**High Price For A Vote**  
 By a vote of 23 to 2, the United Nations General Assembly has endorsed and sent to the Security Council the proposition that 18 new nations be admitted to the United Nations in a package deal.

Tomorrow, the Security Council is scheduled to act, with the big question that of whether Nationalist China will persist in its threat to upset the package deal by using the veto against Outer Mongolia. If that happens, there will be another question, that of whether Soviet Russia will retract and take 17 new members instead of 18. Russia, as adamant as Peron, has been threatening that it has to be all 18 or none.

This sets up a highly charged world political situation, in which all kinds of maneuvers are visible.

The big key maneuver, which would seem almost unbelievable if it were not being reported again and again, is an effort to bribe Peron to vote for this package deal by promising Formosa that it will not be expelled from the United Nations for a certain period of time.

The United States is reported trying to get Britain to agree that, if the Chinese Nationalist vote for this package deal, it will not allow the Nationalists to be expelled from the United Nations before the year 1957.

Also, according to report, Nationalist China is not too happy about this proposed bargain. It is reported to be demanding that the guarantee that it will not be expelled shall last through 1958.

And we suppose there is a threat which goes along this proposed bargain. The threat seems to be that if Nationalist China does use its veto and upset the new membership package deal, it may be expelled in 1956, because so many of its friends will be angered by its obstructive tactics.

This is something new in politics, on any level. It smoothes the making of a nation's membership in a legislative body dependent upon the way that nation votes in that body. If it votes right, it can be long; if it votes wrong, it will be expelled.

We see no defender of Nationalist China's somewhat far-fetched right to represent the mainland of China. But, in any case, we believe that the problem of Chinese representation in the United Nations should be settled on the facts and on principle, not on the way Formosa votes on one particular issue.

**Dulles To Israel**  
 Secretary of State Dulles has informed Foreign Minister Sharett of Israel that this country is displeased over Israel's "rigid" attitude in the continuing Palestine dispute.

The American criticism of the Israeli position seems to be based primarily on the fact that Israel insists that it be understood before any mediation is entered into, that it will not make any substantial territorial concessions. It is the Dulles view that Israel is not willing to be more flexible than this. Otherwise, the present crisis of stalemate in the Near East will continue and will get worse.

That there is a stalemate and deadlock in the Near East is admitted. It also happens to be true that there are two sides to the deadlock. And it is perhaps a little unfortunate that Mr. Dulles dare talk turkey only to one side of this deadlock.

Whatever unreasonable there may be on the side of Israel, we should say, more than balanced by the basic unreasonableness on the part of the Arab states. Their position is still that they do not recognize the very existence of Israel, or its right to

exist. Their policy still refuses to accept that it will recognize the existence of Israel in any territory east of the Jordan River. The agenda goal is not the elimination of Israel, but the attainment of a state that remains the expressed purpose of the Arab states, that is, it would seem, the number one "rigid" attitude in the Palestine situation. And if Mr. Dulles should obtain a softening of that attitude, then he would have a strong lever to use against the existing rigidity of Israel's position.

When, on the other hand, he condemns Israel, as he does not dare condemn the Arab states, he is very likely to make the Arab states feel that he is taking their side, and supporting their position. But it happens to be their position which must be softened before any other compromise will have a chance. Until that concession comes from the Arab states, Israel is not fighting for any particular territory, but for life itself. Once that concession does come, there would be some point in having Israel settle its own positions, and the world would be right in insisting on it.

**Detroit And The Dealers**  
 The Senate subcommittee hearings on Detroit's relationship with retail automobile dealers seem to be doing some good, and at times which is very opportune.

The good is not only in the action of General Motors, in extending its franchise agreements to last five years instead of one. There is also good in the fact that the public attention has been fixed on the problem involved, with the result that the dealers of the nation will have more courage for defending themselves in the future, and more public understanding and support when they do.

