Sultan Returns To Morocco as Unrest Grows

Rabat, Morocco, Nov. 16 (AP)—Once-exiled Sultan Mohammed V. returned to his Moroccan homeland today to receive a triumphal welcome.

The 41-year-old Sultan came flying back with the avowed purpose of creating a constitutional monarchy and getting a large measure of home rule in negotiations with the French government.

The French joined in the preparations for the welcoming party. The Sultan was escorted by 32 French fighter planes which swept overhead as he landed in bright sunshine.

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Graham Facing Murder Charge In Plane Blast

Denver, Nov. 16 (AP)—John G. Graham, 23, baby-faced father of two children, will be arraigned on a murder charge tomorrow in the dynamiting of a United Airlines plane.

The blast killed Graham's mother and 48 other passengers.

The state moved swiftly to prosecute Graham yesterday after U.S. Atty. Donald Kelley filed the case over to Denver's Dist. Atty. Bert Keating for filing of murder charges.

A murder complaint against Graham was signed yesterday by W.A. Patterson of Chicago, president of the air line. Keating said he would ask death in the gas chamber for Graham, who operated a drive-in restaurant with his mother.

The complaint specifically charges Graham with murdering his mother, Mrs. Daisy E. King, 54, who lived with him in Denver. He is charged with murdering her for \$37,500 after she had taken the fatal flight Nov. 1.

Argentina Strikes Crippling Industry

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Israel Lists Protective Arms Need

Washington, Nov. 16 (AP)—Israel's Ambassador Abba Eban today submitted to the State Department a list of defensive arms his country seeks from the United States to balance Communist arm shipments to Egypt.

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### Cheneys Still Use Planer Almost 100 Years Old

It may be called "The Wreck" but it couldn't be called a rambler. For the "open side planer" affectionately called this name by workers has been owned by Cheney Bros. for 60 years and may have been covered by only one other firm since it was built in 1857.

The planer is the only one like it ever seen by Raymond Goslee, Cheney plant engineer, and was used "night and day" during World War II to machine propeller stands for Hamilton Standard.

The propeller company had searched far and wide to find machinery which could perform a special operation on the stands.

Cheney Bros. asked by "The Wreck" was the only firm which could do the job, according to David Wilson, Cheney Bros. maintenance foreman.

The old machine stands about 10 feet high, has a bed on which work may be placed 10 feet long, and can machine work about 30 inches high. Late in the afternoon it is intended to take material off flat surfaces, but it works on metal instead of wood.

**Material Travels**

Another difference from the carpenter's planer is that the material being formed travels back and forth rather than the cutting tool.

Perhaps the best way to visualize "The Wreck" in operation is to picture a man standing at one end of the bed to which the material to be machined is clamped. The bed will move away from him and then toward him in regular manner.

About two-thirds of the way from one end of the bed the tool bit is suspended on a curving frame over the work to be done and can be adjusted up or down.

The tool bit takes a "chip" or cut as the work passes under it and then moves slightly to our observer's left or right to take another cut. In this fashion, the whole surface of a piece of work may be lowered by a series of long narrow cuts.

Machine pieces 20 feet long and up to 30 inches high may be handled in the planer.

