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Rockville-Vernon Envelope Co., Union Agree On Pay Hikes, Benefit Plan

Rockville, Oct. 19 (Special)—Employees of the White Corbin Division of the United States Envelope Co. last night unanimously voted to accept the terms of the contract offered by the company to the newly-formed independent union here.

The contract runs for a period of two years with the privilege of reopening on wage rates after one year. The agreement calls for substantial increases in wages, improved sickness and accident benefits, an additional paid holiday, funded pension plan, and a union shop.

Under the terms of the union shop, new employees have 30 days to join the bargaining agent, while present employees have six months.

This is the first time in Rockville's labor history that a factory has adopted a union shop arrangement.

Wage increases of 7 cents an hour have been given all employees.

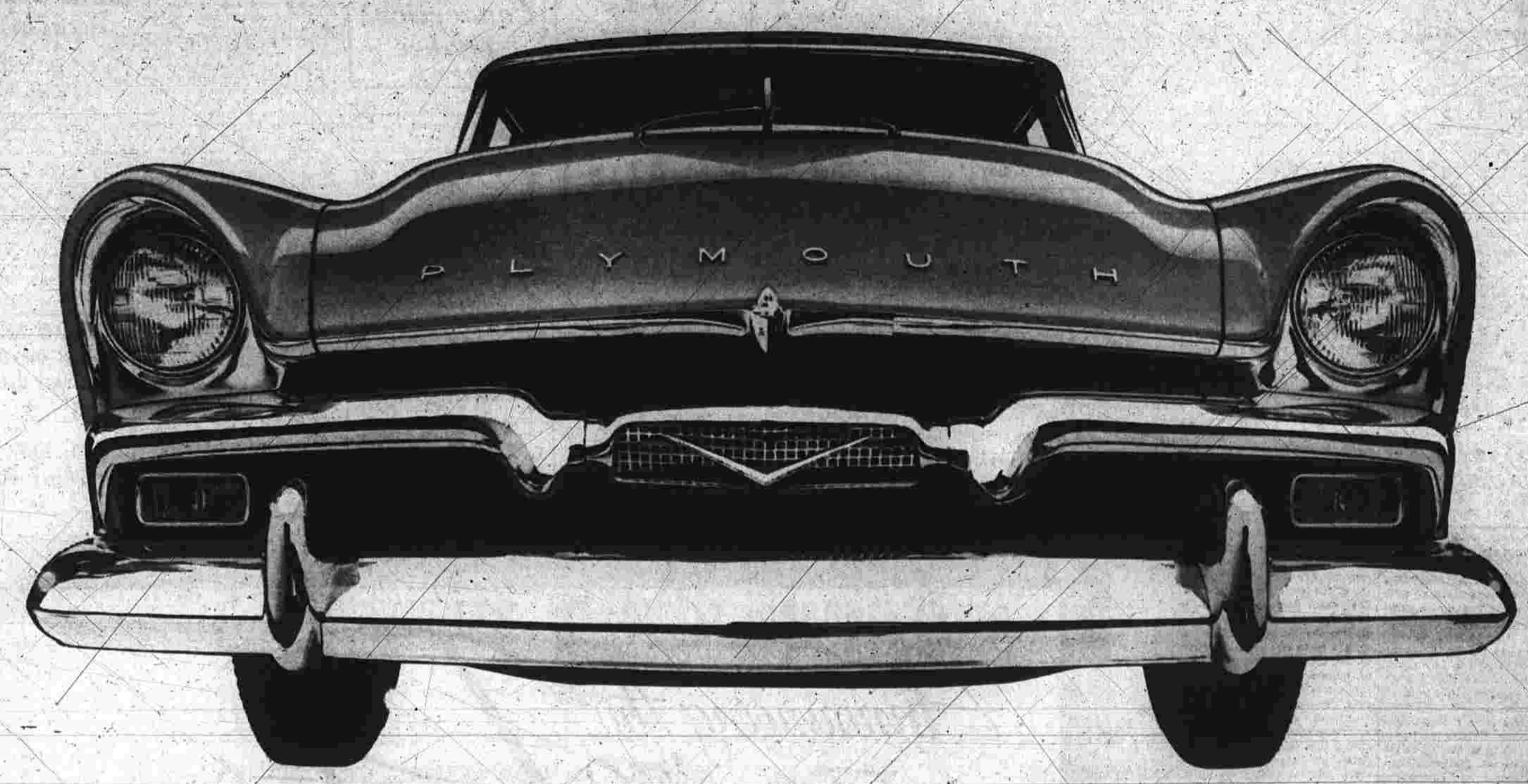

Breakdown of Scout Funds Given to Adult Volunteers

A summary of the money being used and why it is needed by the Manchester Girl Scout organization was given by Mrs. Alfred B. Sundquist, treasurer of the Manchester Girl Scouts, Inc., at a meeting of adult volunteer canvassers for the home-town campaign Tuesday night in St. Mary's Episcopal Church.