This is timely, because the old-time pinch on the dealers, forgotten during the post-war years when automobiles themselves were scarce, and sold themselves, and the only thing that worried the dealer was whether he could get cars to sell, is now being revived. It is now a buyer's market. Detroit is over-producing itself, as its rival concerns fight for shares in the market. From Detroit, the pressure funnels out to the dealers. In a glutted market, they are pressured to sell more and more. Many of them are forced to forego normal profit in the effort to meet quotas.

If Detroit keeps up with its over-production, the nation's dealers as a whole will soon be under pressure to do the impossible—sell more cars than America is willing or needs to buy. And in the Detroit system as it has been at its worst, those who fail to do the impossible will be punished with loss of their business, while others may keep their business only by being willing to risk it at a loss.

The need is not merely for Detroit to be more reasonable and humane. Now Detroit need to go to the extreme of being soft, and carrying forever a dealer who isn't a good salesman. The need is for Detroit to come to some degree of sense in its own production schedules, so that it doesn't insist that each year must be bigger than the other, so that it doesn't produce so many cars it requires its dealers to find purchasers who do not exist.

In the Washington hearing, the dealers have had a chance to present their case, and it's about time.

**Tammay's Man Of The Soil**  
 It would seem to us that anybody busily engaged in the throwing of political mud is automatically self-battered to the extent that his opponents need not bother to try to throw any back at him.

Along that line, we should say that New York's Governor Harriman has been painting himself so effectively by the nature and quality of the argument he has been using in the effort to do the presidential nomination, that it is a little bit superfluous and unnecessary to have President Eisenhower's press secretary, James C. Hagerty, come along and label him as the first man Tammany Hall has ever dared nominate for the presidency.

That is about as wicked a stain as could be taken at Harriman, politically. But it would be fairer, and more to the point, to have Harriman judged on what he himself is, and says, rather than on what he says about others. Tammany Hall what it is, may not be quite as bad as it sounds anyway.

We should prefer, for instance, to consider Harriman, the smooth and successful Wall St. operator, in his new role of the nation's number one farm expert.

What a man of the soil! What deep and sympathetic understanding of the plight of the farmer! Or, we might take some of Governor Harriman's brilliant pronouncements on foreign policy,

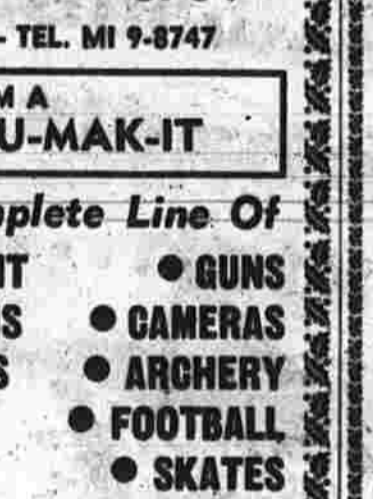

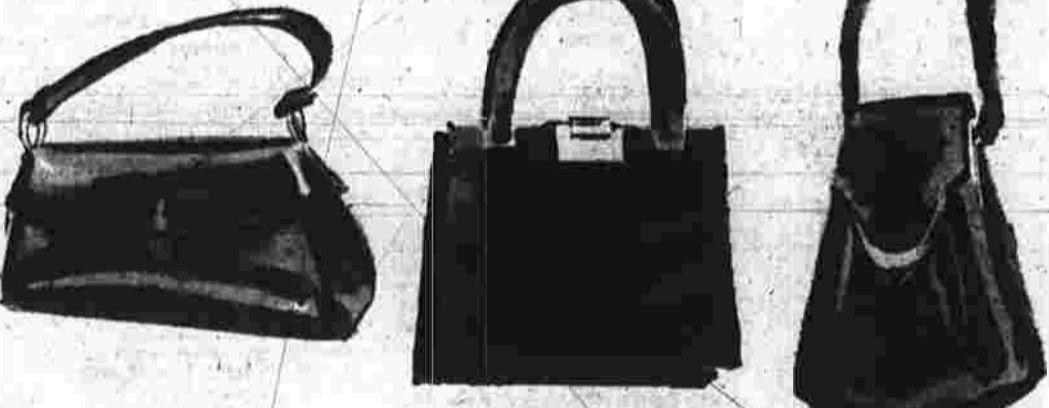

## Brainard Defends Final Opinions of School Conference

Hamden, Dec. 10 (Special)—Jesse A. Brainard, Connecticut chairman at the recently terminated White House Conference on Education, today defended the accuracy of the final report adopted by the conferees.