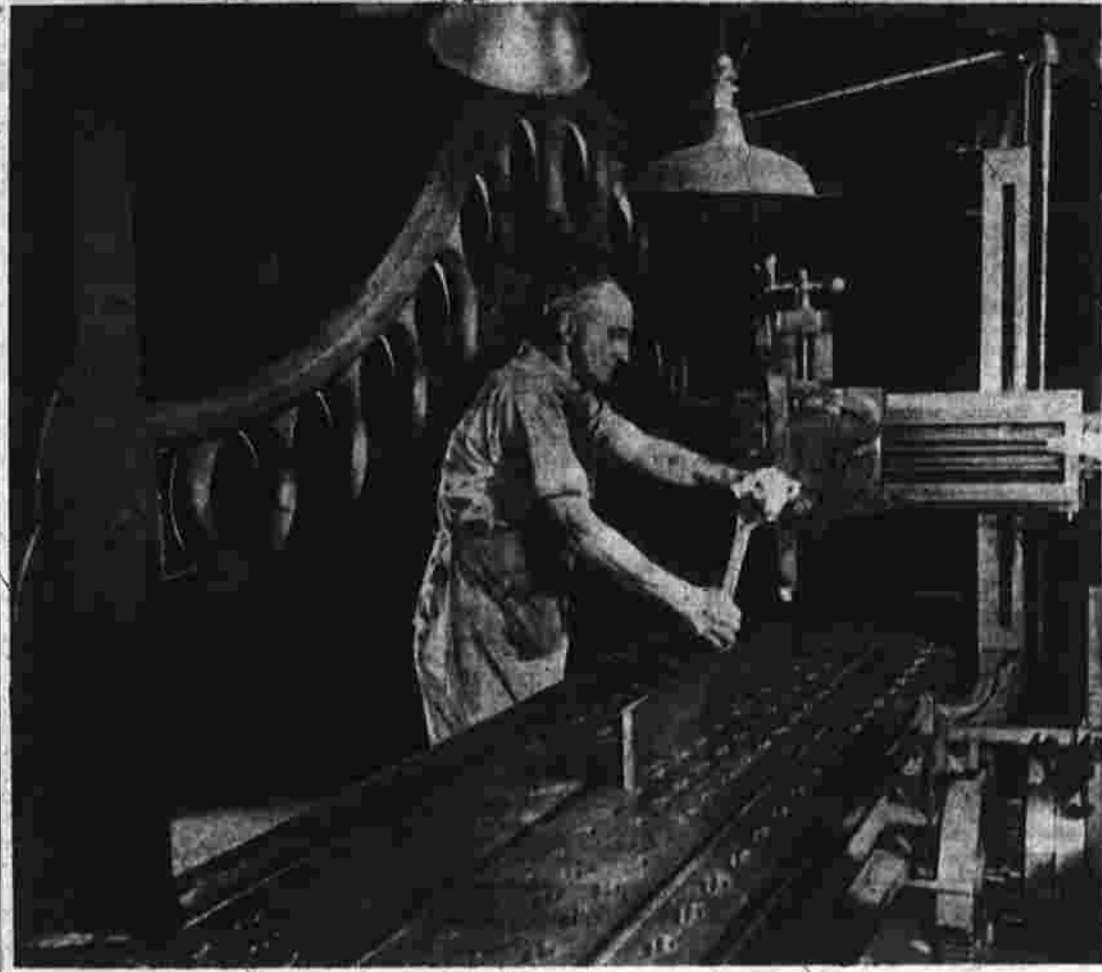
Last anyone get the idea that "The Wreck" is not a servicable machine, it can still work to accuracy of .002 to .003 of an inch. Pretty good for a planer probably 98 years old.

Purchased in 1895, Cheney officials feel the machine was probably built in 1857, for that is the date on a plaque on the side. The maker's name, stamped on the tool supporting frame, is G. Vanborn, Springfield, Mass. Cheney Bros. purchased the planer from the Springfield Tool Co. in 1895, inventory records at the textile firm show.

It gained the nickname of "The Wreck" because, to modern machinists, all the dials and controls seem to work in reverse. But they still work efficiently, and the machine has been used recently on various Cheney Bros. maintenance projects.

Among company officials, the idea seems prevalent that the planer was most useful when the firm made a number of velvet looms in 1914 and 1916 and when the war work was done during the 1940s for Hamilton Standard.

Goslee said the textile firm is

Prime Minister Nehru, who will be on hand to signal the start of the pouring of concrete, describes the undertaking as "the temple of modern India and its will to develop."

India is footing the total bill, American engineers, led by Harvey Hecox of Alhambra, Calif., have been employed by the Indian government as advisers. Some 30 to 40 American engineers assisted in the preliminary construction and planning in the past three years.

