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14 Girl Scouts Make Bids for Senior Roundup

A total of 14 applications from interested Senior Girl Scouts, at least one from each of the six Senior troops in Manchester, has been received by the Selections Committee of the Manchester Girl Scout Council for the 1956 national Senior Roundup in Michigan next summer.

This first large-scale national camp ever held by the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. will be held at the Highland Hills Recreation area, 40 miles from Detroit, from June 29 to July 11, with an expected attendance of about 3,000 Senior Girl Scouts and adults.

The Manchester Girl Scouts have been vamping themselves on their primitive camping skills and ability for they have been contributing to group fun, such as singing, dancing, crafts, dramatics and ceremonies.

On their applications, their leaders have rated them on other qualifications—use and understanding of the patrol system, ability to care for health, personal belongings while traveling and camping, enjoyment of primitive camps, regardless of weather, acceptance of the ideals of Girl Scouting as evidenced by an understanding of other people's feelings and respect for their rights, a knowledge of the community in which they live and an acceptance of responsibility, as well as other skills.

The delegates chosen to represent Manchester at this national event will not only have these skills but will be outstanding girls in a group and how to give of themselves freely. They will have an unusual opportunity to meet and share with girls from all over the country and from other countries as well.

Rockville Burglar's Tools Bring Conviction For Stafford Man

Rockville, Nov. 29 (Special)—A Grand Jurors jury was found not guilty of larceny and guilty of possession of burglar's tools yesterday afternoon in Rockville City Court.

leader's salary, it is less than the \$200 paid to miners chief John L. Lewis or to Teamsters Union President Dave Beck or the \$75,000 received by George Harrison, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks.

Little effect of the merger is expected on the forthcoming presidential campaign. For the next year or more, the combined AFL-CIO plus collectors of political activity, care for AFL unions and one for CIO unions. They probably will operate more closely than in the past, however.

A two-year period after the merger has been arranged to perfect the dovetailing of the thousands of area and city AFL and CIO organizations, some of which have maintained strong ties to local Democratic Party organizations.

Leaders of the AFL and CIO seem to feel they will be able to combine more voluntary political contributions from union members after the merger.

However, that turns out, the main union political advantage out of the merger is likely to be that one AFL-CIO organization in each state eventually will have the support of all organized labor support. In the past, unions have sometimes divided their overall influence—on a supporting AFL-CIO plus in some cases, but meaningful and thus courted more by prospective candidates.

Barbara Separately

Will the merger lead to more strikes and pressures on employers? Unions will operate much as they have in the past, each bargaining separately on its own with employers.

However, the CIO's Walter Reuther, who probably will remain as chief spokesman for CIO unions within the new federation, has proposed establishing a huge anti-trust fund from which AFL-CIO unions could draw for money during wildcat strikes and millions of dollars worth of goods produced by and millions of dollars worth of goods embargoed in a labor controversy.

Union leaders predict considerably expanded union organizing activities after the merger. This is likely to get underway slowly but persistently. However, Philip Ray Rodgers, a member of the National Labor Relations Board, reports the number of cases coming in the NLRB this year indicates a considerable burst of union organizing effort well in advance of the merger.

See Notable Success

Rodgers' former aide to the late Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) told an employer group in California a few weeks ago that "it is no longer a matter of if you will achieve a notable success."

Rodgers said, "that this new organization will find millions of ready buyers for its product and services, with the result that both unionization and collective bargaining will be part of our economy."

The result of such a development means success against a long-term merger.

In the defense's action to set aside the verdict as excessive, counsel argued that the expenditure for medical and funeral expenses plus and suffering should not exceed \$2,000.

The defense may now appeal the verdict to the State Supreme Court. Attorneys could not be located today to learn whether or not they planned such an appeal.
