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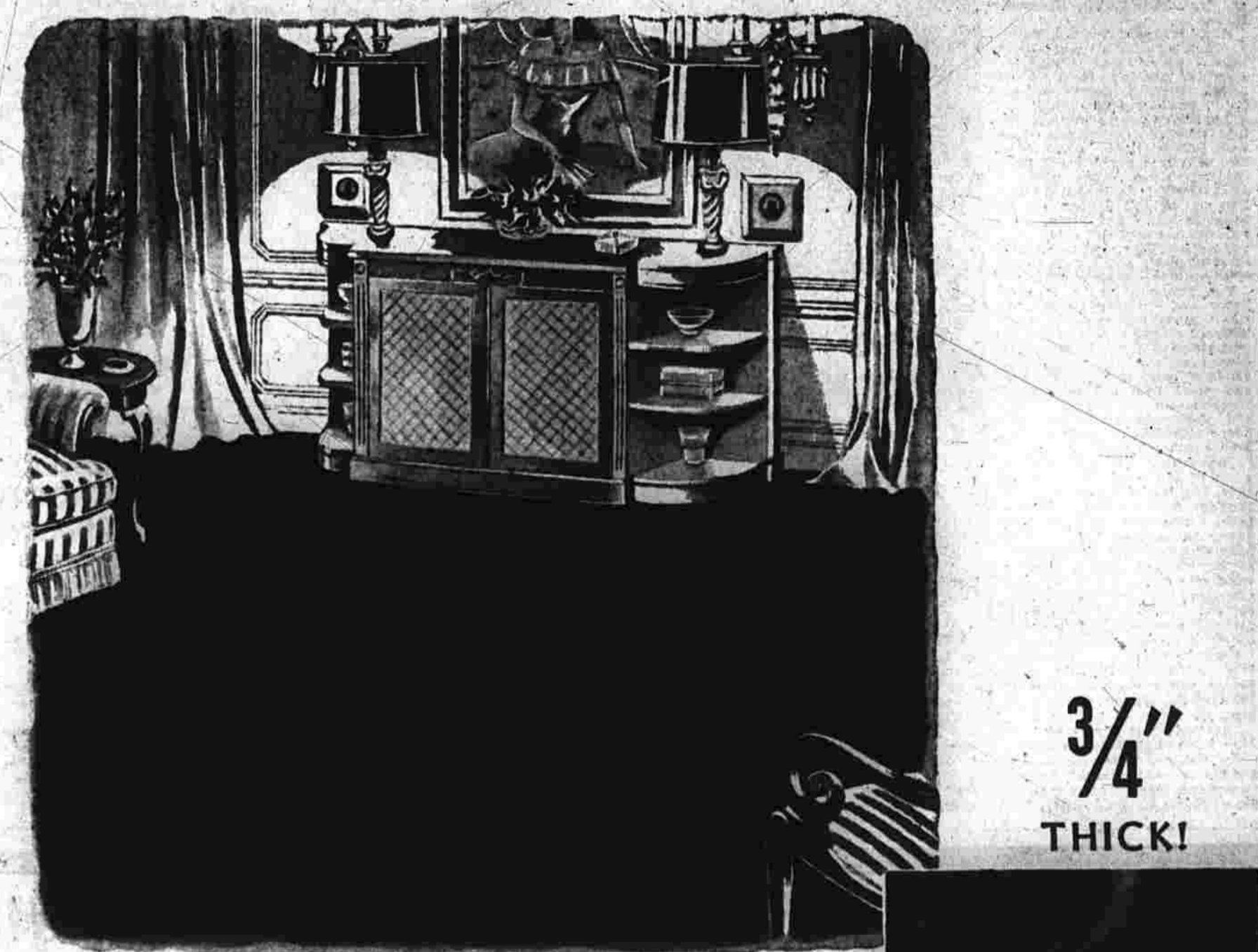
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Bridge-Brewer Wedding

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Wait and See, Says Townsend

London, Sept. 6 (AP)—"Wait and see" was the cryptic reply from Group Capt. Peter Townsend last night to questions about himself and Princess Margaret.

The 40-year-old Royal Air Force pilot was the center of attention at a cocktail party at the Belgian embassy because of long-standing reports linking him romantically with the 25-year-old sister of Queen Elizabeth II.

Townsend returned to Britain yesterday for the first time since last September. He flew here from Brussels, where he is British air attache, to attend today's opening of the annual Farnborough Air Show. He is to go back to Brussels Thursday, but will fly to London again Sept. 12 to attend the annual air attache conference.

Townsend's replies to questions by reporters at the cocktail party did not appear to dispel or confirm the rumors of Princess' romantic interest.

"Do you expect any startling developments during your visit?" he was asked.

"I hope to have a quiet three days in England," said Townsend. "I do not think there will be any startling developments as far as I am concerned."

Princess Margaret is vacationing at Balmoral Castle in Scotland with other members of the royal family.

of all the funds invested in the program will go directly to the college and universities selected by the award winners on the basis of their choice.

Stalnaker said the corporation's annual meeting will be held on September 15 at the New York and are earmarked for use in these ways:

The million-dollar fund will be spent at the rate of one million a year for four-year national model scholarships to high school students in the nation.

Each million-dollar fund will be used through a 10-year period over which contributions will be received from corporations and other donors for the purpose of establishing additional scholarships.

Two million-dollar funds will cover the costs of administration for a 10-year period and operating a nationwide selection process.

Stalnaker said each scholarship recipient will carry an annual stipend of \$1,000 and will be granted a college education.

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The first scholarship awards are planned for September 15, 1956.

Stalnaker predicted that within two years the number of students receiving such awards will be 100,000.

Storm Damage Set at \$7,511

An incomplete tabulation of damage done in public property in Manchester in the area of heavy rains and floods put the cost of repairs at \$7,511.