### Forgers of U.S. Checks Never Had It So Good

Commercial checks he claims to have passed in all 48 states.

This is a dramatic but not an unusual case.

Every year the Secret Service investigates cases where crooks have actually succeeded in passing photostatic copies of federal checks.

They also find people who use old pension checks from agents who have stolen them.

A government check is as good as gold—provided it is endorsed by the person who is entitled to it, emphasizes Chief Baughman. "But one with a forged endorsement is as worthless as any forged personal check, and the person who cashed it is the loser."

"Counterfeiters and check forgers must fool somebody to make a profit. Storekeepers and cashiers who cash checks without proper identification of the holders are often to blame.

"Only with their full cooperation and the aid of local police departments, can the Secret Service hope to reduce and prevent these crimes which are aimed at the pocketbook of the average citizen."

Lighthouse Waits Decades for Paint

Cape Elizabeth, Maine (AP)—Off-photographed, off-painted and nearly 165 years for its own new coat of paint.

The famed lighthouse, a pioneer U.S. public works project, was painted when it went into service in 1791. Periodically ever since, it has been whitewashed. The expensive process was right in line with the fragility attending its erection, when President George Washington ordered the 80-foot tower built of local field-stone and brick by Portland-area stonemasons.

Not long ago science developed plastic vinyl weather-resistant paint, since adopted to coat aids to navigation. Coast guards reported that the weather-resistant paint had received a "thumbs up" from the U.S. Navy.

Near the end of September several health in Wisconsin reported they had received, for either \$83.27 or \$103.27, they had been checked in the market.

The checks were crude and obvious counterfeits. On the lower corner of each, for example, it said, "The First Federal Reserve Bank, Washington, D. C." There is no such bank.

One Signature Authentic

The only part of the check that looked authentic was the signature of Treasury Secretary George Humphrey.

It was a beautiful reproduction of his name, says one of the agents who worked on the case. "But anybody should have been able to spot that check as a fake."

By searching the handwriting files of the Milwaukee police department, agents figured the check had been written by Jack Harvey Raymond. He has escaped from prison two years before while serving a life sentence mostly for forgery.

When another Lou J. Ames check was laid down in Minnesota, warning circulars were sent out to super markets in the entire western area where it was thought he was heading. They described the check and the suspect.

Raymond is now on trial. His printing presses and equipment were subsequently found in Belle Fourche, S. D., along with 89 counterfeit checks, and several hundred.

### Canada Curbs Speed on Road To Cut Deaths

Ottawa, Nov. 16 (AP)—A Canadian Press survey shows that provincial governments are tightening up on traffic regulations in a drive to cut highway deaths. Some areas report the program already paying off.

Each province is cracking down on drivers under existing legislation and some are enacting new highway codes.

Quebec's Highway Department says driving records improved greatly in the province during the past two years—a period of stepped-up enforcement and an educational program. A provincial traffic safety advisory committee was appointed last summer to make a continuing study of the problem.

The chairman of Saskatchewan's traffic board, J. A. Christie, says the most important single factor in cutting highway accidents in Saskatchewan is our system of driver licensing control.

Saskatchewan drivers are issued a white license. A first series of license calls for revocation of the white license and issuance of a red permit. A second major violation brings suspension of any driving permit. Minor violations call for a blue license to be substituted for the white license. If a motorist pays on time blue violations, he loses the right to drive.

Ontario is carrying out a strict campaign against traffic violators in accidents in a 12-month period. Police are conducting a spot check of vehicles on all Ontario highways.

Quebec officials say their most effective legislation is cancellation of driving permits. Motorists in Quebec can lose their permits for exceeding the speed limit.

Newfoundland puts emphasis on strict speed laws and tight enforcement.

Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island stress safety education and enforcement.

### Better Safe Than Brilliant

To many Americans, including many who didn't even vote for him, the pronouncement with which Adlai Stevenson, in 1952, finally accepted the nomination of the party for the presidency were imposable because they seemed deep, noble statements of truths deeper than politics. Their words, miraculously, both spontaneous and sincere. In all American politics, with the possible exception of the Lincoln-Douglas debates, there has been no man who said more. Still, he was badly beaten.

