Life Endangered By Holiday Burns

Bolton, Nov. 25 (Special)—Leo H. Dragnet, 46, of West Hartford is on the critical list at the Hartford Hospital today as a result of burns suffered here yesterday.

According to State Police, Dragnet suffered burns over most of his body while attempting to extinguish a pool of burning gasoline in his father-in-law's tobacco farm. The accident took place on the property of Abram Stodolow, which is at Pine St. and Windsor St.

Ernest Meyer, acting chief of the Volunteer Fire Department, said Dragnet apparently found the gasoline in a barn where some children had been playing and he ran from the building with it, his clothes caught fire.

Challenge for unemployment benefits in the Manchester area rose from 714 to 729 last week, the State Labor Department reported today.

The 1955 total, which represented a percentage increase of 2.1, included 80 initial claims. There were 75 such claims in the preceding week. Initial claims indicate new spells of unemployment.

State-wide claims increased slightly last week after having reached a 2.9-year low. There were 15,787 claims reported in Connecticut last week as compared with 15,700 in the week ending Nov. 14. In the equivalent 2-week period last year, claims rose from 28,622 to 29,200.

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Mass Confusion Seen For Education Parley

By JAMES MARLOW (Herald Staff Writer)

Washington, Nov. 25 (AP)—The White House Conference on Education, opening a 4-day meeting here Monday, may find some answers to the school problem—but there is suspicion that the 1,800 men and women—teachers, labor, farm and civic leaders, businessmen and professional people—coming from 48 states and the territories with divergent views can reach agreement.

The conference already is being called a game of musical chairs because of unusual seating arrangements and procedures which will not permit wide-open debate or voting.

The delegates will have to transit their business through discussion in small groups. They will be seated at 150 tables, 10 to a table. To prevent persons with similar backgrounds from sitting together, cards describing each delegate will be dropped into an automatic business machine which is supposed to "rearrange" them in such a way that participants at each of the tables will represent varied callings and experience.

Before looking at the background of this conference, and what it faces, here are the six questions which will be discussed: (1) What should our schools accomplish? (2) In what ways can

gains have come here for the past 10 years? (3) How can we get more out of our schools? (4) How can we get enough good teachers?—and keep them? (5) How can we finance our schools—build and operate them? (6) How can we get them to meet the needs of the people?

Each chairman draws up a report on what he thinks was the majority view at his table on question No. 1. Then these 180 chairmen move to 18 tables, 10 to a table, pick a chairman, and discuss problem No. 1.

Then each of these 18 chairmen draws up a report on what he thinks was the majority view at his table. Next the 18 chairmen move to two tables, nine to a table. Each table picks a chairman and discusses problem No. 1.

The two remaining chairmen get together and draw up a report on what they think was the majority view at their two tables. And they make their report to all 1,800 conferees.

Then the whole thing starts over again on question No. 2. And so on until all majority views on all six questions have been reported to the conferees. These six reports from the conferees are to go to the President's 24-man committee.

Sometimes in January, perhaps, this committee will make recommendations to the President. Then it's up to Eisenhower to make recommendations, if any, to Congress.

Insurance Rebate For Cars Ordered

Hartford, Nov. 25 (AP)—Connecticut's State Insurance Commissioner has ordered 10 car insurance companies to refund more than \$500,000 in overcharges to Connecticut policyholders. State Commissioner Thomas J. Spelacy said Wednesday some 20,000 people in Connecticut would get the rebate.

He said that the overcharging practice was limited to policies on financed, family cars not used in business.

Spelacy said two different kinds of policies were available. The first is cheaper, and applies where drivers in the household are over 25. The second applies where drivers under 25 are involved. Spelacy said the second sometimes cost as much as 45 per cent more than the first.

He said the overcharge came about where policyholders were charged for the more expensive type, when they were entitled to the cheaper rate.

Spelacy said there were no complaints about the practice.

He said he ordered an investigation after noting the practice was uncovered in Texas and several companies operating in Connecticut were involved.

The names of the companies were not disclosed. In all cases, Spelacy said, they were involved with automobile finance companies.

