### Rockville-Vetron Sgt. Trapp Resigns Force; Asks Oct. 9 Effective Date

Rockville, Sept. 26 (Special)—Sgt. George A. Trapp, who was appointed to his present rank by Mayor Frederick S. Berger on Aug. 21, announced his resignation to the Mayor yesterday. Sgt. Trapp asked that the resignation become effective Oct. 9 and the fact that he has been offered a position in private industry. He is a veteran of World War II, during which time he served with the military police and has been a regular member of the force since August of 1944. Prior to that time he served for a year as a supernumerary. The Police Department had been without a sergeant since last November, until the appointment of Trapp in August. Mayor Berger has made no public statement regarding the resignation.

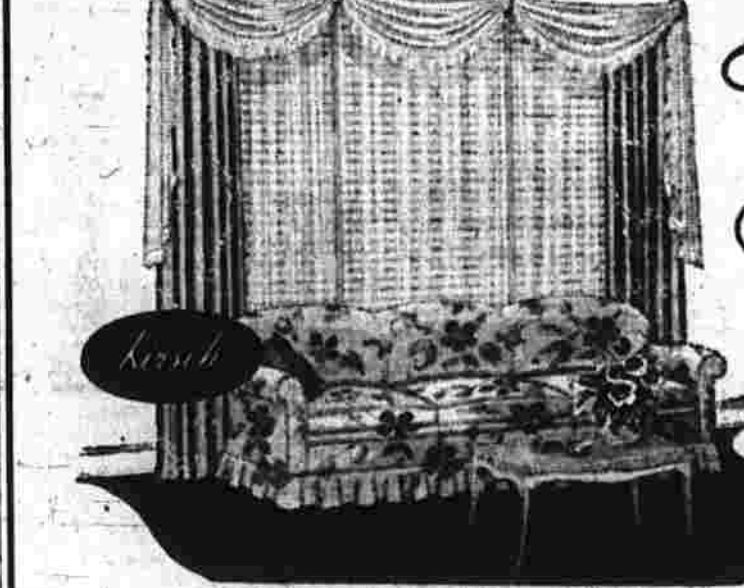

There's a "natural" look to much of the reasonably priced hardwood furniture in the stores today, as manufacturers concentrate on emphasizing the beauty of genuine hardwoods. They are using new finishes that reveal the wood.

The cabinetry has become less portland, with many furniture pieces sculptured, pegged or inlaid with contrasting woods. Today's furniture often looks as if it had been lovingly made and hand-finished by skilled craftsmen.

New finishes are generally warm in mood, and usually have a soft, dulled patina like fine old sterling silver. The glossy, mirror-like eyes finishes are rapidly disappearing.

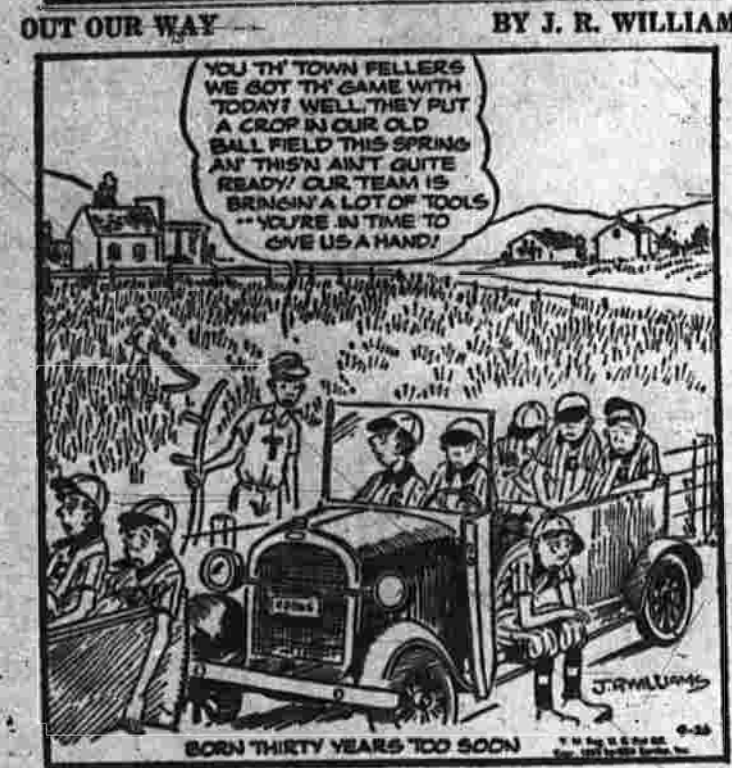

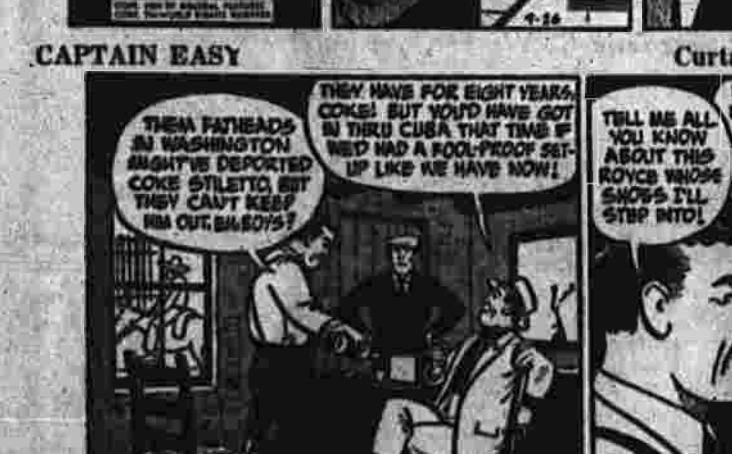
