East Reich Threatens Air Blockade of Berlin

(Continued from Page One)

respect protests of violation of air space.

East Germany allegedly became "fully sovereign" last September in an agreement with the Soviets and the Communists have so far applied the term "sovereignty" to everything except their air territory.

In December, the East Germans posed a threat against the barge lines which supply West Berlin with most of its heavy goods. They announced that they would instead of issue barge permits. So far, however, there has been no interference with barge or rail traffic.

Earlier last year, the East Germans slapped heavy taxes on western truck traffic to West Berlin, forcing the owners of heavy trucks to pay \$47 for a round trip on the 110-mile highway from West Germany.

In addition to Allied military air traffic, three western airlines are permitted to fly into West Berlin under an agreement with the Russians. They are Pan American World Airways, Air France and British European Airways.

During the 1948-49 Soviet blockade of West Berlin all ground traffic was cut off. Complaints similar to the declaration by the East German Parliament precede the Russian action at that time. During the height of that blockade, however, there were never any direct threats to cut off air traffic. It was with the aid of a giant Allied airlift that the blockade was finally broken.

East Germany has charged that balloons sent over its territory carry equipment weighing "tons," including cameras which "immediately broadcast pictorial images to American receiving stations in West Germany." The Reds said the devices were being used to photograph military and industrial installations.

ADN said the declaration sent to the President by President Johannes Diekmann asserted that East Germany "will not tolerate such an "endangering of its citizens."

Mother Critical After Saving Tot

Baltimore, Feb. 8 (AP)—Mrs. George A. Bauman, who dropped three of her children from a second-floor apartment on a blinding snowstorm today, said she was "in a state of shock" after the 27-year-old housewife escaped from a front window, 4-year-old John, died later in Maryland General Hospital, 80 old John B. Green, 35, Mrs. Bauman's father, who had been married to her for 15 years.

Edward, 3, and Joseph, 2, were reported in serious condition at the hospital. A fourth child, 4-month-old James, was rescued by Irvin Lewis, a neighbor. The two oldest children, George, 8, and William, 7, were in school at the time.

Mrs. Bauman jumped from her row-house apartment to the sidewalk some 20 feet below, suffering injuries as well as a fractured hip. Mrs. Estelle Sheehan, said she "looked like a Christmas Tree" when she fell.

Witnesses said the three children were caught by two unidentified Negro men, while Mrs. Bauman's fall was broken by the crowd on the sidewalk.

Police said 11 other persons in the Battery house escaped unhurt.

A small, black-haired, bespectacled man with an air of quiet intensity about him, the Porter School principal is regarded as a strict disciplinarian. When he talks, those kids jump "one mother said in their parents in Columbia seem to like him."

Petror was born and educated in nearby Williamstown and lives here now with his wife and baby daughter. He attended the University of Connecticut and graduated from Williamstown State Teachers' College in 1906. He joined the Porter School faculty in the same year as a teacher in the upper grades.

News True Development

In commenting on the conference method of reporting, Petror said recently: "There's nothing like it for reporting true development. It permits the teacher to know the child better through learning something about his parents and home life, and it gives the parent a chance to learn something about his child that he might not otherwise know."

A parent also gets to know the character of his child better through the elimination of letter-grade reports, which, he said, are "too soft" on the children.

It is on this point—the effect of competition on youngsters—that the issue of report cards is often fought. Educators who advocate the elimination of letter-grade reports from traditionalists, who accuse them of being "too soft" on the children.

It's the teachers and local school administrators who have to live with this charge, which seems to be gaining in popularity among the parents and school board. Others have complained of the six-month wait between conferences or the fact that the youngsters themselves get nothing in recognition of their progress, or lack of it, except talk.

Generally, however, the system seems to have the support necessary to last.

But not all educators—at least those not on the firing line—are so defensive. Ruit Strang, of Teachers College of Columbia University, has called marks "psychological dynamite." Other educators have blamed report cards for creating feelings of inadequacy and anxiety in children already having a difficult time in school, and of setting up false goals.

The question has also been raised as to whose competition is involved—the children's or the parents. Some teachers, after hearing youngsters say, "I'm going to get a B like I did last year," or "My father is going to give me a dollar every A I get," form the notion that the parents are involved in a contest of their own, with a prize going to the one whose child gets the best mark.

