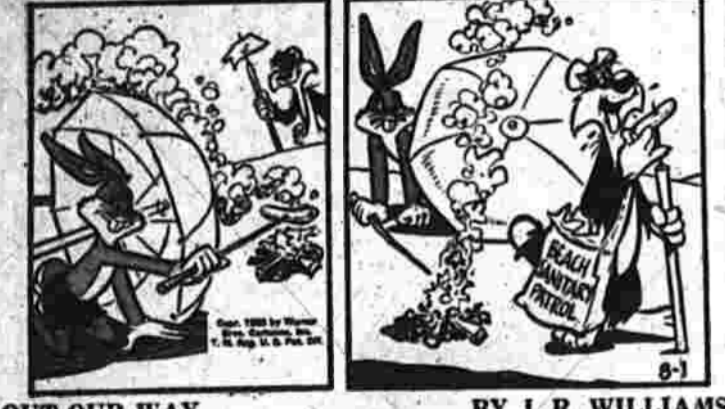

### Directors Hear Workers' Plea for Pay Hike Tonight

The Board of Directors will be faced with requests for pay hikes tonight when it hears representatives of the town union and workers in the Municipal Building at a meeting scheduled to start at 7:30 in the hearing room of the Municipal Building.

A spokesman for workers in the Municipal Building said today the group has written a letter to the Board asking for something more than the acceleration of the automatic raise program recommended by General Manager Richard Martin.

He did not elaborate on the contents of the letter.

The accelerated automatic raise program recommended by Martin amounts to an average \$60 a year salary hike for clerical and administrative workers. The \$60 an hour rate has been recommended for most hourly-paid workers in the rough equivalent of that hourly increase.

18-cent increase

Local 991, State, County and Municipal Employees Union, AFL, has decided to press for a 10-cent an hour hike, however. At a meeting Wednesday, the union membership empowered its bargaining committee to make the request.

The Directors also hope tonight to take up Martin's recommended \$75,125 Police Department budget. Police Chief Herman O. Schenck told the board that \$291,213 in his budget.

Argraves said that the state has acquired 2,100 of the 4,000 parcels needed for the Expressway. For the 2,100, the state will spend \$28 million. The entire expenditure for acquiring the land is estimated at \$60 million.

Of the remaining 1,900 parcels, 1,300 are under negotiation. The other 600 will be contacted in the near future, Argraves said.

### Miss Belmont Dies 'Apparent Suicide' in N. Y.

New York, Aug. 1 (AP) — Miss Alice Belmont, 44, a granddaughter of socially prominent August Belmont Jr. and one of the heirs of his huge fortune, died in her gas-filled Manhattan apartment yesterday.

Police listed the death as an apparent suicide. They were called by neighbors who smelled gas, later found to be pouring from open jets in Miss Belmont's kitchen.

Her body was found in the living room of the tasteful but modest 2 1/2-room apartment at 617 W. 113th St. where she had lived alone for the past two years.

Miss Belmont's grandfather was a banker and one of America's wealthiest men in his day. He was an avid horse breeder and Belmont Race track on Long Island was named for him.

While still in her 20's, Miss Belmont shunned the social world into which she was born and devoted herself to a music career. However, her family claimed she was spending too much money to declare her incompetent to handle her own affairs.

Among her expenditures, family said, were \$31,000 for a Stradivarius violin and \$500 a month for music lessons. In less than two years during the depression, they alleged, she ran through \$70,000.

For a time Miss Belmont was confined to a hospital in Westchester County. After the dispute with her family, she developed an interest in medicine, studied nursing at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston and was licensed as a registered nurse in 1945.

Because of illness she has not worked for the past year.

Miss Belmont is survived by three sisters and a brother—Mrs. Robert "Timberland" New York; Mrs. Gardner L. Lewis Jr. of New York; Mr. Robert Livingston Belmont, of Boston, and August Belmont of Boston, N. Y. All but Alice are listed in the Social Register.
