### Slayer Granted Right to Appeal To High Court

New Haven, March 7 (AP)—Harold Rogers, a 46-year-old New Haven Negro convicted of slaying a woman in a liquor store holiday, has received permission to appeal his case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Rogers, who is under sentence of death, has lost out in an appeal to the Connecticut Supreme Court for a new trial.

His appeal was based, among other things, on the contention that police officials used subterfuge to gain a signed confession of the slaying in November, 1953, of Mrs. Dorothy Kennedy in West Haven.

His lawyers contended that his constitutional rights were violated because police refused him permission to talk to his lawyers and threatened to take his sick wife into custody while turning their children over to juvenile authorities.

Four justices in the State Supreme Court held that although police used recalled trickery to obtain the confession there was nothing to indicate it was not a true confession.

However, Associate Justice Patrick B. O'Sullivan dissented and held that Rogers' constitutional rights were violated by the police.

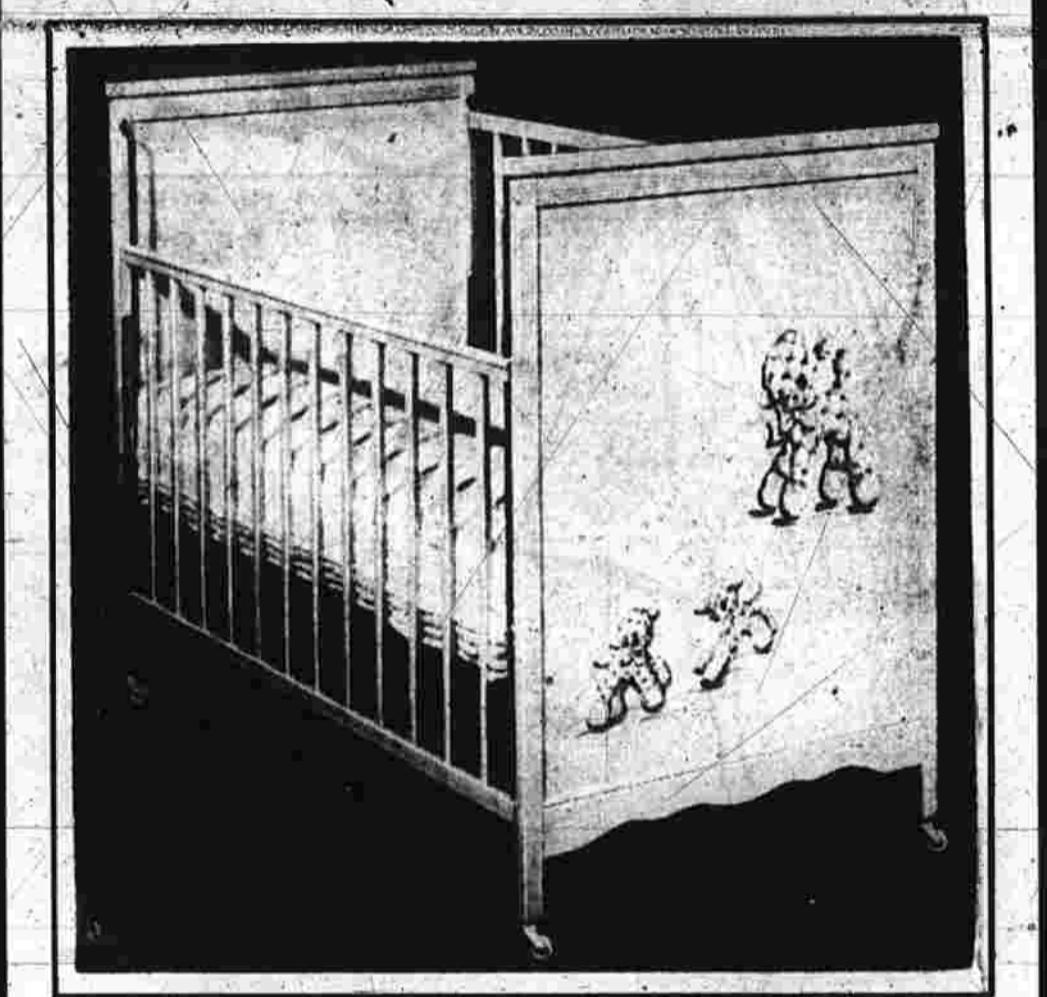

### Rockville Final Approval For School Site Sought by SBC

Rockville, March 7 (Special)—Final approval was sought by the School Building Committee last night in preparation for presenting the Rockville property on Loveland Hill to the voters at a special town meeting March 13.

