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**Propaganda True Too**  
 It has been obvious, since the outbreak of the cold war, that the propaganda line toward the West has changed. We Americans are no longer walloping to be abused and humiliated. Our leaders are, suddenly, respectable, friendly people, sincere for peace. The Russians have demonstrated their factual, relatively objective reporting to their own people of what our leaders are doing. We had been wondering what the American response to this would be, and now comes word that we, too, have absorbed our usual propaganda sword and taken up a new and more pleasant line. No more does the Voice of America specialize in sympathy for the poor people of Russia, oppressed by a power-mad dictatorship which denies them freedom and a decent life. No more does it call upon the people of Russia to rise up and overthrow the criminal ruler in the Kremlin. For our propaganda, too, there is a new atmosphere of sweetness and light, completely contrary to the basic purposes for which we organized our propaganda in the first place.

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Our propaganda was directed to the same people, trying to make them distrust that dictatorship and revolt against it. And the study we would like to see made, each side would try to determine whether the Russian people whipped into this battle of propaganda, really believed either side were really influenced one way or another in any degree. Our guess, verdict would be that the propaganda has been wasted effort, primarily because it was never clever enough, on either side, to avoid self-inflicting itself as propaganda. But perhaps we are wrong. Perhaps, to go to the other extreme, it has been our propaganda which has played a part in creating the popular atmosphere in Russia to which the men in the Kremlin have now yielded, by abandoning many of the more elements of their dictatorship, by their great show of heading for peace in the world.

In the main, however, the propaganda, which engendered hate on both sides, is something the world can use without it. It is quite obvious that the present change is tentative, and that both sides can, with a flick of the policy switch, go back to their old standards. But it is to be hoped that the change is permanent, and that, in the history that lies ahead, both Russia and America can make their points by what they say and what they do, rather than by the employment of international hucksters.

**Half Million Lost In State Tobacco**  
 Hartford, Aug. 15 (AP)—Fringe winds from Hurricane Connie cost shade tobacco growers in this area about half a million dollars, a survey of some of the larger plantations indicated last night.

The damage to the tobacco plants themselves was indirect. Gale winds ripped away the shade fields, and resultant exposure to the sun will hurt the quality of the tobacco.

The damage estimate also includes replacement cost of the netting.

Broadleaf tobacco growers who do not use netting, welcomed the storm because the accompanying rain was needed badly.

The same was true of shade plants north of Windsoy, where the netting withstood the wind without damage, but some plantations suffered to some degree.

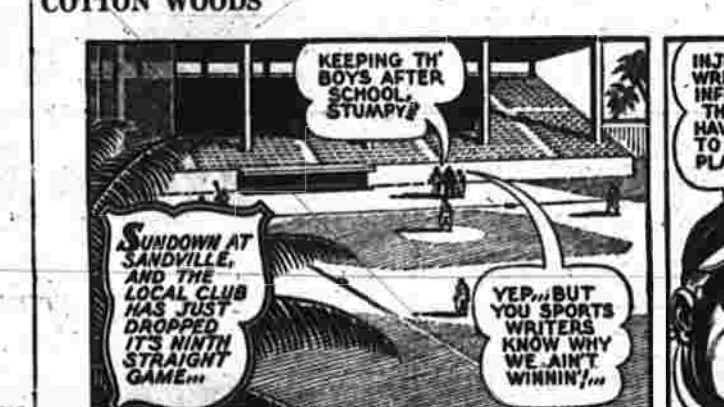

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### Marine General Found Dead of Gas Poisoning

Washington, Aug. 15 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Merrill A. Edson, winner of the Medal of Honor as leader of "Edson's Raiders" during the World War II campaign for Guadalcanal, was found dead yesterday in the garage of his home.

The body of the retired Marine Corps officer was found by his wife, lying on the front seat of the family auto. Dr. J. J. R. Edson, who was called to the scene, said death was due to carbon monoxide poisoning.

Edson, 58, was executive director of the National Rifle Assn. and former head of the Vermont State Police. He retired from the Marine Corps in 1947 after 20 years' service.

Capt. Merrill A. Edson Jr., a son of the general stationed at the Quantico, Va., Marine base, said his father had been "very tired" and "feeling very badly about the American prisoner-of-war question."

Edson was one of five retired generals and admirals who recently prepared for the Defense Dept. a study of a possible code of conduct for American prisoners of war.

Results of the study have not yet been made public.

Edson was a native of Rutland, Vt., and served in the State Police of his home state from 1917 until he became director of the rifle association in 1931.

Edson's younger son, Lt. Herbert R. Edson, also stationed at the Quantico Marine base, a sister, Mary L. Edson, lives at Burlington, Vt.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at nearby Ft. Myer, Va. Burial will be in Arlington National Cemetery.
