About 50 hurt were taken to hospitals. Scores were injured as many of the 1,000 passengers were thrown from their seats.

Official Quits
Andover Unit
In Zone Rift

Andover, Feb. 28 (Special)—The executive official of the zoning and planning commission announced his intention to resign today as a result of the recent zoning changes passed by the commission.
Max Heimer, building official and zoning agent, said he informed L. Edward Whitcomb and Raymond T. Hoole, chairman of the zoning unit, of his intention last night. Whitcomb said today he hoped to be able to call a special meeting of the Board of Selectmen tonight to discuss the matter.
Heimer said the reason for his resignation, which he had considered profoundly, was to remove himself from a position which would require neutrality in the present controversy concerning zoning amendments and the proposed subdivision regulations.
Since Oct. 4, he said, he has worked about 79 hours for the town, during a building season which he termed comparatively "inactive." He pointed out that the heavy building season is now approaching and said he believed the duties of the job would probably increase to point where a full-time man and office help would be required.
Developers hindered
Heimer is associated with the Reimer Construction Co. which is presently building homes on Wains Rd. and he estimated he is a contractor he would be required to spend three to four months in the planning of a single home.
The possibility that his work for the town would curtail his own contracting was also mentioned by Heimer.
Reimer was hired as the town's first paid building official last October after the town adopted the State Building Code. A salary of \$325 was approved plus an expense account of \$75. He is required to issue all building permits, inspect homes under construction and serve notice of all violations.

The American Book Publishers Council and the Authors League of America in briefs filed as "friends of the court" supported Butler's appeal and asked that the Michigan law be declared invalid.

Mrs. Lela Kilgore, his wife, son, Robert, and daughter, Mrs. Albert T. Young Jr., had visited the senator Monday evening. Miller said they planned to return to the hospital tomorrow when doctors were scheduled to conduct a series of tests of the ailing senator. Miller said doctors at a stroke attributed death to a cerebral hemorrhage.
The senator's aide said funeral arrangements were incomplete and probably would be announced later in the day.
Kilgore, who was born Jan. 11, 1863, at Brown, Harrison County, Va., was first elected to the Senate in 1900. He served three terms. He was re-elected in 1946, again defeating Sweeney.
In 1952, he won his third successive term by defeating former Sen. Chapman Revercomb Holcomb.
Kilgore was serving as chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee and as a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee at the time of his death.
The West Virginian was the first senator to die in this session of Congress.
The House lost one member on Feb. 9 when Rep. Clarence W. Reed, an Illinois Republican, died also at the Bethesda Hospital.
Kilgore's successor will be chosen by Gov. William Marland (Democrat) to serve out the balance of this year. The election will vote in the regular November election for a successor to fill out Kilgore's term, which ends in 1958.
