estimated up to 25 m.p.h. and in depths of more than three feet in many places. Even after the storm slackened last night, flood channels ran brimful and in a few areas evacuated residents were urged not to return to their homes until the rain stopped completely.

Trucks and boats had been used to take women and children from flooded homes. Police said a resumption of heavy rainfall would renew the danger in such areas as Long Beach, Venice, Torrance, Lennox, Firestone, Norwalk, Artesia and Lawndale—all contingencies in Los Angeles.

Between 3 p.m. Wednesday and 3 p.m. yesterday, the rainfall was measured at 6.00 inches. The weather bureau said this was the third heaviest rainfall in southern California history. The heaviest was 7.26 during a one-day period from Dec. 31, 1933, to Jan. 1, 1934, and the second was March 1-2, 1938.

By last night the storm total was 7.26 inches. Before this storm the total rainfall for the season, which started last week, was only 2.61 compared with a normal of 6.1.

**Slides Block Highways**

One aspect of the situation in the Near East, which is obviously to be a part of the discussions between Prime Minister Eden and American leaders, concerns the relationship between two satellite, or weak nations in the Near East...

Saudi-Araba is also engaged in a direct dispute with Britain over the Buraimi case, an oil-rich location in southeastern Arabian Peninsula. Britain is holding the Oasis with British troops, and we've got out. So it is natural for Saudi-Araba to try to stir up trouble for Britain anywhere it can...

But we see no easy or happy solution of this trouble between the puppet of the pound and the puppet of the dollar. The only sane remedy we can see is to have the American funds, which President Eisenhower, basically afraid of peace and do not want war, are now of the opinion that this wave of relaxation of international tension should grow wider."

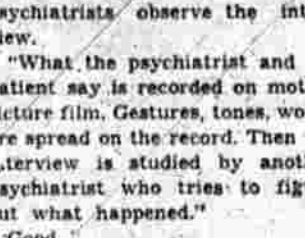

### Railroad Files Application To Curb Passenger Service

The New Haven Railroad has applied to the State Public Utilities Commission for permission to abandon the passenger service between Hartford and the Massachusetts state line. The application immediately drew the fire of Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff and Mayor John Dempsey of Putnam.

The railroad filed its application with the PUC, Wednesday. A spokesman for the State agency said today that, so far, as he knows, the carrier has not yet asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for authorization to suspend service on the remainder of the line that runs through to Boston. The PUC has jurisdiction over interstate travel and the ICC over transportation across state lines.

Governor Ribicoff said he intends to ask the PUC to make a careful study of the railroad's application to abandon the service which was knocked out during the Aug. 19 riot when a Putnam train was destroyed.

The governor also is considering the passenger service on the line "a definite asset to Eastern Connecticut. Passenger service should be preserved for the people of that area," he added.

Dempsey, who also is Ribicoff's executive aide, lodged a protest with the PUC and the ICC last Tuesday.

Both agencies are already studying the service interruption as a result of complaints from towns along the line which have been in Manchester, Willimantic and Putnam. In addition, officials of Connecticut and Massachusetts are meeting in Willimantic Tuesday morning.

McCarthy, under cross-examination by Defense Counsel Martin Erdmann, said many persons had cooperated with his committee and volunteered information to start members. "It was not a conspiracy," he said, "and it was not a plot to harm anyone."

Erdmann asked McCarthy to explain the reputation of Joseph L. Raub for truthfulness, honesty and morality. "I will tell you what that reputation is," answered McCarthy.

"I have never discussed his personal morals but as a public figure he has a reputation for truthfulness, honesty and morality," he said.

The ADA, headed by Raub, is a pro-New Deal organization which often has attacked McCarthy.

Raub has testified that he gave Hughes \$2,500 for alleged information concerning the McCarthy Committee. Under the impression that Hughes was a "disgruntled member of the McCarthy staff," he turned down a check for \$2,500 from the Wisconsin Senator's staff.

Hughes allegedly told the grand jury he heard executives of the Washington Post (now the Post and Times Herald) and others discuss payments for Matzow with Raub.

The prosecution says Raub, after getting information supplied by Hughes, tried to interest the Washington Post in publishing the material. After a check of the information, the newspaper turned it down.

Wechsler was another witness in the trial. Hughes has claimed that Wechsler was among those who discussed with Raub the financing of Matzow. Wechsler has denied the allegation.

Outside the courtroom before he took the stand, McCarthy told newsmen he thought the Hughes case had exposed what he termed a conspiracy by Raub and others to smear him, but "the thieves fell out."
