Washington, Feb. 29 (AP)—President Eisenhower announced today he is available for a second term.

He will make an informal talk on all major radio and television networks at 10 p.m. (EST) to tell the people about his big decision which he said was

Eisenhower's announcement—ending a long period of uncertainty and spec-ulation—came at a news conference held just five months and five days after his Sept. 24 heart attack.

"My answer will be positive—affirmative," Eisenhower said.
In Congress, there was jubilation among Republican legislators. GOP National Chairman Leonard Hall called it "the best possible news for all Americans." But Democratic Chairman Paul M. Butler predicted: "The American people will never elect a President, who at 65, has had a serious heart attack and who is unable to be a full time Chief Executive."

Adlai Stevenson, who lost to Eisenhower in 1932 and is bidding for this year's Democratic nomination, commented: "It is fitting that President Eisenhower be the candidate." He said the "main issue will be the policies and record of the Eisenhower administration."