The Girl Scouts have set a goal of \$5,000 for their annual drive for the next week, and Mrs. Sundquist stated that from the latter part of September to Oct. 1, 1955 a total of \$9,067 was spent.

Break down into percentages, how the money was used, she stated that 65 per cent of the funds were used to pay an executive director and maintain an office in the home-town camp. This is done in order to give a central place for the Girl Scouts, and to give a place where they can be seen and heard. From this office, traveling for new leaders, and the cost of new uniforms, records of all the girls and adults in the organization are kept, and the executive visits troops and gives assistance wherever she can, and she has been many extra hours to help those who need her capable assistance.

Cost of the Camp
Of the total the highest percentage, 20.3 per cent, said Mrs. Sundquist, was used for camp. The greater part of which was used for the day camp at Camp Merrimack. Last summer 202 girls spent two weeks at Merrimack, at a cost of \$9.27 per girl for a two week period, about two thirds of this cost being paid by the girls themselves. During the year of the year Merrimack is open for all troops, for overnight camping and leaving outdoor skills. The money to keep it open comes from the budget.

Smaller percentages, continued Mrs. Sundquist, were used for the balance of the fund. 21.2 per cent on insurance, mostly on materials for the finance drive; 2.5 per cent for training of leaders at different times and at different places during the year; 2.5 per cent for turning to Manchester filled with new enthusiasm and ideas for the entire program and 1.6 per cent for program. Of all the funds raised, only a fraction of 1 per cent is spent outside of Manchester.

Explains Hike in Budget
Concluding her talk, the treasurer showed why the budget has increased: in 1951 the Girl Scout organization spent a total of \$40 per girl for keeping an office for about 1,000 Girl Scouts, and no more than \$10 for the same number of girls. It is necessary to have more money because of the increase in Girl Scouts.

Mrs. Robert Johnson, speaking as an experienced troop leader, experiences and also the fun she has had watching her girls grow.

Executive director Jean Campbell, talked about the day camp, showing that camp is one of the most concrete evidences of where the money is spent. Each summer between 250 and 300 girls attend the day camp. Much of the summer is accomplishing the aims of the Girl Scout program where a leader is working with them five days a week in a natural outdoor setting.

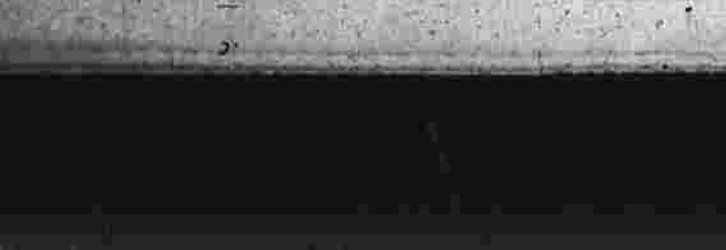

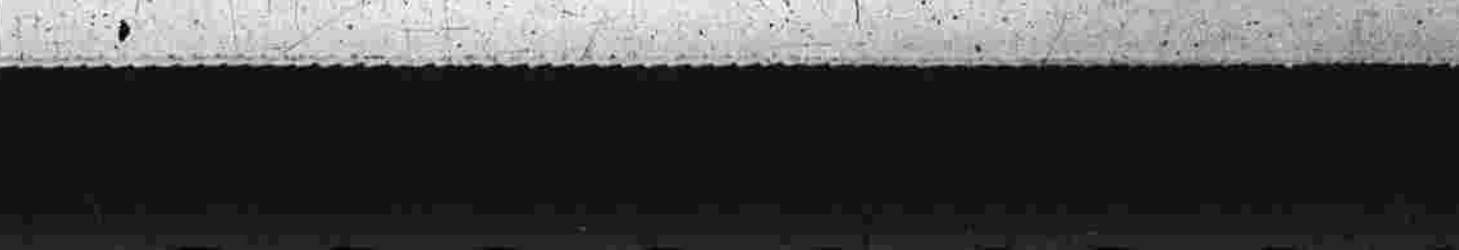

Brown, who is the son of Mrs.
Minnie Brown, 33 Edgerton st.,
attended Manchester schools and
graduated from Springfield Col-
lege in 1941, shortly before being
named Manchester recreation di-
rector. He later returned to
Springfield and earned a master's
degree.

coach, besides being athletic di-
