Cigarette Health Scare Seen on Wane in 1955

By NOEL VANCEY. Raleigh, N. C. (AP)—The tobacco industry is keeping its fingers crossed that the cigarette health scare abated during 1955. Cigarette consumption perked up after last year's sharp drop. The figures indicate some folks quit smoking during the health scare, but many other companies offset with their fears and turned to filter cigarettes. As a result, the filter fags captured an estimated 21 per cent of the huge cigarette market in 1955 as compared with 10 per cent in 1954. The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates cigarette manufacturers produced 415 billion cigarettes during the year, a 10 per cent increase over 1954. Domestic consumption hit 383 billion. This compares with 1.84 billion a year's production of about 402 billion and consumption of a total of 284.5 billion. A tobacco industry statistician's estimate of 1955 consumption is not as high as the Agriculture Department figure. According to this estimate, 1955 consumption hit 379 billion. The department commented that the "small lag" of the industry concerning cigarettes and health on cigarette consumption appears to have occurred during 1954. While things looked brighter in the tobacco industry during the year, back on the farm was far from rosy. Last year's drop in tobacco consumption and an ideal growing season this year combined to build up record tobacco stocks. Most tobacco is grown under a rigid system of acreage controls with prices supported at 90 per cent, but one weather plus new heavy-yielding varieties resulted in a record 1.5 billion pound crop. Fluorecured is the major cigarette tobacco.

New York, Jan. 4 (AP)—The New York Times said today Russia has offered economic and technical aid to Liberia. The West African Negro republic, organized a century ago with American help. A Times dispatch from Monrovia said the Russian delegation to the third inauguration of President William V. S. Tubman also suggested the two countries exchange diplomatic representatives. The dispatch added the Liberian government probably would approve the Soviet offer with caution, despite its need for foreign aid. Liberia is strongly opposed to

Striker Says Kin Threatened If She Worked

Bridgport, Jan. 4 (AP)—A woman striker at the Westinghouse Corp. brass plant who returned to work charged that a woman organizer for the union and two men threatened something might happen to her children if she didn't stay off the job. to smaller bargaining groups also has deferred pay boosts coming in 1956.

Only about 1 million out of an estimated 17 million union workers are covered by the 1956-57 contract. The large bulk of money to be paid out in the form of automatic pay boosts will set a rather high target for union wage aims in 1956.

Major wage negotiations are due this year in the meatpacking, rubber, steel, aluminum, airplane frame, shipbuilding and telephone industries.

The bulk of the automatic raises will fall in the second quarter of 1956. This means that purchasing power should increase around mid-year. It could also counter any dip that might develop in the over-all economy.

Out of the roughly 2,700,000 workers expected to benefit from deferred wage boosts, nearly 1,600,000 are in metal, machinery and electrical goods fields.

Others include 800,000 construction industry workers, 350,000 transportation workers, and 600,000 soft coal miners. Still others are in food, clothing, printing, leather, chemical, public utility, claydams and retail trade occupations.
