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Overall Sidewalk Plan Favored by Board, TPC

In the first meeting of its kind, members of the Board of Directors and the Town Planning Commission discussed the whole problem of sidewalks in town last night.

The groups outlined a plan that would combine installation of sidewalks in vital areas in town into one major project. The project method of sidewalk construction is to consider a certain section of work at a public hearing and then decide whether to install it. The plan would eliminate much of the individual consideration of sidewalk locations.

During the discussion at the informal meeting, several questions were raised in connection with such a project.

Should the town continue to use concrete or use a cheaper asphalt construction? Both methods were almost unanimously approved to use of asphalt in place of concrete.

If the town should use the least expensive material, should the town stand the whole expense or continue present policy of assessing the property owner two thirds the cost?

Should the time of payment by the property owner be extended?

Shelkey Gives Costs

In discussing the type of sidewalk to be installed, James Shelkey, town engineer, presented the two types of walk. He said concrete would cost \$3.2 a square foot, or the cost of a 2-foot wide sidewalk would be \$6.40. Asphalt would cost about \$2.5 a square foot, and \$5.00 a running foot.

Shelkey said concrete curbing costs about \$1.70 a running foot, and strongly recommended its installation no matter which type of walk is used.

He listed several advantages and disadvantages of the asphalt-type walk. Besides being less expensive, this type could be laid almost anywhere, the town engineer said. However, the life expectancy of such a walk in the town is limited. It is estimated that it will last only about 10 years.

Another problem in connection with changing the town's policy of concrete walks would arise from the regulation that sub-dividers and developers must install concrete walks. If the town were to install asphalt, the developers would request a change in their regulations, as well as the members' fee.

Oppose Asphalt

Members of the Board of Directors felt that a change in policy would not be desirable. They felt that, besides deterring from the looks of the town, concrete in the long run would be much lower for the asphalt. TPC members were also unanimously in favor of keeping the present policy.

However, the town should decide to use the cheaper material. Members of both groups felt that it would be unfair to property owners who already paid for sidewalks in the town should stand the whole expense of the new walk.

The question of where to install sidewalks was discussed at length, with no definite decisions being made. Using a map of the town showing existing walks and areas showing key roads where no walks exist, Wilfred Maxwell, town planning commissioner, was

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Jose Ortega Dies; Noted Philosopher

criticism of Spanish regimes of various colors. He was originally regarded as a leftist, strongly opposed monarchy, and contributed through his earlier works to the fall of the late King Alfonso XIII.

He served in the continental assembly which drafted a new constitution and later was civil governor of Madrid. However, he became a strong critic of the republic which followed the monarchy.

He also opposed Franco's rule. Franco's regime after announcing the Franco-led revolution of 1936 which overthrew the republic. Ortega lived out the final years of his life in a sort of armed truce with the Franco regime.

Ortega delved into many fields beside philosophy and government. In 1949, talking to modern painters and their critics simultaneously, he declared in a magazine article that both were wrong.

Among his best known literary works were "The Theme of Our Time," "The Spirit of Letters" and "The Rebellion of the Juntas."

He professed republicanism and democracy all his life but his philosophy of vital nationalism was an inspiration for the German Nazis and ultra-nationalist elements.

An atheist and first advocate of non-church school in Spain, he was reported to have returned to the Roman Catholic Church on his deathbed.

One of the greatest humanists and philosophers of Spain, he was highly regarded by foreigners, especially in Germany, than by his own countrymen.

He was the son of Jose Ortega y Gasset, a Spanish newspaperman, who was born in Cuba.

Region Board Names Drakos For Architect

Andover, Oct. 18 (Special)—Louis J. Drakos of West Hartford, was named last night to design the Regional High School for Andover, Shelton and Marlborough by a unanimous decision of the Board in an executive session.

The regional school will be the first secondary school to be designed by the West Hartford architect.

When interviewed recently at a meeting in the Andover School, Drakos stated that he felt that he would be able to give the school close attention throughout, adding that he would be able to begin as soon as he was hired.

In designing the Coventry school, Drakos was able to prepare preliminary drawings in one month and working drawings in three months, he stated. He was presented with a clear-cut educational philosophy by the Coventry Board of Education.

Drakos also stated that the site under consideration presented no problem.

He had informed the Board that he would charge the standard fee listed in the architect's Blue Book.

While the West Hartford architect was more conservative in estimating the completion date of the school than the other three firms which were interviewed, he stated that enough classrooms could be completed for the 1957-58 school year if the gymnasium and auditorium were completed later.

Other decisions

The Regional School Board also decided last night on the following special facilities which would be required in the junior-senior high school in addition to classroom areas:

A double gymnasium (which would accommodate an ultimate maximum of 1,200 students) with seating capacity for 500-700 spectators; an auditorium with a seating capacity for 200-400, with a stage suitable for dramatics or choral work; a cafeteria which would seat 400 pupils at a time, with a consideration of other uses for the area; as well as the possibility of breaking the space into three or four smaller rooms.

Other special facilities included a library with open-stack shelving; and the possibility of a common-type room for a study area, included in the library or adjacent to it with storage space for audiovisual equipment and a room for student-activity functions; and health facilities for examinations, etc.