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Final Clinic Sees 75 Get Salk Shots

Some 75 youngsters received injections of Salk anti-polio vaccine here Wednesday at what local health officials say is the final make-up clinic that will be held in connection with the free vaccination program of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

In all, close to 3,000 local children received shots under the program that started here in the spring, stalled when the national program bogged down and then resumed in August. To complete the program here, health officials had to hold three make-up clinics this fall.

Wednesday's clinic was held in the hearing room of the Municipal Building. It was the last of a series of clinics held earlier this month. The first make-up clinic this fall took place on Dec. 12, when the national program bogged down and then resumed in August.

The children who were eligible for the free shots were those who, in the spring, when the program started, were in the first four months of the program. Most of the children were between 5 and 6, the "critical" polio years.

Some 600 Only One Shot. A small percentage of the 3,000 youngsters who were eligible for a second shot of the vaccine in 1954 and were entitled to it.

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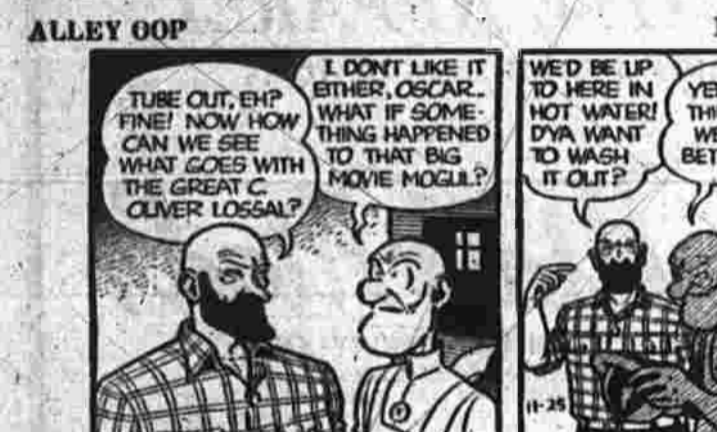