In discussing the site, the SBC last night held several factors it had considered in making the recommendation to the Board of Finance and which it will present to the townpeople at the meeting.

Opposes Machine Vote

Franklin Willes of the committee said he would oppose putting the question on the voting machines, as was done with the Oik-Aberle site, which was decisively defeated last November.

Reasons given by Willes for this opinion were mainly concerning the fact that consideration of the question at a town meeting allowed questions to be answered and discussion to be held on the site. Otherwise, people are generally ill-informed on the question to vote intelligently, he said.

The question of sewage and water facilities to the site was discussed at length by the committee. John G. Talbot Jr., SBC chairman, said the Rockville Water and Aqueduct Co. would not guarantee water to any area the committee has thus far considered as a possible high school site.

Possibility of drilling a well was

also discussed. However, it was the consensus that it would be a bad investment to drill a well with maintenance costs of pumps, and with a lack of the insurance premium reduction. City water facilities would mean a lower cost for fire insurance, as hydrants could be located in the area.

Sever Lines

Estimated costs for running sewer lines the seven tenths of a mile to the site are \$15,000, while the cost of installing water lines over the same area are \$18,000.

Following the meeting Willes was asked if he felt the Rockville site was as advantageous a location as the Mitchell land on Mount St., which had also been under consideration by the SBC.

"Not for the difference in price," he answered. Explaining, he said besides the \$40,000 difference in original price, there is at least a \$50,000 difference in site development in favor of Rockville.

He also felt the Rockville land would be of more future advantage, so far as location is concerned, as the population trend is currently in that direction.

Among the factors listed by the SBC in making its Rockville choice are the following:

1. The site is adequate in size for a 1,000 to 1,500 pupil high school. It meets national and state suggested standards of acreage and will accommodate the school plant and a recreational facility, parking and vocational agriculture building.
2. The price is \$34,000 for about 28.25 acres, the lowest of any price yet considered by the SBC. Fair market value on the land has been set at \$13,000.
3. The land is high level and

well-drained. Approximately 20 acres are cleared, the remaining eight and a quarter wooded or brush land. The cost of site development would be comparatively low and reasonable.

4. Public utilities are available in the vicinity of the SBC. The property is the best high school site in town in reach of utilities and comes very near to being the only one so situated.

5. The site is central to areas already populated or in the process of development.

6. It is located between two of the town's elementary schools and is thus conveniently situated in relation to locations from which it will draw much of its population.

7. It is within walking distance of the Connecticut Company bus line.

8. The general area in which the site is located is a fast-growing suburb. Improvements such as a new sidewalk on Windsor Ave. will enhance the site for a high school, and the location of a school will contribute to the desirability of the neighborhood.

Talbot said signs such as those used when the Oik-Aberle land was under consideration are being placed so as to direct people to the site and see its location in relation to the rest of the town.

smoothly and that there probably would be no strike.

"We're out to negotiate a contract," he said, "we're not striking happy."

McDonald indicated, however, that the negotiations which probably will begin in May will list the most expensive package the steel workers ever have presented, one that will include a layoff pay plan, premium pay for weekends, demands for a pay raise and fringe benefits. The present contract expires at midnight June 30.

McDonald said it isn't the extra pay the steel workers want as much as the time off.

He added, however, that in his opinion the layoff pay plan is of equal importance in the coming negotiations.

"Premium pay seems more important to the boys now because of full employment," McDonald said, "but if the reverse were true and we had layoffs like we had in 1954, the emphasis would be on supplemental unemployment benefits."

Fringe benefits and possible wage demands were up for discussion today, although McDonald

said no wage figure would be arrived at for some time.

The union last year won a 13 cent an hour increase after a 12 hour strike to hit the average hourly wage in the steel industry to the union estimate of \$2.45.

### Andover Public Hearing On Zone Rules Set for Tonight

Andover, March 7 (Special)—An open hearing of the Zoning and Planning Commission will be held this evening at 8 p.m. at the Andover Town Hall on proposed subdivision regulations.

