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Flood Waters of Quinebaug River Damage Rogers Plant

Condemn Many Homes Damaged by Quinebaug

These photographs, taken yesterday in the flood-ravaged Rogers area, show some of the homes and factories laid waste by the same flood waters that devastated Putnam.

The odor of mud, silt and floating garbage still permeated the air Tuesday, four and a half days after the Quinebaug River cut a huge swath through the entire manufacturing community.

At least 33 homes, many of them 2 and 3-family affairs, were all condemned and found unfit to live in. Some 75 families are now homeless in the town. Every one of the homes was nearly covered by flood water when the swollen river reached its peak. One resident said that "Every one of these homes wallowed in 12 feet of water while the river was at its peak."

The factory is the main branch of the Rogers which operates a plant on Hill St., in Manchester. Paul Silverstein, Rogers president and a resident of Manchester, said yesterday that the plant will be back in operation by Monday, but workers clearing debris in the wrecked community said that they "doubt if the plant will get back into operation before next Thursday."

Inoculate Workers
Residents of the community had to be inoculated before they could go into the wrecked area to investigate damage. Telephone service is not yet fully restored, water is not fit to drink, electricity is out and danger of typhoid hangs over the workers doing repair work. Roads between Rogers and Manchester were washed out, but

France Calls Reservists For North Africa Duty

them tough Foreign Legion veterans. Some of the troops from West Africa, Marines and Parachute Commandos—pushed an offensive in the Atlas Mountains against the 4,000 Senegal Irishmen who massacred 80 Frenchmen at Ouad Zem Saturday.

More Deaths Reported
The rebel attacks and continuing French cleanup operations in Algeria brought new deaths there yesterday, also. Nineteen rebels were killed when they tried to enter Gaoienville, a town of 8,000 between Constantine and Philippeville. Another dozen deaths were reported in isolated clashes in the countryside.

Estimates of the weekend death toll in Morocco and Algeria rose to 2,000. Official reports early today from Algeria put the number of rebels killed in Algeria at 1,000 and said another 1,500 were taken prisoner.

In New York, the 17-nation African-Asian bloc in the United Nations—longtime champions of independence for French North Africa—appealed yesterday to Secretary Dag Hammarskjold to intervene personally in an effort to stop the bloodshed in North Africa.

Edward Risk of Lebanon said Hammarskjold declined to make any comment on the appeal. Risk said a request for quick Security Council action was being considered.

The French refused to discuss details of the military operation in the Atlas Mountains southeast of Ouad Zem. But Associated Press correspondent Mark de Rochford reported from the military "insecurity" zone in the foothills between Khentira and Kasba-Tadla.

"Almost all French colonists have abandoned this area, more than 150 miles wide where so much French blood was shed in the weekend massacres."

Not Enough Troops
"There apparently are no French troops over much of the region. There simply are not enough available for the job."

The forces I saw in the towns seemed alert for further cleanup operations in the countryside as they moved into the towns to search them. Meanwhile, they concentrate mainly on searching Moroccan houses for suspects and arms.

"Others protect the property of Frenchmen who have fled. Fighter planes buzz the thatched-roof Arab villages. All cars on the roads are formed into military convoys. Those French civilians who still remain in the towns have been armed by the authorities.

"A number of Moroccans were found shot yesterday between Ouad Zem and Kasba Tadla, but no estimate of their number was available."

In Casablanca, which was free of disorders for the moment, authorities were requisitioning all kinds of motor transport. A French Army Communiqué last night denied sabotage was involved in the plane crash in which Gen. Raymond Duval, commander of all French troops in Morocco, was killed Monday. Gen. Antoine French, military governor of the Casablanca area, has taken over command of the Moroccan situation.

Interior Minister Maurice Bourges-Maunoury, who supervises the administration of Algeria as part of European France, was expected to ask the government today to extend the emergency measures in that area to the western provinces of Algeria and Oran. The measures already in force in eastern Algeria, extend French police powers to that of a baby hawk. The hatching took place on the roof.

Japan Women Ired by Boys In Public Baths

Tokyo, Aug. 23 (AP)—Japanese women newly armed with the right to demand a revivification of the public bath. "Them, get out of the women's section," they are demanding.

Japan's 19,000 public baths—patronized by 70 million people—are divided into men's and women's sections. But at least 30,000 men, mostly young, are admitted to work in both sections. "The men, they are not only short as they scrub but they splash the water for their own pleasure," said a woman.

Complaints to Editor: A Tokyo housewife wrote to the editor of the big morning paper, Tokyo Shinbun: "Let's end this barbarian institution. Why can't these men be replaced by women workers?"

An unkind office girl complained: "We women simply can't stomach the ogling eyes of these males. Why do the police permit them to intrude into the women's section?"

