Budget of \$4,301,718 Adopted by Directors

Give Martin Wage Hike To \$13,250; Increase Other Wages; Predict 3 1/2 Mill. Tax Rate

A \$4,301,718 budget for the fiscal year beginning Monday was adopted last night by the Board of Directors of the First National Super Markets.

The budget, which was approved by a vote of 10-0, includes a 3 1/2 mill. tax rate on the new Grand List. The current rate is 3 1/2 mill.

The Board unanimously approved the budget at 9 P.M. after three hours of discussion.

The vote for wage and salary increases, including the manager's rate which brings his salary to \$13,250, was also unanimous.

Consider Pay Increase

The Board discussed, but took no immediate action upon an increase in the salary of Police Chief Herman O. Schmidt. The Directors discussed the hike in terms of \$468 or \$702. Schmidt's salary is now \$6,734. In order to avoid complicating approval last night, the Directors decided to postpone voting the raise until later. It will probably be made retroactive to next Monday.

The Board's formal action on the budget came after hours of deliberation over the past three weeks. The reductions were tentatively decided upon Monday and Tuesday and incorporated into the budget last night.

Before adopting the budget, the Directors accepted the Board's recommendations on salaries and wages. They provide a 3-cent increase for hourly and workers in the unskilled departments, an acceleration in the automatic raise system for salaried workers who will now receive a half-percentage increase each year. That amounts to \$60 for most workers, more for some. For police, the recommendation is a 10-cent increase for probationary patrolmen, a 2-cent raise for patrolmen 1, a 3-cent hike for patrolmen 2, and a 4-cent raise for sergeants.

In addition, the Board approved hikes beyond those Martin had recommended. The hikes will be 2 cents more for salaried workers in unskilled departments, and its equivalent for salaried workers and police.

Martin was instructed to work out the details of the raise and report back to the Board. It is expected the hikes will be retroactive to the beginning of the fiscal year.

Mayor Harold A. Tuckington mentioned a letter he had received urging the Board to approve three additional paid holidays, but said he felt the budget meeting was not the proper time to discuss it.

Raise Job Levels

Martin's recommendation also provides for elevating eight positions in the salary ranges. The posts of senior clerk, machine operator, payroll clerk and planning administrator go up one level. The clerk-typist, cashier, secretary to the General Manager, assistant clerk of the court and police captain go up two levels.

If the Board decides to raise Police Chief Schmidt's salary, the chief's position will probably go up two levels.

Vote for most of the departmental budgets were unanimous last night. Director Walter M. Money voted on the planning and zoning appropriation, the Development Commission, the Civil Defense budget, the central improvements budget, all

of which he thought were either too high or financed unacceptably. Director Pascal Poe voted no on the Board of Education budget after objecting strenuously to the \$17,526 cut made by the Directors. Mrs. Natalie McIntosh supported him.

Poe also objected to a \$1,465 cut in the library budget.

The budget adopted last night includes a 3 1/2-mill rate of \$3,339,500.

If estimates are correct the \$4,301,718 will leave a balance at the end of the fiscal year of \$30,915. The Directors, however, are considering a tax revaluation of the town which will cost about \$49,800. If the revaluation is made, the estimated balance will be \$1,115.

The Board's budget cuts \$48,919 from the manager's salary recommendation, but in order to make that cut the Directors had to make a special appropriation of \$48,919 in the supplies, equipment and similar departmental budget to compensate for the \$49,000 the Directors added to the salary item.

The most substantial item in the Highway Department where the \$200,000 new permanent salary was slashed to \$9,100. The cut means that \$190,900 will be removed from the Center in Boston. It also means Edridge and Maple Sts. will not be repaved where they intersect with Spruce St.

Another large cut is \$17,526 in the Board of Education's \$2,117,526 recommendation. Dr. Poe last night expressed concern that the reduction might not hire a school social worker as planned or might curtail the educational program in some other way.

Shrewsbury chairman of the Board of Education, has told the Directors at several disquisitions that Martin's recommended budget was too low.

In past years, cuts in the education budget have usually meant the sacrifice of repair to school plants.

Other cuts were made with the expectation that the jobs would be done by the town or by the use of less equipment. Among the items which will probably be reduced are some consultant fees for new fiscal procedures, fewer supplies for the town clerk, reduction in the amount for settling claims against the town, elimination of