State Labor Office Here Using General Aptitude Test Battery

Anyone interested in finding out whether he is a tool maker? Or an engineer? Or a draftsman? Or a butcher, a baker, candlestick maker?

Well, the State Labor Department's local employment service office in the Jarvis building, can probably help you.

The office is equipped to administer what is known as the GATB, the General Aptitude Test Battery, a series of tests designed to measure ability in 20 occupational fields, with a variety of specific jobs in each.

The battery, which is administered by Miss Tanner, test technician, measures intelligence in connection with a particular numerical and spatial (three-dimensional) aptitudes; form and clerical perception, motor coordination and finger and manual dexterity.

The State Labor Department has been using it for about five years, and the local office has been using it for a number of months. But until now, it had been used only by the state office.

Personnel taking it had to go to the state office in Hartford.

Yesterday, however, Miss Hazel Anderson, office manager, proudly showed off a new room the state has made available across the hall that will be used for the service office. It was lighted under the direction of an administrative and although its present equipment consists of only a typewriter, a few showup desks and chairs, a state has promised to send in some brand new stuff.

Here persons taking the GATB can concentrate on matching clothing shapes and performing all the other tests in quiet.

The entire battery, which consists of a number of booklets, a peg board and a rivet-and-washer game, takes about 2 1/2 hours to complete. But a person interested in finding out how he would do on the other tests in quiet.

And along with the test goes a counseling service, provided by Roger Dick, the office job counselor. The testing service is free to anyone. Just make an appointment.

Miss Anderson is enthusiastic about the GATB. She says it would be helpful to youngsters coming out of high school and not sure what field they want to get into.

"It's also good for anyone who is dissatisfied with his present job and wants to make a change," she says, and, too, for handicapped persons.

Boon for Employers

It's also a boon for employers. They can ask that anyone of the force sends them be tested first, to determine whether he could do the job called for. A complete GATB test, says Miss Anderson, can be done in 45 minutes.

Group to Review Increase in Fees

The Board of Directors last night voted to keep present building permit and license fees in force pending study by a subcommittee of new fees the town administration has proposed.

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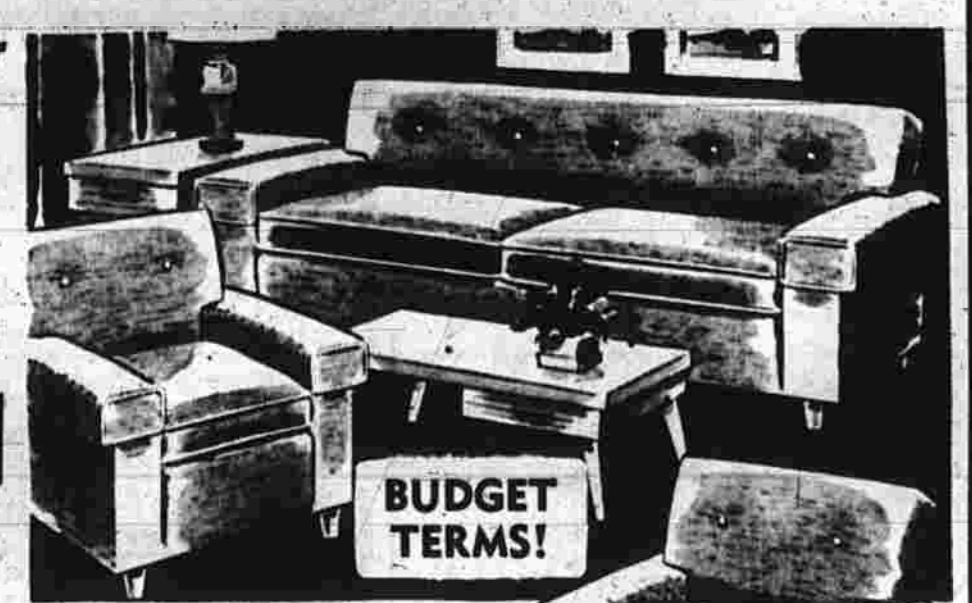

