McGinnis to Resign As NHRP President

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 19 (AP)—W. S. Hackworth, president of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway, said today he has been invited to become president of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad at a salary of \$75,000 a year. He said a representative of the majority stockholders offered him the post.

New York, Jan. 19 (AP)—Patrick B. McGinnis says he is quitting as head of the New Haven Railroad and cites "unprincipled and unbridled" commuter attacks on him as the major reason for stepping down. McGinnis, fiery, self-made financier, announced last night he observed the resignation offer and called a special meeting of the "board" of directors for tomorrow "for the purpose of resigning as president."

New Haven, meanwhile the name of George T. Carmichael, now senior vice president, prominently mentioned today in speculation over who will succeed McGinnis as president of the New Haven Railroad.

In most of the talk about Carmichael, stress was placed on the fact that he remained a key man in the organization even after McGinnis captured control of the road in 1954 from Frederick Dumaine, its president.

He joined the New Haven in 1908 as a clerk and rose steadily until he was named controller in 1934. In 1942 he became senior vice president, secretary and treasurer.

The 51-year-old McGinnis beat the Dumaine interest in a bitter proxy fight. Head of the investment firm of McGinnis & Co., he had bought two railroads, the Norfolk Southern and the Central of Georgia.

Those who know him know he do not run from a fight. McGinnis said, "My resignation is presented to the board because I feel that I can best fulfill my obligations to the stockholders and passengers... by making this move."

McGinnis Answers Critics
McGinnis, in a letter to Watkins of the Chamber of Commerce today said he had not intended to resign, but that he was trying to interest them in the railroads.

Watkins today said the Chamber would contact members of the legislature and "try to interest them" in making this move.

National Pro Gridders Draft 360 Collegians

Los Angeles, Jan. 19 (AP)—National Football League coaches and executives have tapped the college ranks for 360 players, most of them eligible for service last fall, and some for delivery in 1957.

The UCLA Bruins, who finished second in the Rose Bowl thriller to Michigan State, topped the college draft with 11 players, drafted, but three of their top stars, fullback Bob Davern, and offensive linemen, fullback Doug Peters, have indicated a preference for the Canadian Football League.

The Cleveland Browns drafted Davern, described by Coach Red Sanders as the best college fullback he ever saw, and Sam Brown, a very shifty and elusive halfback. A spokesman for the Browns said that while the club understood Davern had signed with Winnipeg and Brown intended to play professional baseball, "We'll take our chances."

Consolationist Bert Bell said the NFL would respect Canadian players already under contract in Canada "unless the players have been given waivers."

Other pro clubs also drafted players who have indicated they might or have signed Canadian contracts, thereby protecting themselves in case the players get clearance to play in the U.S. in '57.

The 12 NFL clubs didn't make any difference to the ranking of the top eight college stars of 1955 and they came up with many surprises from the smaller schools, whose untried players frequently prove to be the real "steepers" of the draft.

A significant fact of drafting was that the Los Angeles Rams, who took 16 backfield men in the first 16 rounds, chose no backfield men in this year's college draft but taking from the Western Division, where there were plenty of college players, they picked the first 16 backs from the Rams, the division leader and eight defensive specialists.
