Eisenhower Given FDR 1941 Letter

Washington, Feb. 2 (AP)—A famous letter Franklin D. Roosevelt wrote 10 days after the 1941 Pearl Harbor attack to the President of the United States in 1949 has been delivered at last to Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The World War II president's letter asked consideration for "the merits of young Americans who got their start in 1949" for appointment as a cadet in the United States Military Academy at West Point.

Young Kelly—then only an infant and now a 400-pound high school sophomore—is the son of Capt. Colin P. Kelly Jr., the United States' first hero of the war, who was shot down over the Pacific a few days after Pearl Harbor.

Colin III lives at Concordville, Pa., near Philadelphia, with his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. J. Watson Ford. He attends Westtown Friends School, a Quaker institution.

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### Canada And China

Canada's Secretary of State Lester B. Pearson has just made, before the Canadian House of Commons, an extended statement of his government's public policy regarding China—a policy affirmed after a recent period of special studies and reports.

The Canadian decision, Pearson says, is to stand pat, for the moment, on its present policy of not extending diplomatic recognition to Communist China.

This decision, he stated, was reached after considering the "interests and views of our allies, some of whom are even more directly involved in the consequences of diplomatic recognition than we are."

White Canada will not now extend diplomatic recognition to Communist China, he said, until a survey of policy attacked the "anomaly" of Chinese Neorossianism.

The Pearson survey of policy also warned that Canada must be prepared to meet the challenge of the off-shore islands of Quemoy and Matsu against Chinese Communist attack.

When and if Canada does give diplomatic recognition to Communist China, Pearson said, that recognition will not extend to Formosa.

"As we see it," said Pearson, "the legal status of Formosa is still undecided and no step taken to recognize the Communist regime should prejudice that issue."

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### 38,300 Traffic Deaths in 1955 Almost Record

The growth of population and the increase in travel also figure in comparison. The 1955 death rate per 100 million vehicle miles was estimated at 8.4, that was 100 per cent higher than in 1954, which had the lowest rate on record.

The number of deaths from all kinds of accidents—92,000—showed an increase of three per cent over the 88,422 recorded in 1954. Motor vehicle fatalities were responsible for the increase. Home accident deaths numbered 37,000, a slight increase. Accidental deaths at work added up to 14,200, a slight increase.

The all-accident death toll was substantially over the level attained in some earlier years. It has topped 100,000 for the first time since 1954.

But one of each 18 persons in the United States suffered a disabling injury in 1955. Falls last year cost 19,900 lives, burns 12,000, and other accidents 2,300—each total showing little change from the previous year.

The National Safety Council said 35 states had higher traffic death tolls, and the total was over 13 other states.

States showing reductions were California, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. Minnesota 10, North Dakota 4, Kansas, Oregon, Nebraska, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming.

Eighty-one cities with a population of 10,000 or higher completed 1955 without a traffic death.

### Radar to Operate New Traffic Light

Manchester will have the only municipally-owned radar-operated traffic light in Connecticut when the installation at Oak and Spruce Sts. is finished, according to Chief Herman O. Schenkel.

Essentially, the radar controls duplicate the "tripper" style of traffic light in use but are more flexible. Cost of about \$1,700 installed is about the same, Chief Schenkel said, for each type.

The radar scanner is fixed to the end of an arm supported some 15 feet above the street and no excavation is necessary for the installation of wires connecting the light to the controls.

It is planned to present, to permit 30 seconds each time the light changes for traffic movement on Oak St. The light will remain green for Spruce St, cars except when Oak St. has automatic right-of-way.

