





Legislature Stalled On Trade Schools

State Capitol, Hartford, June 24 (P)—The Senate and House became deadlocked today on the question of how much money should be provided for state vocational schools. The differences were brought to a head as the Senate amended

a House bill to provide for schools projects in Hartford and Danielson, items opposed by Republicans and supported by Democrats.

As passed by the House yesterday, the bill authorized a \$7,034,000 bond issue. The Senate upped that figure to \$12,917,000 to provide \$4,798,000 for Hartford, \$85,000 for Danielson and \$1,000,000 for New Britain.
