Buenos Aires, Argentina, Aug. 31 (AP)—President Juan D. Peron offered to resign today. The response was a mass demonstration of strength by his followers who insisted that he continue in office.

The Peronist addressed his offer to the Central Confederation of Labor (CCT) and urged that his own Peronista party should be kept in power to receive and reject it.

The long message said: "The time has come to work hard and conscientiously to gain. I offer my resignation to the CCT. It is not possible to destroy what we have built. I do not believe it will happen. There will be no dictatorship. I have no taste for dictatorship. If that solution, someone else will have to do it."

Workers Get Orders First word of the message came in a broadcast by Hugo D. Peron, COT secretary, who summoned workers to the Plaza de Mayo in Plaza in other cities to remain there until the President withdrew his resignation.

Preparations for the massing of workers in Plaza de Mayo were under way in 15 minutes.







# Reconstruction- Life Must Go On



An artist's contribution . . . a poster to point up the dire need for funds to start again.

The unleashed waters of the great flood receded almost as rapidly as they accumulated but as soon as the artificial lakes and swollen rivers had disappeared, society immediately set about the task of recreating that which nature had deigned to destroy.

Shown here are illustrations of the remarkable recuperative power of organized man as he works to rebuild the communities of Torrington, Waterbury, Putnam and Naugatuck.

Obviously, most of the reconstruction is being done by industrial and municipal organizations, lone possessors of the machinery for mass rebuilding. The home owner, who is incapable of bringing to bear the heavy implements available to industry and government, has made little headway in his return to normalcy, 12 days after the great flood of 1955.

But, when the funds that have been pouring in to the various relief organizations are distributed, when the loans that have been offered by government are available and when new mortgages are forthcoming, then the small home owner will start on the road to recovery.

An interesting sidelight on the reconstruction fervor was provided by a free lance artist who traveled from New York City to Torrington to sketch a disaster poster he planned to offer to relief organizations engaged in soliciting funds.

His realistic portrayal of the horrible devastation was well calculated to serve the reconstruction program.

The work of the auxiliary police detachments who volunteered to bar all sightseers and non-essential persons from the disaster area was another vital contribution to the progress of reconstruction.




