The Democratic state leadership has apparently calculated that it has a better chance of putting Mayor Richard Lee of New Haven in the United States senatorial nomination this year, and holding him there against any possible primary challenge by Congressman Thomas Dodd, than it has of doing the same thing with Chester Bowles.

The prospect is that this may be all right with Bowles. So, if the calculation should prove tenable, everybody could wind up happy, except Dodd.

Our answer to this one has to be that the party leadership must be calculating that with Lee it runs a good chance of eliminating the possibility of post-convention primary challenges by Dodd. It must be thinking that, with Lee, it has a chance of keeping Dodd from getting that 20 per cent of the convention vote which would entitle him to be elected to a primary.

Living On The Loaf

The question of how well crime pays off continues to interest us. Take the 11 men apparently involved in the Brink's robbery, six years ago. If they split the loot evenly, all 11 of them, they had something like \$120,000 each.

That would seem quite a nest egg. However, the life of a criminal who has just made a big haul is not entirely a normal thing. Surely, being rich, it is beneath him to do honest work for a living. On the other hand, having just completed a big job in the shop, he has a great deal of time to spare. He doesn't want to fall into the hands of the law for one thing, and then, perhaps, be sentenced to the big time. What good is his money, anyway, if he is in prison?

So we would guess that most of these 11 men spent these past six years not doing much of anything to live on. Probably, they had to live on their \$120,000. For six years, that would give them \$20,000 a year. But, since all of them probably hoped to have more than six years in which to enjoy their big haul, they probably didn't permit themselves a \$20,000 a year rate. If they wanted to make it last for 12 years, that would be \$10,000 a year. If they wanted to make it last longer, or even wanted to keep most of it as a nest egg, their scale of living would correspondingly drop.

We are thinking only of the financial pleasures they may have gained from their successful exploit. We are not thinking of those moments in which they found themselves dodging each other, bullets, or suspecting one another, or scurrying before some rumor, or thought they heard a knock on the door, or dreamed that the F.B.I. was on their trail. We are thinking of their lives even without such moments of worry and alarm. And we suspect that, even if they were never caught, they would have had it so good. With half the doomed cleverness, half the initiative, half the planning that went into their exploit, they could probably have earned as much, and slept more.