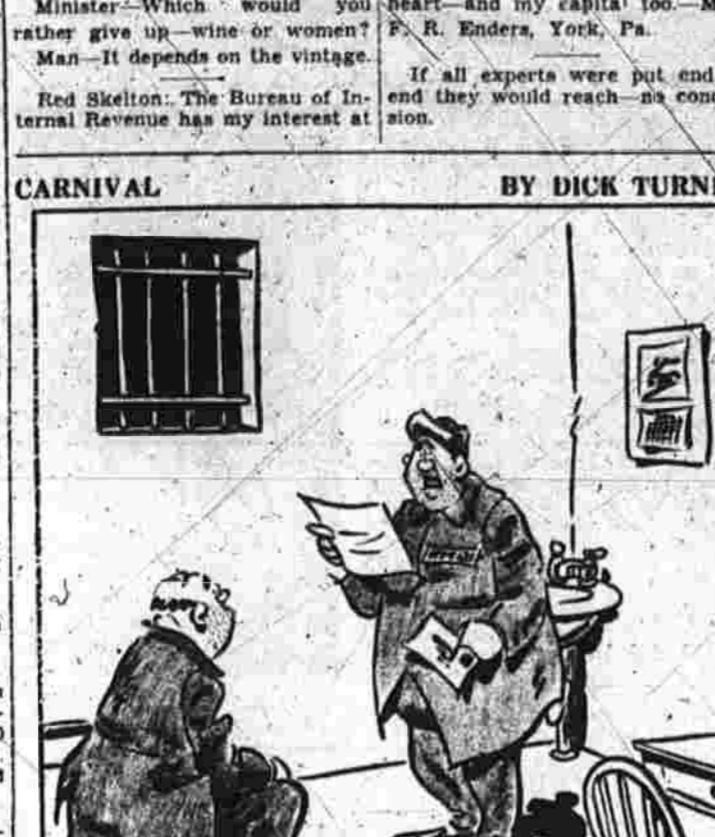

satisfy the opposing elements but succeeded only in alienating all sides.
The election issue also gave France Premier Pierre Mendès-France and other leading Radical-Socialist deputies the chance to move into open opposition. Faure is also a member of the party for a long time and has supported him only to make a show of party unity.
On the last two votes of confidence Faure's sense of the possibility of a coalition with the cabinet survived only through the backing of the Communists.
Faure's troubles started out when he ousted Jean Social Republic (Gaullist) minister who openly opposed his policies in Morocco. Since then, the Premier has had no assured working majority of the Assembly. Now the dilemma is a great one: either to resign or to try to patch together a winning margin for one year.
The turning point in Faure's battle to move the election date ahead may have come in the assembly's Nov. 2 vote refusing to ratify 24 hours the constitution's status for the election law. This status required a parliamentary decision within 15 days on the election issue. With its abandonment, parliamentary action dragged and opponents got more time to build up strength.
December elections now are out of the question. There is still a slim hope for a January vote, but few deputies believe that even this is possible.
Since it proposed early elections the government has had to devote almost all its attention to the problem. Every other major decision has been held in suspense, and there seems almost no chance for any vigorous action in the present state of uncertainty.

The Doctor Says
Antistress Drug Perfected: Use Must Be Carefully Supervised

Nature has given us remarkable tools with which to deal with stress. One is a gland which secretes adrenaline. Once in a while, however, one of the bodily functions gets out of whack and one can, for example, have too easy clotting of the blood, or its opposite—too easy bleeding.
Q—I should be interested to learn about a drug which is used to prevent blood clotting, particularly when one is past middle age and threatened with apoplexy.
A—There are actually two substances which are sometimes used to prevent clotting of blood. One of these is heparin which is obtained by making an extract from the liver. The other is dicoumarol which was originally obtained from spoiled sweet clover and can now be made in the laboratory. These substances must be used with care since too much of them may result in excessive bleeding. They are not used too freely to prevent apoplexy but may have value for a few patients.
Q—I am a housewife standing on my feet from 6:30 in the morning to 9:30 in the evening. When I sit, lately my right leg has begun paining me and even after a good night's sleep, I awake in the morning with the same feeling. I have consulted a physician several times.
A—This term is derived from the Marquis de Sade and is believed to apply strictly to physical cruelty, though there is, of course, cruelty of the purely mental variety.
Q—Would you please comment on the danger, if any, of making blood donation throughout three months? There seems to be a great deal of publicity about this.
A—All of us are aware that a healthy person can lose a certain amount of blood and still be in good health. It is a condition in which one's blood donation is good as long as one is normally and moves around to some extent. It may not produce any symptoms at all, nor require treatment. If treatment is needed, surgery is the only method of correcting the condition.

Russians Seek Ways to Assist India Economy

"We have many other countries who think as we do, and India is among them."
No slip of tongue
"In competition for peace we are sure to win. The capitalist press accuses me of making a slip of the tongue when I said that in Moscow they said 'I tongue was loose—but it was on a slip. We will not deviate from the path set for us by Lenin."
He added that he doesn't like by capitalist system, and when I speak about coexistence it is not for the purpose of continuing that system, but I give de facto recognition to capitalism and grant that it is a system which must be maintained to be fought for it.
"Khrushchev" was cheered when he said Russia would not beg for coexistence but would fight for it. He declared the Russians "are determined to maintain and expand the peace of socialism under Soviet guidance and held forth on what he called the defects of capitalism. Finally, Bulganin's State Chief Minister Morozov (then) commented:
"Here in India, we have a system which we believe is better than either capitalism or socialism."

AEC Says Soviet Exploded H-Bomb
Washington, Nov. 25 (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) says Russia has exploded a nuclear device as destructive as millions of tons of TNT—a force that could be unleashed only by a hydrogen blast.
Announcing the new Russian atomic test, AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss said Wednesday night it ranked as the largest thus far in the range of megatons. One megaton being the explosive equivalent of one million tons of TNT.
Strauss didn't call it a hydrogen explosion but his reference to an energy yield measured in megatons made it seem apparent a device was involved. Atomic bombs have an explosive force of up to about 100 kilotons—the equivalent of 100,000 tons of TNT. The biggest American nuclear explosion, at Bikini atoll on March 1, 1954, was estimated unofficially to have had the force of 15 to 17 megatons.
The Russian test, which took place in the desert of Kazakhstan, was witnessed by a team of U.S. scientists. The test was conducted in a mountainous area of the Kazakh Republic, a senior Canadian defense scientist, said in Ottawa he could not interpret the latest Russian test as indicating the Soviets had gained atomic superiority. He termed it "just another in a development series."
