Berlin, Dec. 5 (AP)—Great Britain has conceded the right of the East German Communist government to control the inland waterways which help feed Berlin. It was disclosed today.

The spokesman said British authorities immediately acknowledged that the Soviet signature for large permits to long waterways in East Germany was being refused to the East German Communist regime.

hands an integral part of India-Greece.

The colonial system is collapsing in spite of the desperate efforts of colonialists to save their domination in countries which they exploit," Khrushchev charged.

He blamed "colonizers" for bloodshed in Korea and Indochina, and said Burma's foreign policy of peace "has the approval of the world's progressive forces."

Turning to European affairs, Khrushchev said Russia had recently undertaken a number of political and diplomatic moves aimed at lessening international tensions. "All this was created to favor a situation and we are not abandoning our efforts in this direction," he declared.

He said Russia had reduced its armed forces by 600,000 men and abandoned its "only" naval base on foreign territory—Porkhina in Finland.

Offering economic aid to Burma, Khrushchev said the Russians appreciated the aspirations of people who freed themselves from colonialism.

He said Chinese Nationalists had "managed to invent outrage and activities" on Burmese soil, and had received assistance from certain elements of Burma.

In a pointed reference to the U.S. in Europe, he said the policy of certain far right groups, which he said intended to take advantage of Burma, is a "policy of aggression."

He said the Burmese people, though not a purchaser of rice in quantity, would do everything to purchase more Burmese rice, which there is a large surplus.

Or Red China, Khrushchev said that six years after the Chinese people's Republic was proclaimed, it was still a crying injustice.

That Chiang Kai-shek was "trying" to represent the Chinese people, Khrushchev said. "World War II was through to the Chinese people was shed by the Soviet people than by all other nations."

"But we respect and give due credit" to the British, French and American troops which fought against Hitler's Germany, he added.

\$300 million a year, while twisting and wrecking the lives of thousands of the victims it has "hooked."

Harry J. Anslinger, chief of the Federal Narcotics Bureau, calls the habit "murder on the installment plan." It ravages body and soul, reducing its victims to a zombie-like existence of living death. That's the human side.

Financially it is a devastating drain on the nation's economy. Here's why: The Narcotics Bureau estimates that the country has 60,000 addicts—a figure that's a far too low.

That's because federal authorities say it costs an addict \$10 to \$40 a day to satisfy his craving, or a minimum of around \$5,000 a year. But this isn't the "who's the average addict can't hold a job, particularly one that pays that kind of money. So he steals. And since a thief seldom gets more than a quarter of the value of stolen goods when he sells it, it means that the theft bill tops \$14 billion every year.
