Mrs. Annis Held Able To Face Murder Trial

By WHITNEY JACOBS Hartford, Jan. 31 (Special)—Mrs. Irene Dolores Annis, 31, of Manchester, accused of murdering her husband, Roy, Dec. 13, was found mentally able to stand trial by Judge Edward Alcorn in Hartford County Superior Court shortly after 2 p.m. today.

See assistant military aide to President Truman, he was put in touch with Fritchey.

Hughes said Fritchey asked him to help in exposing the Senator as a fraud and a threat to civil liberties and that Fritchey "specifically mentioned there would be a substantial financial reward and some degree of prestige."

Tells of Forged Letter
Regarding a forged letter which other witnesses said Hughes had produced in an attempt to show he was a secret investigator on McCarthy's staff, Hughes said it "was a group of people" interested in the project.

Hughes said: "I specified what he or they intended in the body of the letter. I told Mr. Fritchey it would be impossible to get a letter of that kind from anyone I knew on the committee, but Mr. Fritchey told me he didn't care how I did it — but to get it."

Hughes said Fritchey also asked for material derogatory to McCarthy, and added that he would not obtain it legitimately (it was to assist in the preparation of a fiction material for "pressure purposes only").

Fritchey later turned the project over to Raah and dropped into the background, Hughes said. He said Raah had been familiar with the project thus far and wanted him to make statements "that would show the McCarthy staff mistreated witnesses."

Raah said he took Hughes' material to the Washington (D.C.) Post and did not know it was false until the newspaper checked and found it all a fraud.