The Commission defines subdivision as meaning the division of a tract or parcel of land into three or more lots for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of sale or building development for agriculture purposes.

The regulations, copies of which have been filed at the Town Clerk's office, cover eight pages, plus a sample application form and eight drawings illustrating the paved or oiled surfaces for streets, standard pipe sewer, manholes, standard pipe water, and sewer disposal systems.

The Commission recommends in its preamble that subdividers confer with the Commission before making plans "in order to become thoroughly familiar with subdivision requirements and with the proposals of the Commission which might affect the area in which the proposed subdivision lies."

A preliminary plan will be required to accompany an application on the prescribed form for tentative approval.

This plan will include with it, at the request of the Commission, a topographic map showing five foot contours, or less, and any changes

incurred in the proposed regrading for any lot and street contained in the subdivision if the Commission feels that such a map is necessary.

The plan would be discussed with the subdivision or his agents at a regular meeting of the Commission. Following this, and within thirty days after the application and preliminary plan, the Commission would communicate by writing any changes which would be required and the extent of any waivers which would be granted.

Original Plan

The subdivider would have to file original drawings of the final subdivision plan and street profiles with the Commission within six months after the receipt of their communication.

The Commission would then approve or disapprove the plan within 30 days, and a copy of the approved plan would be filed with the Town Clerk within 90 days.

Before the final plan is approved, the subdivider would be required to hold a public hearing on the plan. No plan of re-subdivision would be approved without a hearing.

Storm drainage systems would also be required.

The developer will also have to file with the Commission "an adequate and detailed estimate of the costs of streets, public improvements, drainage structures, water and sewer mains, and other utilities, together with maps, plans and supporting data accompanied by a surety company bond, or cash, to be filed with the Town Clerk, in a sum sufficient to cover the total cost of the construction of streets, and other improvements."

The Commission will also require in the case of water mains, electric lights or other utilities to be installed by a public utility corporation or a municipal department, a statement in writing that

"the work will be done within a reasonable amount of time and without expense to the Town of Andover."

A charge will also be made to compensate the town for its cost of supervision on the installation of streets and utilities.

Under general requirements, the Commission provides that "public area for community use shall be provided in a subdivision, and deemed necessary by the Commission—that such public areas shall be located to the lot owners' satisfaction and to the satisfaction of a licensed civil engineer or land surveyor and certifications as to accuracy; reservations and areas the titles of which are reserved by the subdivider; and discontinuities in decimials of feet; and permanent reference monuments."

Brasage Systems

The regulations state that "streets shall be at least 30 feet wide with a paved roadway width of 20 feet and graded to a full 50 feet width, including cuts and fills."

Other requirements include sidewalks four feet wide when deemed necessary and located as required by the Commission.

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### Rockville School Budget, Simpkins Site Face Town Meeting Tuesday

Rockville, March 7 (Special)—Among the 10 items listed on the call of the special Town Meeting on Tuesday are requests for approval of the school budget for the new high school property for the new high school, and approval of a budget for the Board of Education.

The meeting, to be held in the Sikes Auditorium at 8 p.m. will consider and take action on the remainder of the school budget in the amount of \$462,120 for the current fiscal year. The education budget has twice been recommended to the Board of Finance for further consideration.

The finance unit, in presenting the budget to the voters, at the annual Town Meeting in October, made substantial cuts from the requests asked by the Board of Education.

The education unit stated that the Board of Finance figures would not be sufficient to cover expenses for the year, while the Finance Board has felt it an adequate amount. The Board of Finance figures were again rejected at a special Town Meeting in November.

Concerning the Simpkins property on Loveland Hill, the townpeople will approve or reject the site as a possible high school site, and will approve or reject an appropriation of \$34,000 for the purchase of the land. They will also provide the method of financing the property should it be approved.

Other items on the call include the following:

1. To authorize and empower the town to borrow a sum not to exceed \$75,000 to defray current expenses in anticipation of tax receipts.
2. To authorize the town to enter into an agreement with the State Highway Commissioner for acquisition of highway funds allocated or to be allocated to the town for the current year.
3. To authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the State Highway Commissioner for expenditure of flood funds appropriated to the Highway Department.
4. To appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,200 for civil defense, a sum not to exceed \$4,000 for removal, and a sum not to exceed \$200 for use in connection with the celebration of the dedication of the new State armory here.
5. To authorize and empower the town to accept the terms of a contract for the purchase of the land owned by Dr. and Mrs. Walter Gray, to be located off Skinner Rd., to consider or take action on any and all other business necessary or incidental to the purpose of the meeting.