"Nonsense," Shingo Muro, a 25-year-old bath attendant, asserted in a letter to the editor. "How can we give them what we want? Thousands of naked women. Do you think a cook gets a 20-cent tip every day of the year?"

He added sardonically: "For us, naked women are just checks. Only women with checks have appeal when you're on this kind of job."

A spokesman for the Japan Public Bath Assn., supported Muro. "Male bath attendants don't keep an unbecoming eye on the women's backs but double as boiler-men and scroungers of dropped. Their job isn't for any woman."

Baths spas are usually used and at spas as the historic Roman "verities" with a landscape painting behind the big steaming tub. Each hamlet, no matter how small, has its public bath.

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\$100,000 Loss Seen Inflicted At State Parks

Hartford, Aug. 24 (AP)—Connecticut's State Parks absorbed serious damage in the floods last week, with the monetary loss estimated in excess of \$100,000 and 100 individuals hospitalized, and seven locations closed to public use.

Most serious loss was the destruction of the State Park and the Peoples State Forest, Barkhamsted.

Four million evergreen seedlings, ranging from first year growth to 20-year old seedlings were destroyed when the Farmington River inundated the nursery.

The nursery area was washed away. Donald Matthews, director of the State Park system, said use of the same site as a nursery would require complete rebuilding of the area with soil. The commission may decide to establish its nursery elsewhere, he said.

Matthews estimated the value of the seedling at \$100,000. He said it will take four years for the commission to restore its tree-planting program.

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E. K. Post Is Protecting:

The Nostalgia of Burnap Farm

By JOSEPH A. OWENS

Andrew (Special) amidst the memorabilia of Burnap Brook Farm, perhaps the man who should be given credit for the evolution which took place in the clock-making industry in the early part of the 19th century.

But first, let's meet Mr. Post. He is the man who owns the peaceful rolling hills; the typical New England brook; the 500-acre Jersey cows and 100 sheep which make the farm.

The firemen are welcomed every year and Mr. Post enjoys watching the "redcoats" play a game of baseball on the hayloft. However, when commercial groups offer to pay for use of the farm for the purpose of holding an outing, Mr. Post does not hesitate with his refusal.

To say the gentleman is an oracle is false. There is no pretense or false pride. Unobtrusively Mr. Post says he is an indirect descendant of Daniel Burnap.

Immediately the conversation shifts to the imaginative creative genius who was born in Andover, Nov. 1, 1772. The world has more or less allowed his achievements to remain in the books and through unadorned, by florid phraseology, they are not untarnished by the passing panorama of time.

Time and the recording of it intruded Daniel Burnap. He was born on land adjacent this house," relates Mr. Post as he begins the story which seated in a comfortable rocking chair on the second floor of the 200-year-old farm house.

"Daniel Burnap was one of the original clock makers in the country. He served as an apprentice under Thomas Harland of Norwich and opened his own place in West Windsor.

The interesting fact about the man which is often overlooked is that Eli Terry served as an apprentice to Daniel and it was Terry who originated the quantity production of clocks. He believed Terry offered to make 5,000 clocks within a year. People said he was crazy, but he put his beliefs to practice and met the challenge.

Mr. Post feels that Burnap instilled the advantages of mass production in Terry during the latter's apprenticeship. This theory is shared by many timepiece authorities, including R. C. Morell of the Bristol Clock Museum.

would be impractical to station full-time Weather Bureau observers at every remote stream to measure rainfall and try to get out warnings. And meteorologists say that frequently there would be time to give the warning even if an observer were on hand.

One new project looks to far greater use of radar. The University of Miami will study improved methods of detecting rainfall on radar screens. Radar sets scanning a radius of 200 miles could spot extremely heavy rains or cloudbursts moving toward valleys and river headwaters where flash floods are likeliest.

Another difficulty last week was the failure to predict the course and intensity of the rains packed by Hurricane Diane. The Weather Bureau simply has had little experience on which to make precise estimates on rainfall above two to four inches in a day. Last week up to 17 and 18 inches of rain in less than 48 hours fell in a one-acre area.

Projects are underway for more research into atmospheric influences which push a hurricane this way or that. Other projects are exploring rain patterns within the 500-mile area of the hurricane itself.

These rain belts, highly variable, are now considered almost unpredictable. Some points within a hurricane area, for instance, get two or three times more rainfall than other points.

Another question forecasters will try to answer is why recent rains have failed to loosen their volume of rainfall once they move inland. Past experience had led to forecasts of a distinct loss of intensity.

A new warning center is being established at Hartford, Conn., to serve New England. Previously Harrisburg, Pa., had to serve the entire Northeast. More civilian part-time observers are being enlisted to make observations and get out warnings in some areas.

The Weather Bureau says that along the larger rivers where flood warning facilities were in use, such as the Delaware, its estimates on last week's floods were very accurate.
