2. A constituent assembly to be followed by drafting of a constitution and preparation for a final German peace treaty.

He pointed out that under the Western European Union the West German Republic is pledged not to resort to force in bringing about modification of German frontiers.

"That commitment," he added, "ought not to be taken also respecting Russia."
