Bolton State May Dry Toddler's Eyes, Permit Wading

Bolton, June 29 (Special)—Unlucky reports indicate that an attempt will be made by workers of the State Fish and Game Department to "smooth out" the rock dumped in the wading corner of the lake on the right side of the annual Vision and Hearing Clinic to be held at the school tomorrow.

Parents of wading children asked distraught questions after workers dumped 50 yards of stone in the corner on Monday. The project became necessary, workers explained because of the washing action of the water at the foot of the dam which was causing the cement slabs on the face of the dam to slip. The Conservancy officers said neglect of the condition could be disastrous if the storm of last year were repeated with no preventive measures taken. The warning recalled the bridge on the right side of the dam did give way, washing out the bridge on Rt. 44, and causing other property damage.

Jobless Claims Decrease Here

The number of claims for unemployment insurance in the Manchester area remained unchanged, during the week ending Saturday, according to the weekly report of the State Labor Department.

The report states the total Manchester claims at 490 as compared with 483 in the preceding week. Initial claims, which indicate new spells of unemployment, also showed little change, dropping from 67 to 65.

Throughout the State, meanwhile, claims for unemployment compensation benefits rose slightly, from 23,777 to 23,881. Including in the total for week ending Saturday are 231 vacation shut-down claims.

During the corresponding 2-week period last year, claims rose to 28,618 from 27,800.

The report also shows that there were 270 claimants who exhausted their benefits last week, bringing the number of such claimants on file this week to 21,350. This compares with 6,239 claimants who exhausted their benefits during the same period last year.

The Hartford office continued to lead the State in the number of claims received with 3,705, followed by Bridgeport with 3,225, New Haven with 3,188 and Waterbury with 3,025.

Federal Job Hike Reported in May

Washington, June 29 (AP)—The federal government's civilian employees totaled 2,366,854 in May, an increase of 6,685 over the preceding month, a Senate-House committee reported today.

Sen. Byrd (D-Va.), chairman of the committee on reduction of non-essential federal expenditures, noted that this was the fourth increase in succession—the longest sustained upward trend since July 1953.

However, a total job boost of 12,586 in the last four months left the payroll in May still 20,979 below the total when the current fiscal year started last July.

Byrd said agencies reporting increases in May included the Department of Agriculture, Interior, Commerce, the Air Force and the Army. Decreases were listed by the Tennessee Valley Authority, and the Navy.
