Rockville-Vernon Finance Unit Holds Key To Next Move for SBC

(By BONNIE DEVINE)

Rockville, Aug. 3 (Special). — The Board of Finance meeting scheduled to be held sometime this week may result in approval of a site for a new high school, as it times past, it may result in a veto of recommendations as transportation is concerned.

The Vernon Board of Education meets this evening at 7 o'clock in the old High School building. The Board will discuss the new Loveland Hill site proposed by the SBC, as well as the site of a new high school site.

The new high school site must be made by the Board of Finance, the Board of Education and the State Board of Education before it can come before the Board of Finance.

The SBC's property on Loveland Hill has a price tag of \$35,000. The SBC said it has been listed as the Commission's second choice for a site, the Oik-Aberle land on West St. and Regan Rd. remaining the primary consideration.

The search for a building site for the proposed school started over a year ago. The search committee has been examining the problems that would be faced in constructing and equipping a new high school. That was in February 1954.

Work progressed in June, 1954, 200 of the town's voters approved the proposal of this fact-finding committee to build the school. At the same meeting, the present SBC was appointed.

In December, it was announced that a school architect had been engaged and a study was being made concerning the site of the building.

S. F. Deter and Associates of Hartford, and J. G. Conke, were named architects and were directed to draw preliminary plans for the school.

Committee members indicated they favored a 4-room, 5-year high school that would accommodate 1,000 pupils and provide for about 2,000. A much favored discussion was held at that time concerning the so-called Hospital Lot on Fox Hill.

By April of this year, after extensive study by the SBC, the committee gave their report to the school. On April 22, the study group announced the approval of the Oik-Aberle land. Options were signed with the owners and a price of \$25,000 was placed on the property.

Recommendation was then made by the SBC to the Boards of Education and Finance. At the same time, money for purchase of the Oik-Aberle land.

The site paved the Board of Education with flying colors, raising a 7-1 vote of approval by the Board of Finance. However, it was not a stone wall when it came up for approval by the Board of Finance the following week. On May 12 this body automatically turned down the recommendation, much to the surprise of the SBC and many citizens.

Cost A Factor

Although no concrete reasons for the rejection were given at the time, it is believed that the cost was the main concern of the board members.

This setback meant the SBC had to retrace its steps and re-examine its search for a building site. Five major locations have been under extensive study by the SBC. The Oik-Aberle site, the Hospital Lot, the Town Farm site (near Mitchell Farm and the latest tract, the Sumpkins property on Loveland Hill.

The Town Farm site, located in the northern corner of town near the Tolland town line, has been considered rather favorably by several groups, including the Vernon Township Board of Education. The town sewer line does not extend to the site and, according to engineers who studied the plot, a septic tank arrangement would be costly and hard to maintain.

Butler Charges Ethics Issue Dodged by Iko

Washington, Aug. 3 (AP). — Paul M. Butler, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, said President Eisenhower chose "the safe way out" in accepting the resignation of Harold E. Talbot as secretary of the Air Force.

He said the President had sidestepped the issue of ethics.

Eisenhower told his news conference last week he would read the record of a Senate investigation of Talbot's outside business interests and make his decision on Talbot on the basis of ethics involved.

Health Official Expects Improvement in 'Shots'

By FRANK CAREY
Washington, Aug. 3 (AP)—According to the 1954 field trials the Salk polio vaccine is about as good as that for whooping cough, a Public Health Service doctor said today.

It isn't quite as effective as smallpox vaccine and diphtheria toxoid.

But Dr. Joseph Bell, who made the comparisons, hastened to add that "this is the first polio vaccine and we can expect that an improved vaccine will eventually be developed."

Dr. Bell is chief epidemiologist of the National Institutes of Health.

He made the comparisons on the basis of the report from last summer's field trials saying the Salk vaccine was 90 to 95 per cent effective in preventing paralytic polio.

He said it is still too early to draw any conclusions about the efficacy of the vaccine on the basis of its use during the present summer.