Expressing satisfaction in the report, Brainard admitted there may have been some errors of omission and commission.

But he added, even these errors would work toward the improvement of education in the United States and the proposals which he highlighted as the program developed.

First E. Engleman, state commissioner of education and one of the leading figures behind the White House Conference, gave a short talk before Brainard spoke.

Engleman spoke of the benefit accrued from a conference which brought together people with diversified backgrounds and encouraged their attention on a common problem. He said it nothing else that the most many people were drawn together over a vital issue and the national confidence of success.

Regarding the effect of the conference, Engleman said "We have a problem that cannot be answered simply. It must be attacked many ways."

The conference today opened at 10 a.m. with Dr. William H. Fabery, state deputy commissioner of education, and co-chairman of today's meeting presiding.

All 17 delegates to the White House Conference attended today's session. Today there will be a breakdown into 18 discussion groups which will draw up a proposal for education in the state. Later to be submitted to the Connecticut Council of Education.

Pursell Bills Subsidies

The meeting covered a little more than 12 hours after U.S. Sen. Purcell (R-Conn.) gave a talk in neighboring New Haven in which he said that "no evidence has been produced to show that there is a single state financially unable to pay for its education."

## Two Veto Threats Face 'Deal' on 8 New Members

United Nations, N.Y., Dec. 10 (AP)—The president of the U.N. Security Council today appealed for prompt and "positive" action on the admission of 18 new members to the council organization.

Sir Leslie Munro of New Zealand, opening the crucial council debate, declared that the prestige of the 11-nation body was at stake.

United Nations, N.Y., Dec. 10 (AP)—The U.N. Security Council today turned the veto threat which could keep careful plans to bring 18 nations into the U.N.

As the 11-nation council prepared to take up the issue, it also faced a bitter wrangle over Nationalist Chinese demands for prior action on non-Communist applicants that could delay voting until next week.

Informed sources said the council's prime problem is to decide just how to ballot on the 18 nations whose bid for entry has been approved by the Security Council's General Assembly.

It had been expected they would be considered in order of application. But the Chinese Nationalists insisted the council vote first on a list of 15 non-Communist nations, a move that was sure to anger the Soviet bloc.

## Knowland Stresses Tougher Red Policy

Washington, Dec. 10 (AP)—Sen. Knowland of California apparently plans to depict himself as a stronger advocate than the Eisenhower Administration of a "tough" policy toward Russia, if he runs for the 1956 Republican presidential nomination.

Knowland, the Senate Minority Leader, refused to tell a million news conference yesterday whether he will seek the GOP nomination until President Eisenhower has the opportunity to make a decision which he believes will be made during the month of January.

If Eisenhower runs again, Knowland has made it clear, he will support the President.

Knowland would campaign not to run, the kind of campaign known as "unilateralism" in California's speech before the National Assn. of Manufacturers in New York last night.

Knowland asserted that the United States had "acquired" in what he called "unilateralism" by the Communists and non-Communist nations in a package deal.

## President Asks \$2.67 Billion New Aid Funds

The Budget Bureau, it was learned today, has approved this request, making a few provisions of discussions with interested government agencies. President Eisenhower could still decide to change this total, but he is not believed likely to do so.

The Liberal-dominated coalition government called the election for the House of Representatives in the constitutional deadline in a tactical move against the Laborites.

Vote or Pay Fine

More than 1 million Australians, who faced a two pound (\$4.75) fine if they failed to vote in Australia's general election today, were urged to vote in a sweltering heat, with temperatures rocketing above the 100 mark.

It was one of the quietest elections the country has ever known.

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
