Eisenhower Calls for 'Modest' Reduction In National Debt Before Any Cut in Taxes

'Good Times,' Peace Pushed in Message

By ED CREECH and WILLIAM T. PEACOCK

Washington, Jan. 5 (P)—President Eisenhower said today government financing is moving out of the red. But he called for a "modest" reduction of the national debt before any cutting of taxes.

In his State of the Union message to Congress, where tax cutting sentiment is high in this election year, Eisenhower said present levies unquestionably are burdensome and should be reduced "when we prudently can."

But he declared that obligations to future Americans require reducing the debt "whenever we can appropriately do so."

As to the state of government income and outgo, Eisenhower said:

"I expect the budget to be in balance during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1956."

"I shall propose a balanced budget for the next fiscal year ending June 30, 1957."

In broad perspective, the President's message was an expression of satisfaction with progress made and of confidence in the future.

Domestically, it sounded a theme of peace and prosperity—certainly a school for inspiring on the election campaign—but also a warning that the nation is not yet willing to create the conditions for a "good time" and "leisure time."

In his annual message, Eisenhower declared Russia has shifted from violence to a policy of "peaceful coexistence" with the United States.

Washington, Jan. 5 (P)—President Eisenhower asked Congress today to vote unprecedented long-term foreign aid weapons to reinforce the fight against Communist offensives aimed at spreading Red power in the Middle East and Asia.

Eisenhower told the lawmakers that the Soviet Union's power leaders last July had proposed an "intolerable disaster" to the world.

But the follow-up foreign aid program, he said, was not a "disaster" but a "plan" to curb Red gains.

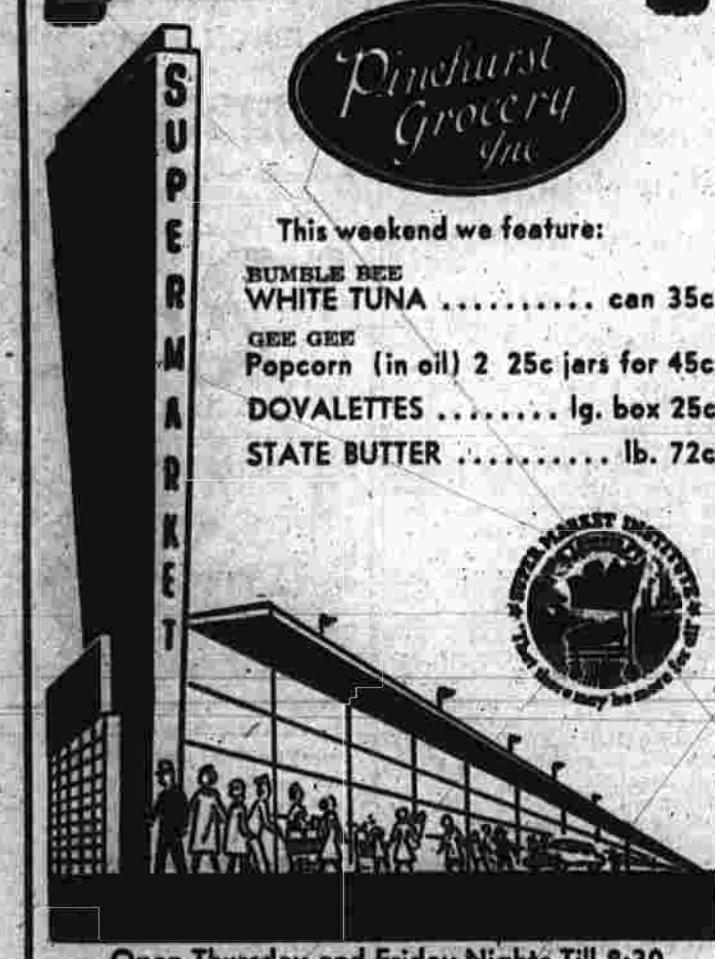
