Heinrich von Brentano, West German foreign minister, stated the German position anew in a meeting at Spiridonovka Palace that lasted more than three hours. West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer emerged grim faced from the working session, without comment.

Von Brentano spoke after Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin said the Soviet Union is not holding any German prisoners of war but has in its custody 9,626 "war criminals whose

sentencing was a humanitarian act."






