It provides for the selection of Congressional candidates by direct primary as well as candidates for state offices.

"I feel very strongly," Dodd wrote Connecticut's Democratic State Senators, "that House Bill 2098 in the present form is a good bill and should pass. I hope that the House passes the bill and it is transmitted to the Senate, you will support it."

"The Democratic party has long and pluckily supported the direct primary," Dodd's letter continued. "This has been however, the firm support of the Republican party has had such a bill."

"If the House passes a good bill," Dodd went on, "and the Senate rejects it, it might well provide a real question as to the sincerity of our platform pledges."

Pointing out that the direct primary gives enrolled party members "the opportunity to take a direct part in the choice of candidates at the state level," Dodd added:

"It seems to me that only Connecticut of all the states that does not extend to party members this important role."

"These are times that call for the broadening and extension of the democratic process."

"The direct primary system is not foolproof but the voters of 47 states have found it much more desirable than the old-fashioned party convention system."

Dodd warned that opponents of the measure might attempt to "end it to death," and added that it may be suggested that the bill should be amended to provide for a direct primary on the municipal level.

"personally feel," said Dodd, "that a municipal primary is desirable. But I also feel that there is such a wide difference of opinion as to details that it is almost impossible to get one which would pass both houses."

"Therefore," he continued, "voting to amend the statewide primary so as to add or substitute a municipal primary can only produce a deadlock resulting in no primary legislation."

Dodd concluded:

"The choice is not between a state primary and a municipal primary. It is clear that, particularly in view of the short time remaining in the session, the choice is between House Bill 2098 or nothing."

Troops Use Unlikely The emergency regulations permit use of troops at rail crews to break the strikes, but few soldiers are qualified as locomotive crewmen. A government spokesman stressed the cabinet has no plans at present for using the Army except to help move the mails. Some 100 soldiers in 250 Army trucks already are helping with postal deliveries.

Under the emergency powers, the government also can regulate vehicles and can waive license requirements for the carrying

of freight and passengers. It can also ration gas, coal, electricity, and gasoline and set up a system of priorities for the handling of goods and workers.

Because Parliament must approve the emergency regulations as soon as possible, Eden moved up the convening of the new House of Commons for business to June 4, five days earlier than scheduled.

He said there would be "no strings attached" to the news conference; the released fliers will be given a chance to "tell all" about their experiences — you can ask them anything you want."

The four officers will make a brief statement to the press at the airport," he said. "Photographers will be given freedom of action at the plane ramp. Then we will take the officers straight up to Tripler General Hospital for a medical checkup. That's our most important job."

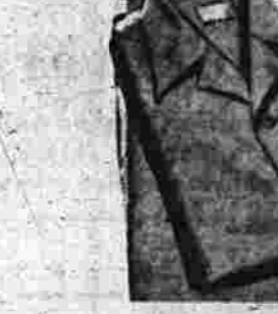

local officials are following the broad outline laid down by the court.

Applies to All Areas
The decision like this one a year ago, applied directly to school districts in Kansas, Virginia, South Carolina, Delaware and the District of Columbia. Its principles are applicable to all areas.

In the five directly affected areas, further court battles will continue over the rate of progress toward integration. In all other areas, it is up to local officials to start integration moves voluntarily.

Disappointed Negro parents could the court suits to try to speed them.

Some school officials suggested it might take legal action in every county and will do so.

But Marshall added at a news conference in New York: "We are confident that the affected school districts and others, including whole states which were without delay on programs of desegregation."

Marshall and other Negro leaders stressed the wide latitude given local officials to meet local problems. Former Gov. Herman Talmadge of Georgia, longtime champion of segregation, said it would be feasible to mix races in Georgia schools "for a long time."

Gov. Martin Griffin of Georgia said "We will continue to operate our schools the way we always have."

Decision Praised
Leaders on both sides praised the decision because their diametrically opposed views on its effects.

The Supreme Court itself suggested—but did not order—two possible future steps. It said federal district courts may want to hold hearings on local conditions, and local school boards may submit to the courts plans for integration.

The court said "all provisions of federal, state or local law requiring or permitting racial discrimination in schools must yield."

