Israeli Troops Hold Part of Truce Zone

(Continued from Page One)
A spokesman for the Israeli Foreign Ministry said in Jerusalem that the action was taken because of the "continued presence of two Egyptian military outposts in this territory made illegal" and because the Egyptians had demolished border markers Israel had put up in the area.
Col. Salah Gohar, Egypt's director of Palestine affairs, disputed Israel's claim to the territory and the Jewish nation's right to erect border markers. He also denied that Egyptians had pulled down the 21 white concrete pillars.
"If we had violated the armistice agreement, why did Burns send us a protest as he did to the Israelis?" Gohar asked.
He declared there are "no borders between Egypt and Israel," adding, "when Israel becomes a state, then it can start claiming to mark frontiers."
Burns reported that the Israelis had occupied a camp in the area used as headquarters for the Egyptian-Israeli Mixed Armistice Commission and detained Egyptian personnel there. The truce chief said the Egyptians, including one wounded man, later were permitted to return to Egyptian territory but that another wounded Egyptian was sent to an Israeli hospital.
An Israeli Army spokesman said the troops had entered the armistice commission camp "by mistake" and withdrew "as soon as the error was realized."
At Gaza, an Egyptian spokesman said today Egypt has requested an emergency meeting of the United Nations Mixed Armistice Commission to study Israeli occupation of the Negev desert demilitarized zone.
A U.N. official denied a U.N. truce observer was arrested by Israel when his armed forces occupied the demilitarized zone yesterday.
Francoise Giesonmagel, U.N. chairman of the Israeli-Egyptian Mixed Armistice Commission, said U.N. representatives in that area is Capt. Gehard Swedlund of Sweden and that Swedlund had not been arrested.
In Cairo, yesterday Egyptian authorities said Israel had arrested a Swiss observer.

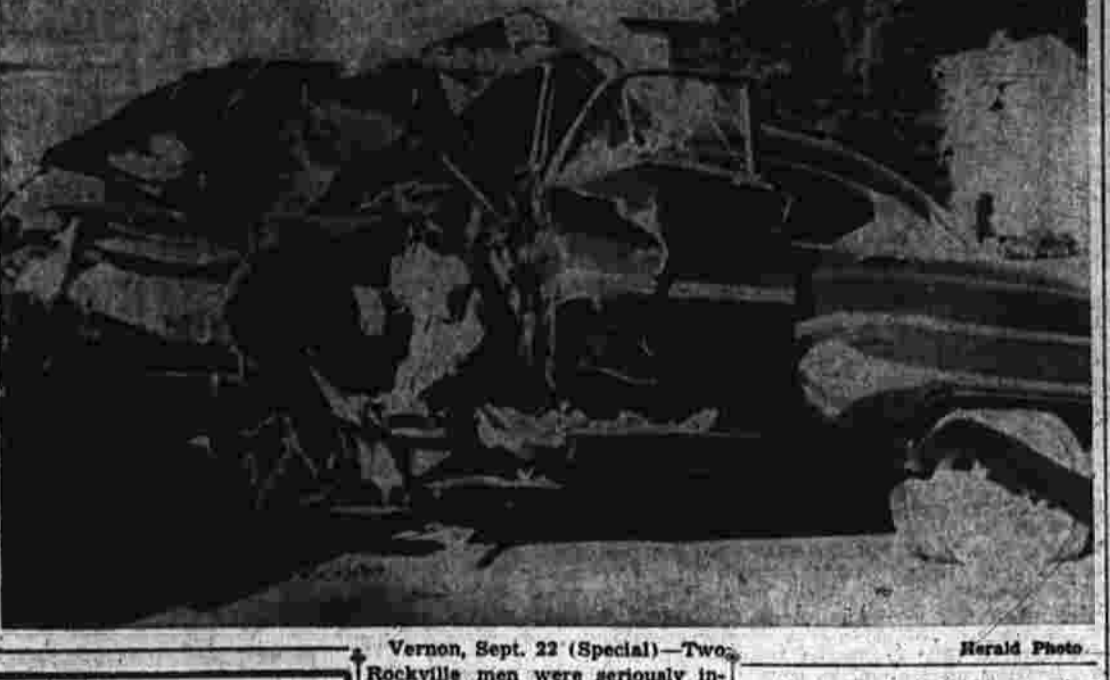
DOCTOR DENIES ABORTION
