Ike Aides Buoyed By Recovery Rate

Denver, Oct. 6 (AP)—Another cheering bulletin came from President Eisenhower's bedside today. He had eight and one-half hours of sound and refreshing sleep. A private opinion, which no one would put into words for quotation, was that the crisis has passed and that the President soon will be taking a river boat on administration policy.

Complete Exam Stated A complete examination is scheduled this weekend when Dr. Paul Dudley White returns to Denver. He will join the staff of presidential physicians for a thorough-going checkup on his patient on the eighth floor of Fitzsimons Army Hospital.

White, the noted heart specialist, will fly here Saturday with Sherman Adams, assistant to the President and his chief deputy in the wide field of administrative operation. Adams flew back to Washington yesterday for meetings of the National Security Council and the Cabinet.

The President, who will be 65 on Oct. 14, is doing so well that Adams no longer hesitates to report his progress yesterday, and initiated two documents requiring signature. Eisenhower signed four such papers yesterday, and initiated two others.

Adams left for Washington after a 10-minute conference with the President. But even Adams, who enjoys Eisenhower's confidence more than any other man in official position, limited his discussion to non-controversial matters with which the President was familiar before his coronary thrombosis Sept. 24.

The documents Adams asked Eisenhower to sign were recess appointments, subject to Senate confirmation later, for: Wesley A. D'Arment, former Republican congressman from Montana, to be assistant secretary of the interior; Francis A. Cherry, former Democratic governor of the State of Iowa, to be a member of the Subversive Activities Control Board.

John Edward Maloney, an Iowa Supreme Court justice, to be a judge of the U.S. district court at Waller, S. D.; Gordon Berkeley, Calif., to be governor of the Virgin Islands; and...

Guardsmen Take over Strike City

New Castle, Ind., Oct. 6 (AP)—Six hundred National Guardsmen clamped a martial vise on this strike-city today after a wild gun battle at the struck Perfect Circle Corp. foundry.

The foundry was set in after Mayor McCormack proclaimed a state of limited emergency in this eastern Indiana city of 18,000. The Guardsmen were heavily armed and equipped with tanks.

The tanks were two M48A1s from Greenfield, each carrying a 90-millimeter gun, two 30 caliber machineguns and one 50 caliber machinegun. A 3-man crew operated each tank.

Asked how they were brought here, the commander, Fire Chief John Orr, said, "We drove them in." One of the heavyweights wore the painted nickname, "McWillie."

Kate Killed 327 In North Viet Nam

Saigon, South Viet Nam, Oct. 6 (AP) — At least 327 persons were killed and extensive property damage was suffered when Typhoon Kate struck North Viet Nam, the Hanoi press reported today.

Bolton, Oct. 6 (Special).—A fire-fighting jamboree will open the celebration of Fire Prevention Week here Sunday when the local firemen will present a program at the Bolton Lake House beach. Beginning at 7 p.m. the firemen will put on enough demonstrations to delight anyone who has ever suspected a job to put in an alarm just to watch the equipment. Early announcements promise a full workout of the pumper truck when water will be drawn from the lake and pumped to the beach. Various types of nozzles will be used. A demonstration in extinguishing oil fires will be given. A rescue and first aid operation will feature use of the resuscitator and operation of the emergency generators will also be demonstrated.

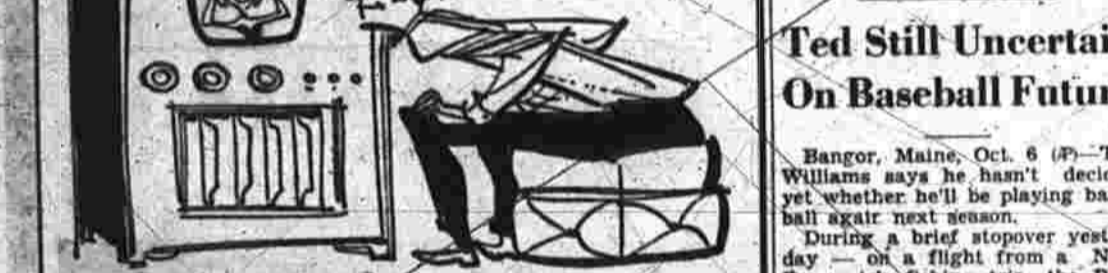

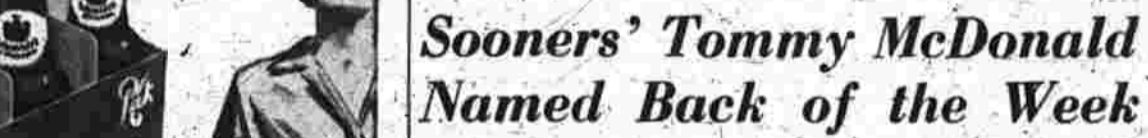

Climbers Hunt 66 Plane Dead

Laramie, Wyo., Oct. 7 (AP)—Skilled climbers fought bitter cold and winds on snow-covered mountain today to retrieve the bodies of 66 persons killed yesterday in the worst commercial air line crash in U.S. history. Their goal was the near-perpendicular south face of 12,000-foot Medicine Bow peak where a United Air Lines DC-6 crashed within an hour after leaving Denver for Salt Lake City and San Francisco.

The rescue party, which included 100 men and 100 pack animals, was organized by the United Air Lines and the National Search and Rescue Center in New York City.

Rescuers who struggled through deep snow and up the precipitous peak yesterday carried 66 bodies before rising winds and darkness forced their retreat. They descended to a base camp slightly more than a mile from the tragic scene.

The big 4-engine plane carried a crew of three and 63 passengers, including 17 Air Force cadets and two infants.

Among the 66 were five women members of the Salt Lake City Mormon Tabernacle Choir, which recently concluded a concert tour of Europe.

Also killed was burnette Patricia Shuttleworth, 21, of Trumbull, Conn., whose husband had been with the airlines since last March. A graduate of Harding High School in Bridgeport in 1951, she went to Hope College in Holland, Mich., for her education.