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No Noah We
 After he pitched on Ararat Noah didn't, as we have always thought, look out and see the mountains. He opened a window in the ark, and loosed a raven, and a dove, and not until the latter brought him back an olive branch did he begin to believe that the long storm had passed, and earth began to have hopeful signs. Still he waited, some days more, and finally he removed the covering of the ark, and looked, and behold, the face of the ground was dry.

Had we been writing Genesis, we would have had him look up at the sun, too.
 In any case, the way the sun would have looked to Noah, after his many days and nights, would have been about the same way a mere touch of sun looked, yesterday, to those portions of Connecticut it happened to favor. One did not have to be a flood zone resident to experience the happy surprise involved in seeing the first rays of sun after a storm of rain. The off-stage accompaniment of tinkling showers had slowed and measured the insistent fall of the rain, until it seemed far more than a matter of three days and nights. And when the sun did appear, for a moment, it was, quite literally perhaps, as welcome as it has ever been to man. Especially since Noah, who might have established the all time high moment in appreciation of the sun, never even noticed it.

The Low And The High
 Adlai Stevenson, a weakened speech up in Canada, advanced two reasons for not regarding the "Geneva spirit" as the answer to world problems.
 In one of his reasons, he was following a curious development which seems to be sweeping the ranks of all Democratic liberals. These individuals, the ones who were once distinguished because they might be too soft with Russia, are ones who used to specialize in the broad-minded attitude toward peace, here, at last, become the "tough guys" of our foreign policy debates, sounding, occasionally, very much like Senators McCarthy and Knowland, of the extreme Republican right.

Thus, in Canada the other day, Stevenson spoke of Geneva as if it were something of a Soviet plot by which Russia would still take the world, the only difference being that we relaxed into an Eisenhower world.
 The reason why Democratic liberals should fear into this kind of line are various. Most of them have indeed been accused in the past of being soft on Communism, and the situation of the moment, in which they might be expected to approve is actually happening, gives them a free chance to prove how tough they have been, all the time.

But primarily, we think the opportunity they cannot resist, from their own past background, of having been charged with being soft on Communism, is the opportunity of inferring that the Republican President has turned soft on Communism. If a Democratic President had ever had the statemanship or imagination to do what Eisenhower has done, we can be sure that these same Democratic liberals would be sympathetic with administration. But the opportunity to defend their own past reputations and wit a Republican President at the same time is too much for them. So, aside from McCarthy and Knowland, the leading critics of the Geneva Conference have been Democrats like Stevenson and, of all people, Senator Humphrey.

Essentially cute and political, dissent from the "spirit of Geneva" with another thought in which he really deals with fundamental, and delving into the deep realities of our world instead of skimming off a cheap surface advantage.

Some people, said Mr. Stevenson soundly, and almost in rebuke to his own first crack at Geneva, have become so obsessed with the cold war division of the world, with its species of Communism, that they think simple pleasantness between the Communists and ourselves solves basic world problems which would, even if Communism did not.

"But of course it isn't so," he said. "Communism feeds on, but does not create, all the friction and conflicts of our small world. Communism did not prevent the long breach between Russia and Yugoslavia. Communism has not reconciled East German workers to their norms. Communism cannot decide whether Russia or China should dominate the North Korean satellite. Communism does not change a Chinese rice deficit into a surplus."

The great revelation for independence of people which is sweeping the post-war world, and which is bringing so many problems which have been in full view, said Stevenson, still is occurring, and still needing solution. If Communism did not even exist, he said, in Communism responsible for many of the other strains and strains the world is facing.

Here, with thought tumbling over thought, Stevenson at once expresses the late Henry Stimson's wise warning, that the "problems of our world would still be with us and critical upon us even if there were no such thing as Communism, and bodily infers that some new force and content for the relations of nations, which can enable the world to meet these problems. Here his thought and opinion are sound. Here his charge that a Geneva can solve the problems of the world is valid, for of course it cannot. As best it can take the enemy between two halves of the world out of the way — an attempted solution of the problems of the world, it should have the basic claim upon our worry, and our effort. Anyway, in the same speech, he was the low, and the high of Stevenson.

Solutions We Can Take
 There are relatively comfortable ways out of the two difficulties now facing President Eisenhower's administration, plan and United States policy should be willing to take them.
 One cocoonery the make-up of the proposed Joint Commission for the new international agency in our draft proposal on this nation have been divided into "movers" and "stayers", nations with those who currently can be classified as atomic powers, in their own right dominating the board. Besides, in the atomic world, any classification of nations on the basis of whether they have atomic energy resources at the moment would be a fragile thing, subject to continual change as the discovery of new sources of fissionable materials progresses throughout the world.

We should be willing enough to broaden the membership of the proposed agency's board of governors.
 The second difficulty the Eisenhower plan is facing comes from a disagreement over the proposed agency's relation to the United Nations. The President originally made the proposal to the United Nations, to be a United Nations program.
 Thus, as the lines sought on, our policy makers began shaping the proposed agency more as an American than a United Nations agency. We have said at least that we are afraid that, if the proposed agency were directly tied to the United Nations Security Council, the Soviet veto power would ruin it. This seems a false fear, particularly in the present diplomatic era, when the real race between East and West is to see which can win credit for doing most for peace.

But if our fear of the Security Council veto is genuine, we can at least make the proposed agency definitely subordinate to the United Nations General Assembly.