It is a mark of the evolution of American democracy that one suspects that the United States and the world have already paid some price for the incapacity of President Eisenhower.

At least this can be said: If there had been any chance that American diplomacy would have been an imaginative, pliable resourceful operation, that chance would have had to come from those touchstones of integrity which only the President has proved capable of giving to American policy. Throughout his service as President, the routine political conclusions of his administration have been lacking in distinction and they have often been dangerous. He has been the one who, often by a solo decision, has broken this routine.

At Geneva, a conference supposedly being held to exploit the opening the President himself believed at Geneva last summer, American policy has been so routine it has sounded like a broken record. The inference is that, without the President himself actively at the helm, his administration has lacked either the talent or the courage to do more than grind along on fixed positions. If to its credit, it may at least have thought of plays and policies which might have been its initiative, it probably hesitated to try to burden the convalescing President with the task of considering and approving such decisions, or contributing his own typical brand of play or policy.

The result is a little bit of American diplomacy had by beautiful ideas without any quarterback at all. Our strategy at Geneva, on this 10-year line, has been the straight propaganda plunger and nothing else. Pursuing this strategy, we have been thrown for a loss, and there is an unhappy suspicion that, as the conference is ending, the opposition is in possession of the ball. As the whistle blows at Geneva, the opposition hasn't scored either. But that doesn't alter the regret over the fact that we might have scored, and didn't.

# Nelco Tool Co. Ranks Fourth in Country In Manufacture of Carbide-Tipped Tools

By ALEXANDER GIBRELL  
Back in the early 20s a couple of men associated with General Electric were in Germany and they overheard a conversation between a couple of men connected with the Krupp interests.



The Americans became aware from what they heard that the Krupp, like GE, were well along the road toward the development of what they hoped would be a synthetic diamond for industrial use. The two industrial giants got together and formed a cartel, dividing the sales field. Neither succeeded in making an artificial diamond, but the outcome of long research was tungsten carbide, a combination of tungsten and carbon in a cobalt binder. It is not so hard as diamond but it is harder than any speed steel.

That, in a way, was the beginning of Nelco Tool Co. Inc. That firm, located behind Center St., between Elm St. and Poplar St., cost \$1,000,000. It is the nation's largest carbide-tipped cutting tools. Some of its products are on display this week at the Manchester Trade Center. The chapters in the story of tungsten carbide began in 1914 when Nelco Tool Co. formed in 1941 when Nelco Tool Co. turned its back on the war effort. Its hardware and machinery were needed for turning out shells. Four men were active in Nelco early years and they are still active. They are: Thomas Hollis Jr., president; Louis B. Main, vice president; Robert Bartlett, treasurer and engineer; still are.

When the firm first started it was not a manufacturer; it merely acted as a jobber. But as World War II progressed, it became possible to manufacture carbide-tipped machinery; so Nelco set up a plant by the Gowanus Canal in Brooklyn. Within a short time the company needed more space. They commenced buying land in distance from their suburban home in John's River, N. H. The plant that took up from 12 to 15 hours their day, the owners set out for a new location and settled on Manchester.

Moved here in 1947 in the middle of a recession and the move took seven weeks. One of the two they had planned. But the first year they had planned in Manchester, Hollis says, was the first year they made a profit. From the time Nelco established in town, its history has been one of expanding its plant. In 1950, Nelco added to the building for office space. In 1953, it completed its third addition and now has a 2,500 square feet of floor space.

Merrillville, in 1953, Nelco bought out Modern Tool Co. in Berlin and now operates that plant. Some 50 workers are employed here and about 20 in Berlin. The firm has four salesmen who try to interest industries in Nelco's durable carbide-tipped tools. Hollis named seven large aircraft companies which are Nelco customers and noted with amusement that United Aircraft, the closest aircraft firm geographically, not among the seven.