At another point it declared: "It is no part of the Constitution that the vitality of these constitutional principles (outlawing segregation) cannot be allowed to yield simply because of disagreement with them."

Marshall said this language leaves nothing to sustain "the views of some southern states that delay in compliance may be indefinitely postponed."

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WTIC Wins Bid For Television VHF Channel 3

Washington, June 1 (AP)—Senator Fanny Levin has recommended that the Federal Communications Commission authorize Travelers Broadcasting Service Corp. (WTIC), to operate a Channel 3 (VHF) television station at Hartford, Conn. It would serve most of Connecticut.

At the same time, she proposed yesterday that a competing application for the station by Hartford Television Co. be denied.

A grant to Hartford Broadcasting would serve to bring about greater diversification of control of mass communication media in the Hartford area, Senator Levin said.

Paul Second Factor, however, her choice for Travelers was based on that company's excellent past record as a station owner, its superiority in programming plans and the likelihood of those plans being carried out, she said.

Travelers broadcasting now operates radio stations WTIC and WTIC-FM in Hartford. It is a subsidiary of Travelers Insurance Co. Connecticut Broadcasting Co. owns Hartford radio station.

WTIC Wins Bid For Television VHF Channel 3

WTIC, which had originally been an applicant for Channel 1, withdrew in September, 1953, after reaching an agreement with Travelers that it would have option to buy 25 per cent of Travelers stock for the TV grant.

Members of the option would require disposal of Connecticut broadcasting radio stations in Hartford.

Four Months Needed
Officials of Radio Station WTIC said yesterday they could start television operations in four months if their application is finally approved by the Communications Commission.

General Manager Paul W. Moroney said his station already has much of the TV equipment needed to begin broadcasting and that more equipment is on order. He said most of the station's radio personnel are trained for TV work. Moroney said cost of the new very high frequency TV station would be "in excess of one million dollars."

Hartford's other television station, WTNH-TV, operates on ultra high frequency (UHF). Connecticut's only VHF television station is WHDT-TV, in New Haven.

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Trial Transcript No Public Record

New York, June 1 (AP)—A state supreme court justice has ruled that a newspaper has no legal right to be given a transcript of a court trial at its demand.

This decision was handed down yesterday by Justice Anthony Di Giovanni in denying a request by the New York Post that County Judge Samuel S. Leshowitz be directed to give the paper a copy of his charge to the jury in a recent Brooklyn manslaughter case.

Di Giovanni said the trial transcript was not a public record which normally would be available to a newspaper.

"The mere fact that a transcript which has been taken relates to a matter of public interest does not make it a public record," the justice said.

The Post has 30 days in which to appeal the decision if it decides to do so.

The trial in question was a manslaughter case against Policeman Robert Berry who shot and killed a Brooklyn youth on Feb. 18 as he fled from the scene of a disturbance. Last April 18 a jury acquitted Berry after deliberating 10 minutes.

Fliers 'Admit' \$180 Boost Backed for China Violation

Honolulu, June 2 (AP)—Four American fliers, chipped and ready to meet their families today after more than two years in Communist Chinese prisons, say they resisted "brain-washing" but pleaded guilty to violating Chinese air space.

In their first press conference since release Thursday near Hong Kong, the fliers said they spent long periods in solitary confinement, did not get letters from home until after the Geneva Conference last summer, and thought U.S. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold was hanged in obtaining their freedom.

Asked if a confession was required at their trial, Capt. Harold G. Fisher, Swain City, Iowa, said: "No, not at the 'Geneva' Conference. Was there a confession before the trial?"

"I believe I'll wait until I see my lawyer before answering that question," he replied. Another airman said Fisher's reply would stand for all of them.

The four said they resisted at least one offer of a \$10,000 bribe to help them escape from the prison. They were held in a camp near the town of Kowloon, Hong Kong.

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\$55 Million 'Job Security' Plan Reported Ford Offer

Detroit, June 2 (AP)—The Detroit News said today the Ford Motor Co. has offered the strike-threatening CIO United Auto Workers a "job security" plan accepting the principle of the union's guaranteed annual wage demand.

The news said the Ford offer entails a \$55 million fund "unprecedented in industry."
