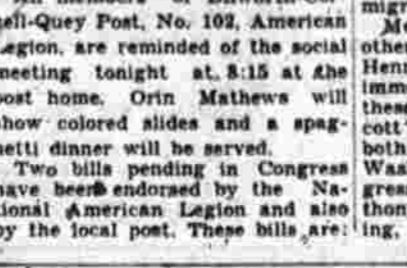

Coventry Tax Rate Rises to 36 Mills; School Factor for Increase

Coventry, Feb. 29 (Special)—Town residents will benefit by a 7% mill increase over last year's 36 mills bringing the new rate to 38.7 mills, the Board of Finance last night. It is based on the revised list of Grand List of \$11,444,214 compiled by the Board of Tax Review.

The new rate exceeds by 2% mills the Board of Finance's prediction in October that the rate would rise 5 mills from 28 1/2 to 33 1/2.

The increase, according to Albert J. Booth, chairman of the finance unit, is due to the fact that the North District School has gone into operation and that Coventry is not eligible this year for federal aid for schools. The latter was brought about by pleaing in the town's defense worker population.

Other reasons for the increase are a carry over of approximately \$33,000 for appropriations made last year and additional appropriations for the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Education passed since the town budget was approved in October.

The additional appropriations include about \$17,000 for two dump trucks with snow plows, \$12,800 voted by the Board of Education this week, and also over-expenditures of the snow removal work.

The cost to date of the North District School is approximately \$482,855.

Booth said the 36 mill-rate is further based on an amount of \$401,835 to be raised by taxation. This figure is compiled by deducting from the October budget of \$69,200 the estimated revenue of \$28,433 and an available cash surplus of \$25,000, leaving \$401,835.

Booth said that as far as he can see, "the tax rate will probably be stabilized at the present rate for a few years," basing his opinion on the contingency that no new schools are built in town.

Ash For Medical Examiner

Union Backs Pact At Sikorski Plant

Bridgeport, Feb. 29 (AP)—A United Auto Workers union yesterday approved a 2-year contract with the Sikorski division of the United Aircraft Corp. It affects 9,200 employees at the Helicopter plants here and in Stratford.

Red Trial Defense Seeks FBI Files

New Haven, Feb. 29 (AP)—A lawyer for eight defendants in a Smith Act trial said yesterday he will call Atty. Gen. Brownell as a witness, if necessary, in order to bring to light FBI files as evidence.

Atty. Frank Donner said he wants the files to show that the defendants went underground to escape FBI surveillance, and not to "seek political change."

The government charges the eight went underground as part of a conspiracy to teach or advocate the violent overthrow of the government.

Donner said it was critical to the defense to show the intent of the defendants by the FBI.

U.S. Atty. Sirion S. Cohen said that special agent Joseph J. Chaper, in charge of the FBI in Connecticut, would not be permitted to testify on the secret files on orders of Brownell.

Mrs. Annis was said to spend a few minutes with her mother and by the time the sheriff's deputies were ready to take her back to the county jail, she seemed considerably more at ease, managing a small smile as she received her mother goodbye.

The grand jury received its charge from Judge Alcorn shortly before 11 a. m., and immediately began questioning witnesses in the case. Among them were members of the Manchester Police Department, county detectives and Richard Maselli, in whose apartment Mrs. Annis purchased the shotgun which she used to kill her husband.

Birmingham, Ala., March 1 (AP)—Aatherine Lucy, Negro child, today was expelled from the University of Alabama for improper charges that school authorities conspired in mob action against her. There was no official announcement from the board of trustees, but members confirmed that the action was agreed upon at a meeting last night. They asked that their names not be used.

How One City Kept Rent Prices Stable

New Haven, March 1 (AP)—Former Mayor Edward Crane of Cambridge, Mass., told Mayor Richard C. Lee last night how that city kept rent prices down after rent controls went off in Massachusetts. Controls go off for about a million tenants in Connecticut on March 31. Crane, who is now a city councilman, told Lee: "We just announced that if there were any unwarranted increases we'd send the assessor around to reconsider assessments. In other words, if there are going to be any big profits made, the city would shunt them."

Allegations Dropped

At the start of the hearing yesterday, Marshall was allowed to drop allegations that the trustees and university officials named as defendants had conspired with outsiders in mob rioting that drove Miss Lucy from the campus at Tuscaloosa Feb. 6. Marshall told the court that "after careful investigation we are unable to produce any evidence to support these allegations. This amendment takes out every single allegation of conspiracy." Atty. Andrew Thomas called the conspiracy charges "scurrilous." He objected heatedly when Grooms eliminated them from the action, saying that the university should be given an opportunity to answer them.

U.S. Says Red Balloons Sighted in Alaska Sky

Washington, March 1 (AP)—The United States told Russia today that Soviet balloons have flown over United States territory. The State Department said that meant they had been over Alaska. In a new note to Moscow, the United States also said: "1. Proposed that a 'joint program' be worked out with the Soviet government and any other interested government for the operation of weather balloons."

Iran to Expel Red Attache as Long Time Spy

Tehran, Iran, March 1 (AP)—Iranian special agents arrested the Soviet Union's assistant military attache in Tehran last night. Officials said he was carrying top-secret Iranian military documents and had been "spying for a long time." Brig. Gen. Teimour Bakhtiar, military governor of Tehran, announced the arrest of the Soviet officer, Maj. Ivanovich Kournetsoff, and an Iranian warrant officer.

\$1 an Hour Minimum Increase in Pay Starts Today for Two Million

Washington, March 1 (AP)—More than two million lower-paid workers got a pay increase today, courtesy of the U. S. Government. The pay hikes came through a boost in the federal minimum wage from 75 cents to \$1 an hour. It was voted by Congress last year to become effective today. An estimated 2,000,000 workers are covered by terms of the Fair Labor Standards Act, generally those engaged or whose work is connected with interstate commerce—but only about 2,100,000 have been making less than the new \$1 minimum.

Forecasters Huff On Sunspots Value

St. Louis, March 1 (AP)—The value of sunspots as a weather indicator in politics, activities, and day between two veteran weather prophets—one a government meteorologist and the other a university professor of geophysics. It started when Prof. Edward M. Brooks of St. Louis University predicted an unusually windy March with the likelihood of more tornadoes all on the basis of increased sunspot activity. "I think the sun just got in his eyes," said government forecaster Harry F. Whitgren who termed it "prophecy."

Unstable Rule Seen In Indonesia Vote

Jakarta, Indonesia, March 1 (AP)—The results of Indonesia's marathonic parliamentary elections were announced today and sources close to pro-Western Premier Burhanuddin Harahap's caretaker cabinet said the government would resign "as soon as possible." The results announced by the Central Elections Committee gave no party more than 57 of the 257 seats, promising the island republic a series of coalition cabinets and probably political instability for the next four years.

Dulles opened an administration drive for President Eisenhower's foreign economic policies before the House Ways and Means committee.

Labor Appeals State Ban on Political Acts

Hartford, March 1 (AP)—A state employees AFL-CIO union today called for repeal of the 1937 law which outlaws political activity by public employees. Frank J. Gallagher, president of Council 16, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, told the state legislative council that the ban imposes unfair restrictions on state employees.

Doctor Labels U.S. 'Unhealthy Nation'

Washington, March 1 (AP)—The budgets of the National Health Institutes, The subcommittee today made public the testimony taken behind closed doors. "Certainly," White said, "coronary thrombosis is an epidemic. That may be true of cancer in the lungs. That is in this country, not in others. I think we are one of the unhealthiest countries of the world today."