Other plants which buy in volume from the local firm include IBM, Remington Rand and GM. Full Special Orders  
Nelco does special order work from time to time for such local firms as ABA, The Newton Electric, Spencer Rubber, Newton Co. and Carley Johnson. Mai Tool is an "out of the catalogue" buying customer.

## Board Schedules Hearing Date on Budget Reports

Additional appropriations to the county budget totaling \$14,448 will be the subject of public hearings Nov. 23 at a special meeting of the Board of Directors.

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# 24 Channels Without Trying: Elington Electronic Wizard Lives in World of Gadgets

By RON DEVINE  
Killing is (Special) — How would you like to live in a world of gadgets? Or a 400 degree counter? Or even an electronic device that will pick up and amplify sounds from as far as a quarter mile away?

Sound like something from Buck Rogers or science fiction? Well, that's not entirely correct, because all these things can be found in a little white building hidden away on a lonely hill on Long View St.

Spans Cade's Paradise  
The establishment is owned by a soft-spoken electronics engineer named Alfred C. Denison, president of the Denison Electronics Corp. But the building does look more like a space cadet's paradise than a manufacturing plant.

It's a space building with a myriad of antennas on the roof and large cables supplying electric power connected to it. To the rear of the building is a high steel tower, and on the ground around it several complex-looking aluminum tube antennas.

Adjacent to the building is an observatory. About the size of a silo, it has a 14-inch refractor. The 1,400 pound dome measures 14 feet across, and rotates on 34 roller bearings.

It may seem out of place for an observatory to be located at an electronics establishment, but Denison is working on an electron-ic look-see that he hopes will increase the telescope's power to point beyond that of the largest optical telescope, which has a 200-inch refractor.

Built Plant in 1949  
Denison built the small plant in 1949, just four years after he set out on his own in the electronics field. He says he's been interested in the subject ever since.

He received much of his training under the official training of the original television research. He also attended schools in Washington, D. C., and during World War II he was an engineer in the aircraft industry.

Right now Denison has a staff of three men working with him. Most of their work includes high-ly specialized installation and maintenance of radio towers all over New England and in New York and New Jersey. They also build and install custom-built high-identity and television systems.

Among their clients are radio commentator Lowell Thomas and magazine illustrator Bernard Lambert. His employees, Roy, Cushman, Richard Gouling and Leonard Bece, all of Elington, received much of their training on the job, Denison says.

These men's main job is to help turn over, either because it takes a couple of years before a man can learn the job well. "I am responsible for most of the basic research that goes into their products. And, he adds, much of this research is done in the few hours at the night and morning.

Set Eliminates Commercial  
Set Eliminates Commercial. One of the things Denison developed through research that is now being manufactured by his firm is a radio receiving set that eliminates commercials. It is used largely by supermarkets to supply music for shoppers.

He also has a set that lets you turn off everything except the commercials. On this one, you can turn the program down or off, but you can't get the commercials, no matter how hard you try.

He didn't say whether or not the commercials would come through even if you smash the set, but you'd have to do a pretty thorough job, because it takes only one tube to perform. Denison says his products must be perfect before production is started. He says that if he plans to start at the same location during the expansion program he will replace "I'm not going to move for anything or anybody, I like it here."

He didn't choose his location, however, either. It took two years of testing with special equipment before he decided to settle on Long View Hill.

The mechanical, easy-going engineer explained that although there are higher hills in the area, none are as good for television and radio reception as his location. The reason is that the other hills have radio waves in them, while he is situated, on land that is mostly granite base.

The wisdom of his choice is born out by the fact that he regularly receives 24 different television channels on his sets. There are only a couple dozen such "hot spots," as he calls them, in the State.

# New Assessment System Adopted by Commissioners

After another long discussion last night, the Board of Water Commissioners voted to assess the costs of a sewer installation for the water department.

Homes in Hilliard Estates benefit from the pumping station but no assessment is ever made and none can be made until the property is included in the land against which assessment was proposed at the 1952 public hearing on the sewer.
