Planner Receives Statistics During Area Board Session

### Bolton

#### Voters to Consider Petition Thursday at Town Meeting

Bolton, Oct. 25 (Special).—The special town meeting Thursday in the Community Hall at 8 p. m. will consider seven proposed ordinances for local government. Although they have divided no official comment, public reaction indicates a good attendance should be anticipated.

The request for a speed limit of 35 miles per hour on all town roads is understood to be aimed at better control of speeding within the town. No local speed law exists which can and perhaps has created some interesting technicalities in court.

The limitation of \$100 on the amount that may be expended for capital improvement or equipment purchases without seeking bids has been vigorously attacked by some citizens. They point out that all but two of the ordinances sought would in one way or another increase taxes and that the low limit set on this one would definitely prohibit acceptance of roads that do not connect with others within the town.

Prohibiting acceptance of roads that do not connect with others within the town will perhaps not receive argument. The one would block the acceptance of roads into the town road system which require travel over another town's highway for access.

Landowners it is reported, do not like kindly to the proposal that an ordinance be created preventing issuance of a building permit on any street that has not been accepted by the town. The moderator of the annual town meeting, Robert E. Horton, noted that this proposal could not be considered at that meeting.

Called upon for his opinion, L. P. DeMars pointed out that this type of legislation would put an added burden on the town's highway expense. If developers were required to bring a new street up to acceptance standards before any construction could take place on abutting land, he said, the new road would soon have been down under the traffic of heavy trucks, bulldozers and other equipment used in the building construction.

The last ordinance requested would prohibit planting shrubs or trees within 15 feet of the traveled portion of any highway or in a position which would obstruct vision of a highway. Two other ordinances would prohibit use of the town garage for storage or repair of privately owned equipment except while in the employ of the town and would require that all expenses of the town be listed in the annual report by check number including the name of the payee and reason for payment.

Public hearings will begin its public hearings on Thursday for declaration of tax lists by special town meeting Thursday in the Community Hall at 8 p. m. All real and personal property owned on Oct. 1, 1955 must be declared to the assessors on or before Nov. 1.

Hearings on Thursday, Friday and Saturday will be held at the Community Hall from 3 until 5 p. m. The same hours will apply on Monday, Oct. 31, the last day for filing. A 10 per cent penalty is added to any lists not declared before the deadline.

Private sessions will be held for local farmers this evening by appointment. This is the first year this provision has been made by the Board for the farming group. Sessions for business will be held on the fourth day tomorrow night, also by appointment.

## Britons Get 20% Sales Tax Boost

London, Oct. 26 (AP)—Chancellor of the Exchequer R. A. Butler today ordered a 20 per cent increase in purchase (sales) tax to curb Britain's home spending and force more of her goods into overseas markets.