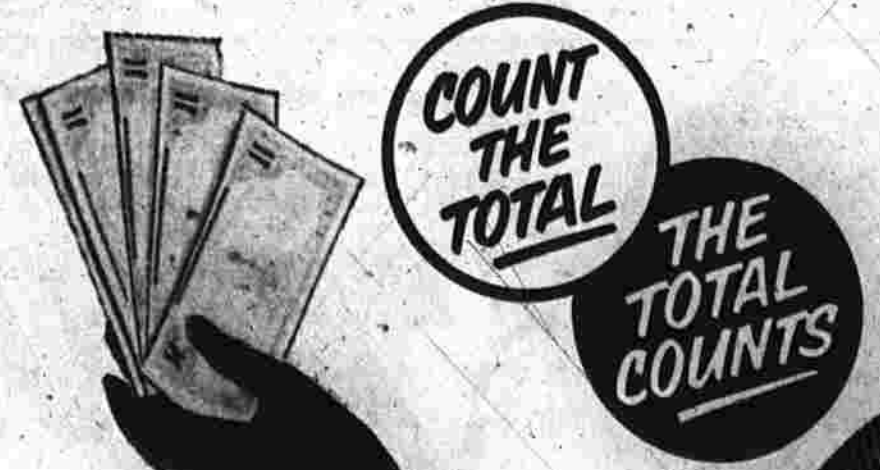

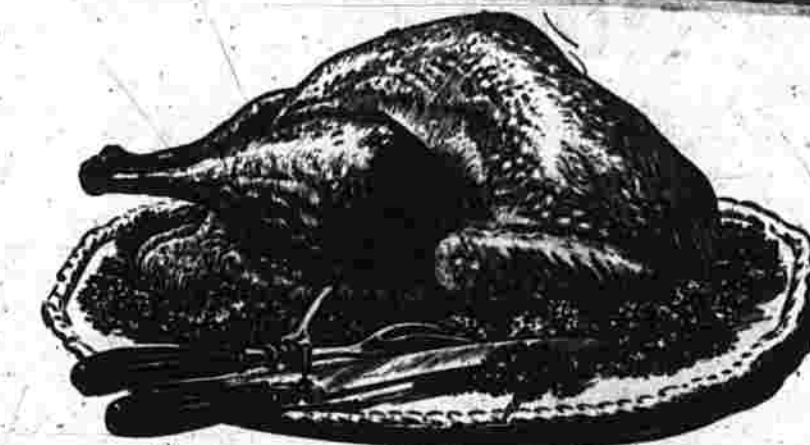

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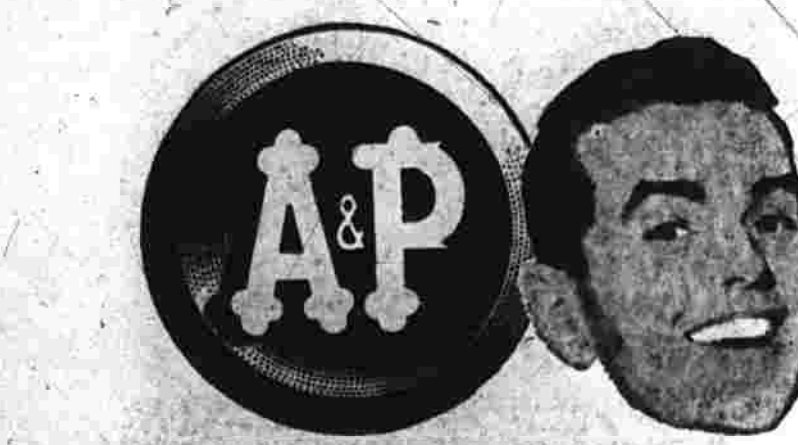

The Rev. Mr. Finn was made an honorary chief of the Ojibwa or Chippewa tribe in the summer of 1952 when he was sent as a missionary to the Red Lake Reservation in Minnesota.

The name, Red Eagle, which in Indian language is "Mac-Ko-Ki-New," was given to him during the ceremony because of eagles which he was ordered by the chiefs to sit outside the tent. The "Red" part of his name was given because of his bright, very Indian, red hair.

His colored sashes of the reservation and its inhabitants, the Rev. Mr. Finn showed the school children how the handsome Ojibwa youngsters dress much the same as the Andover residents with the exception of their gay tribal clothes worn for special ceremonies.

The Ojibwa Indians use social designs in their beaded head-dresses in contrast to the geometric designs of the western work of other tribes. In the hand-work they make for the tourist trade, they use the western designs because the visitors to the reservation find them as being too modern.

When the white neckerchief came to this area, the Indians found it difficult to wear. They found this metal, which is rolled into cigarette-like tubes, which they use as their neckerchiefs. When they dance the tubes jingle with a sound that the Indians call "the sound of the sky."

The Rev. Mr. Finn explained that the Ojibwa wear beaded neckerchiefs because they were defeated by the Sioux in battle. The original Ojibwa beaded neckerchiefs were made of porcupine quills which were worn down the center of the head from the forehead to the neck.
