Farm Issue To Be Fore
 Doneg the right thing in the
 present areas, takes place and
 imagination in the first place. And
 there can be a subsequent letting
 even more severe. If the policy of
 the present is to be maintained,
 the apparent discontent of a group
 of voters an important cam-
 paign approach.

The Eisenhower administration
 passed the first test when it suc-
 ceeded in getting through the
 program which made at least
 a beginning of the process by
 which all the taxpayers chip in to
 pay the nation's farmers for the
 surplus food they produce, so as to
 keep the price high for the needed
 well-being of the farmers, for the
 least pleasant high cost of living
 of the taxpayers.

But now, with a presidential
 election year coming up, the test
 is growing more severe. Farm
 prices have gone down some more.
 Perhaps, in reality, that is not
 the thing. But it doesn't seem
 to be the farmers, even those who
 thought, soundly enough,
 had led to do something about the
 disastrous cycle of paying
 ourselves to produce things for
 nothing but expensive federal
 aid.

The Eisenhower farm program
 may still be tight in principle. We
 think it must be. But the political
 temptation is going to be to
 scrap it nonetheless, and return
 to some artificial jacking up of
 farm prices, so the farm vote can
 be safe in 1956.

And this temptation shows its
 head in the campaign school of the
 National Committee is now con-
 ducting in Washington, the farm
 may be doing with the politi-
 cians, seeking for a defense, the
 main priority is already receding
 from the Democrats, who con-
 sidered it their first item of 1956
 campaign attack.

Will the Eisenhower administra-
 tion, in no hurry to do anything
 of its farm state political leaders?
 Will it retreat from principle to a
 campaign year expediency? One
 hopes not. At the same time, how-
 ever, although one hopes that the
 purely political solution will be
 avoided, it must be recognized that
 the farm situation is potentially
 serious, primarily because
 of the nation's farmers, with the de-
 crease of government subsidy and
 government control lessened, have
 plunged into what is sometimes
 called the "black market" of
 seeking to make up for lower
 prices by planting corn which in
 turn helps the price lower. This
 market and themselves, and al-
 though this might be considered
 their own fault, the consequences
 would blast through the whole
 economy. So to say that the farm
 problem needs no consideration
 and no adjustments is not
 sound. The hope must be that we
 do not, under election year pres-
 sure, simply go back to the old
 system, which was no cure, and
 which was building an eventual
 crisis of its own.

Canada Lightens A Complex
 Like many other Americans, we
 have a habit of looking to Canada
 for some of the virtues we find
 lacking in our own national con-
 duct. And frequently this is just-
 ified. The Swiss vaccine, for ex-
 ample, was a real contribution to
 safety, and without distress or
 controversy, rationing and price
 control accomplished during the
 war without black markets or
 hoarding. Communist spies un-
 derstood with efficiency and with-
 out hysteria, real Communist
 spies—and a brand of mellow
 spies—in foreign policy, all these
 things stand as examples of a
 maturity in the Canadian civi-
 lization a little different from our
 own.

So if, in advance, we had been
 told that the delegation of Russian
 farm experts was to visit both the
 United States and Canada, our ex-
 pectation would have been that it
 was a little different from our
 own. And there, for once, we would
 have been wrong. The Canadian
 States tour of the Russian delega-
 tion was almost completely with-
 out the kind of incident one might
 have expected. The welcome the
 Russians got was genuine, and
 warm, and human, and gave the
 Russians themselves their chance
 to play their roles, not as the
 emissaries of an inhuman dic-
 tatorship, but as human beings.
 In Canada, on the other hand,
 their progress has been one long
 incident of the wrong kind. They
 would be instructed to accept, short
 and mumbled, and even snubbed by
 officials of their own. And since many
 of them are in fact experts who do
 not feel responsible for politics or
 policy, their sense of injury has
 been raw and deep, made worse,
 one can add with some plausi-
 bility, by the fact that their welcome
 in America was so much more
 civilized.

We are not attacking or re-
 proaching Canada. Some things
 just happen, and sometimes a lot
 of little things, happening in
 make it seem that a whole nation
 has deserted its own typical mood.

Tobacco Relief
 Planned by U.S.

Springfield, Mass., Sept. 8 (AP)—
 The Federal Crop Insurance Corp.

Only Girls Would Be Born
 If human embryos could be
 treated hormonally as were the
 frogs, only girls would be pro-
 duced. Some of them might also
 be induced to have some male
 characteristics, to contribute the male
 share of fertilization to their
 offspring, which would not be changed into men.

In another report the famous
 geneticist, Dr. T. M. Sonneborn,
 and Myrtle Reinhart, and Ruth
 Dispell of Indiana University,
 described experiments with paramecia
 indicating that the older the
 parents are, the smaller the per-
 centage of vigorous offspring, and
 the smaller percentage of off-
 spring which is born alive.

They find evidence that aging
 brings about the breakage and re-
 arrangement of chromosomes, the
 carriers of heredity, on a large
 scale. This damage, which can be
 inherited, seems to be as large as
 that produced by high doses of
 radiation.

So far as humans are concerned,
 the experiments could possibly in-
 dicate two things:
 1. That the human race would
 suffer great harm if people mar-
 ried and reproduced at higher
 average ages than they do now.
 2. That changes in the chromo-
 somes brought on by aging might
 be a main cause of cancer. Cancer
 is mainly a disease of higher age
 groups.

 Possible by Genetics
