, had been ill for some time. Until last week he had been a patient in a Philadelphia hospital.

When he was named an associate justice of the Supreme Court, he was one of the few justices to be appointed by a Republican president.

Roberts' importance was spot-lighted by his participation in the landmark case of Brown v. Board of Education, which ended racial segregation in public schools.

He also participated in the case of West Coast Hotel v. Barronette, which upheld the constitutionality of minimum wage laws.

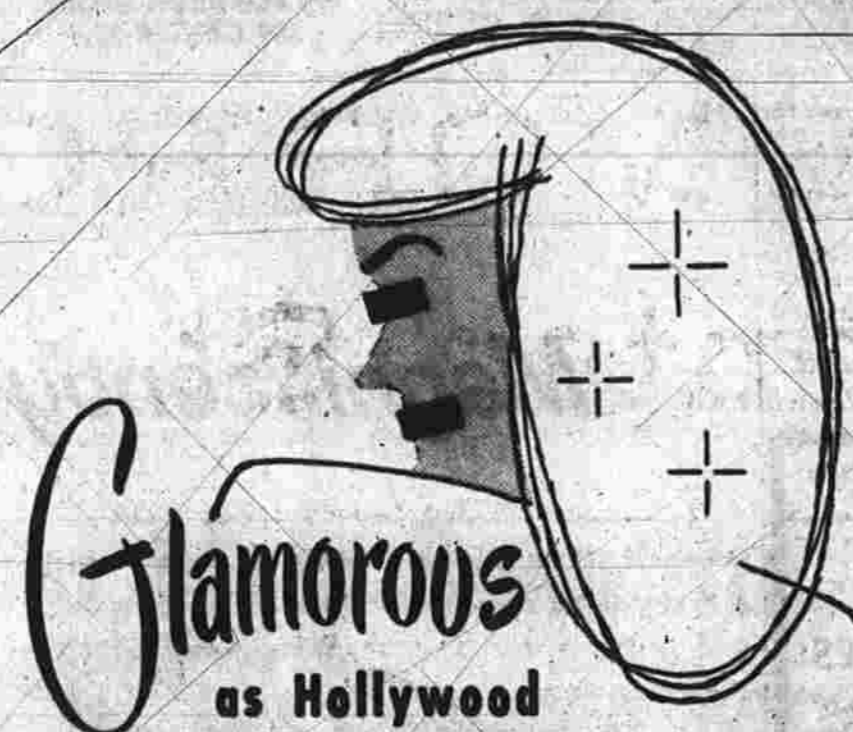

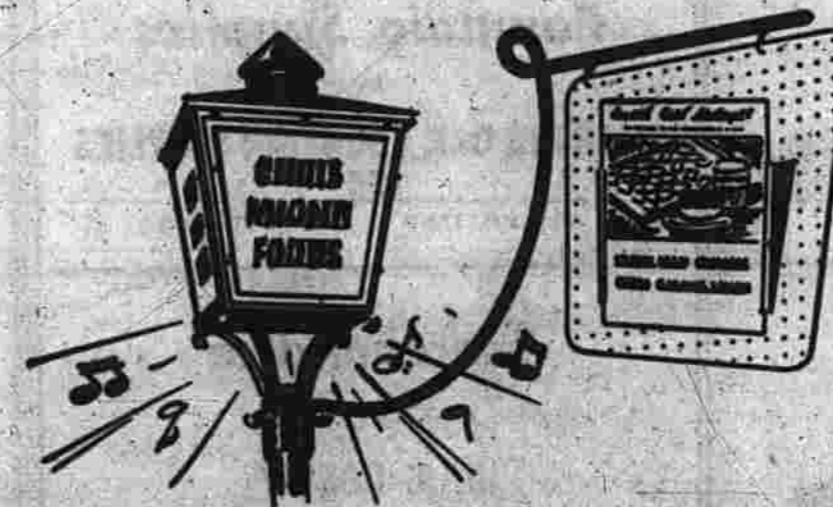