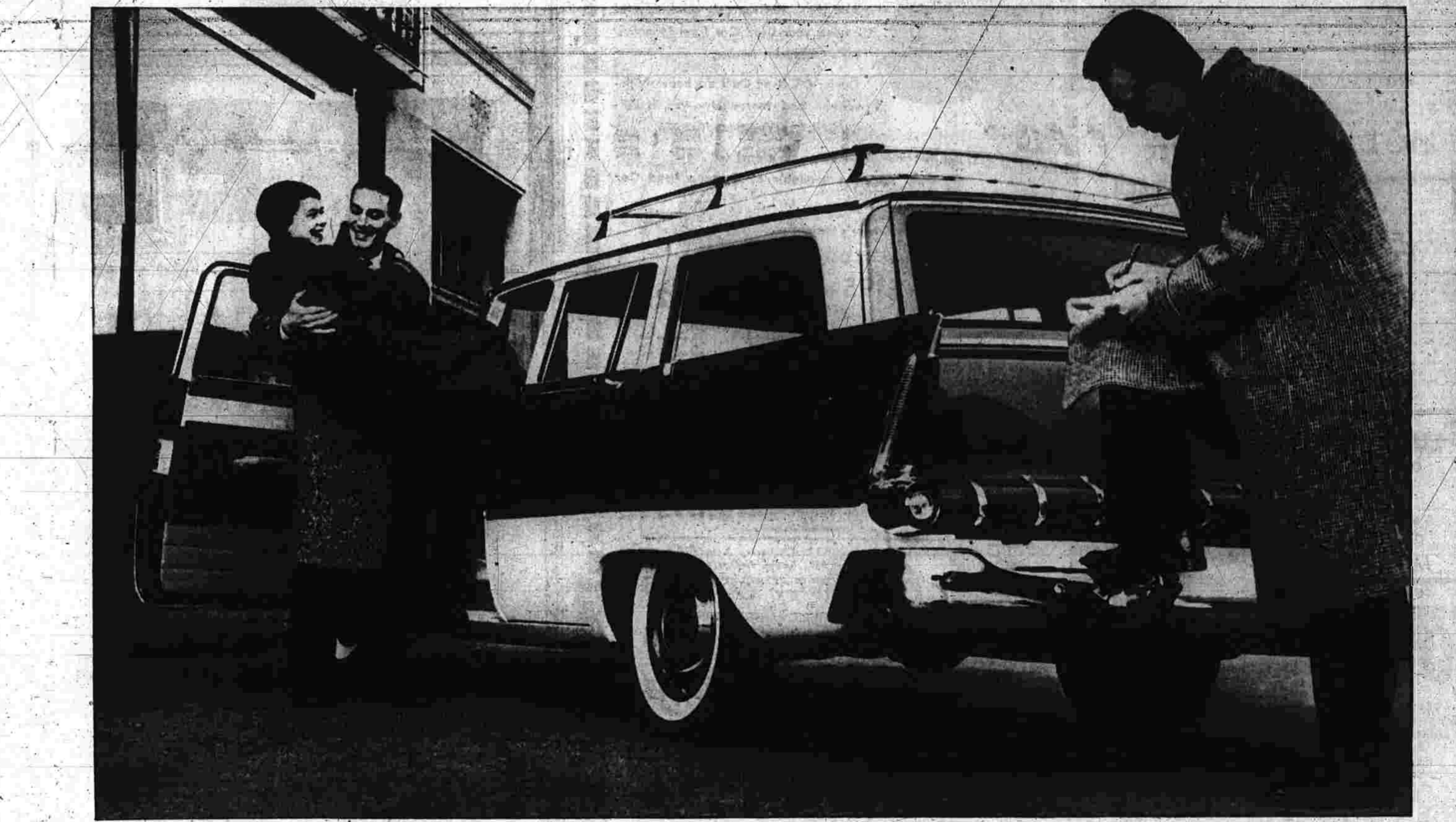
