When bequeathing the property to the State in her will, she stated that t was her "hope and expectation" that the property would be used "for park purposes and for the preservation o' the forest and wild animal life thereon."

Eight Miles Away The woody tract, located on Rt. \$5, nor heast of Hebron and bordering upon Gilead, just eight miles from Manchester, was undeveloped until two years ago when the su of \$20,000 was appropriated for its deve opment as a park and rec-'reational area. The property was used by hikere and fishermen during these years, with occasional picnickers coming to lew the ruins of the old mill and strolling down to the posd and through the