Furthermore, he said, it is not yet known how long whatever degree of protection is afforded by the polio vaccine will last beyond the first year.

Concerning other inoculations against given children, Dr. Bell said:

1. Smallpox Vaccine: "I don't know of any case where, after a successful 'take' of smallpox vaccine, the vaccinated person has come down with the disease within the first year after vaccination."

"However, small pox transmits itself with time and varies with individuals. It is estimated that more than 50 per cent of people will have lost substantial protection by five or ten years after the original vaccination, and therefore they should be re-vaccinated."

He declared, though, that "because of the adequacy of the vaccination program, very little smallpox occurs in this country."

Cost of Raw Materials Hurts Buyer's Market

New York, Aug. 3 (AP)—Rising prices of industrial materials are creeping in today to threaten the buyer's paradise that consumers have been enjoying.

Example: The price of natural rubber went up some time back. Makers of tires in this country fretted but consumers paid little attention. But now the price of tires is going up around 80 to 90 cents at the retail level.

Food prices for the most part have been steady to lower. As a rule they'll probably stay that way.

But from Brazil comes a report of a freeze and unprecedented snow with the amount of damage to the coffee crop as yet undetermined. It was just two years ago that a similar report set off the big inflation in green coffee prices that finally ended in roasted coffee going to \$1.25 a pound at the grocery. Already the price of coffee for future delivery is advancing.

Materials Cost Up
Prices of many of the materials that manufacturers turn into consumer items have been climbing fairly steadily this year.

Steel prices have gone up \$7.50 a ton on the average. And some

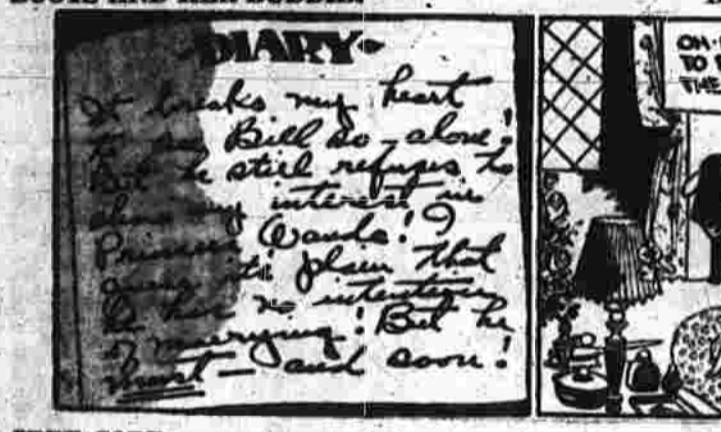

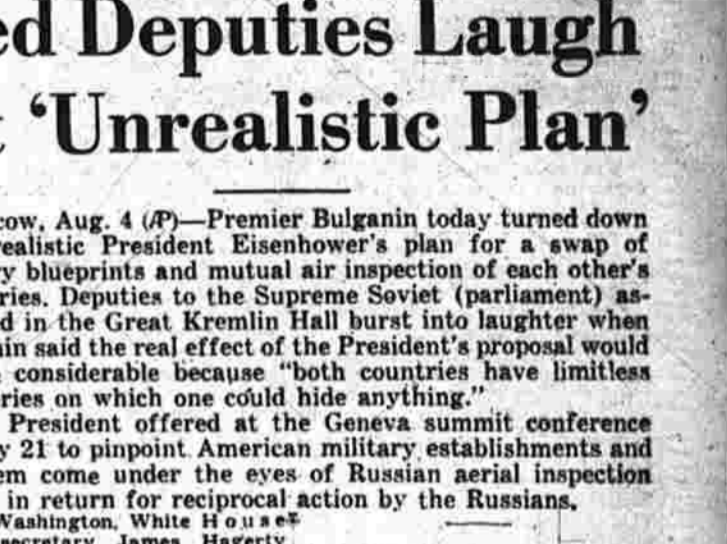