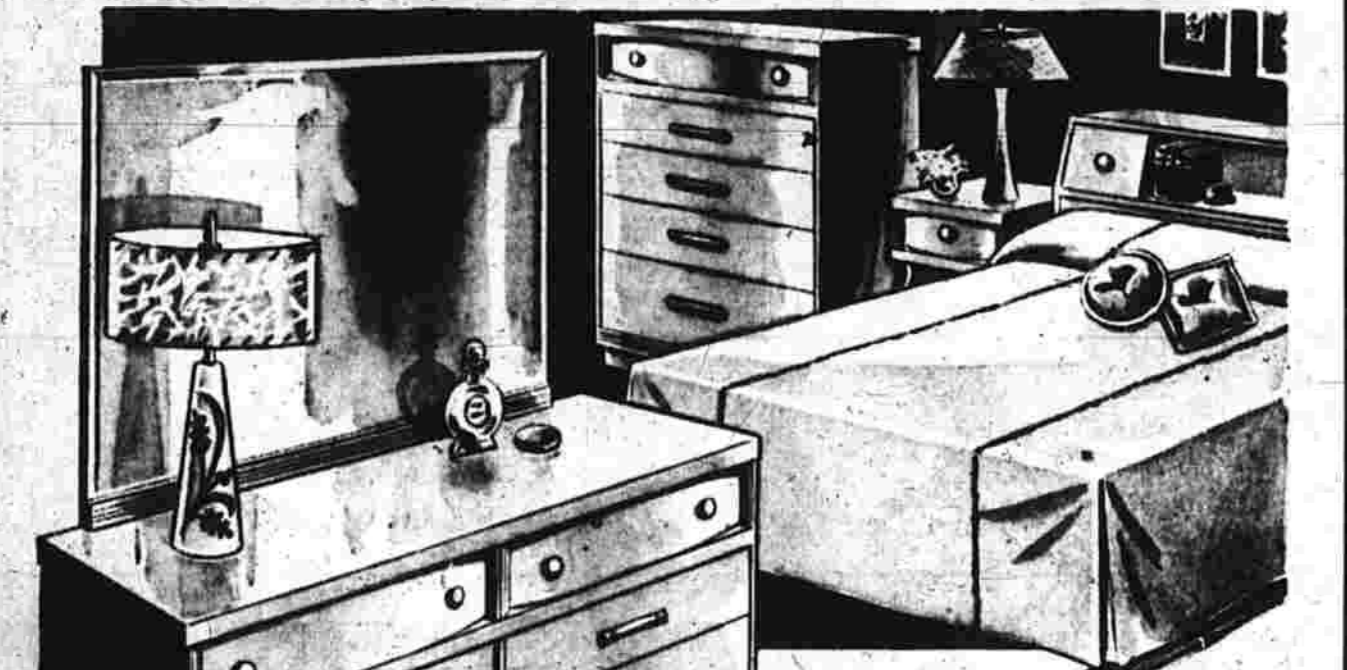

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California Rocked By Severe Quakes

San Diego, Calif., Feb. 8 (AP)—A powerful earthquake centered south of the San Jacinto Mountains rocked southern California as far north as Los Angeles today, causing widespread but minor damage in two counties.

Water mains burst, windows and plaster cracked, small fires were started and buildings away in the border counties—San Diego and Imperial.

Seismologists gave the quake a magnitude of 6.5 on a scale which rates the largest ever recorded at 8.2. This compares with 7.6 for the shock which killed 14 persons in Tehachapi, California, in 1952, and 6.3 for the 1933 Long Beach, Calif., shock, which killed many more.

No deaths or injuries were reported from this morning's earthquake, which lasted along the border in 10 hours.

High Supports Seen Favored By Senate

Washington, Feb. 8 (AP)—A bill to raise the support price for wheat was reported today to favor over-riding President Eisenhower's protest and restoring rigid farm price supports. But no date was set for the bill's passage.

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Old Feuds Don't Die; They Go On and On

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Soviet Sees Balloons 'Brink of War' Move

Moscow, Feb. 9 (AP)—The Soviet Union today accused the United States of carrying out a "brink of war" policy in the release of weather balloons over Russian air space.

In a full-scale news conference at the Spidropost Palace, Foreign Ministry Press Chief Leonid Dychev declared that the balloons carried apparatus which did not for a moment resemble anything that could be used for aerial reconnaissance.

He declared the balloons constituted a menace to air navigation and grossly infringed on the rights of the Soviet Union.

"All such attempts by American military organs are an attempt to conduct a policy of 'brink of war' which has been condemned by people."

The Soviet press chief was referring to a statement attributed to U. S. Secretary of State Dulles in a magazine article.

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
